Dear Sir, Your esteemed favor of Dec. 22<sup>d</sup> was rec<sup>d</sup> some time ago. but owing to constant engagement in our different courts, which have all been in session, I have not been able to return you an earlier answer.

The latter of the two questions which your letter presents, viz: whether free negroes can come to this state to reside, must be answered in the negative. A statute of the Republic passed Feb. 5. 1840 - Hartley's Digest. art. 2526 declares, that thereafter, it shall not be lawful for any free person of color to emigrate to the Republic - and provides that in case of such emigration bond and security in the sum of \$1000. shall be required, conditioned for their removal out of our limits, and if not given in given within ten days they shall be sold into slavery for one year: and if the bond is not given within the year they shall be sold into slavery for life. Our Supreme Court, in the case of *Parish v. Sherwood* 12 Texas, 166. 7. in 1844. decided this law to be still in force.

Your second question is, whether slaves can be brought to this state and set free. They can not, with the privilege of remaining in the state. The 8<sup>th</sup> Section of the same act allows two years from its passage for all free persons of color to remove out of the Republic, and all found here after that time without the permission of congress shall be arrested and sold as before provided.

Whether you find could bring slaves to this state and emancipate them, subject to such conditions as are imposed by our laws, would depend of course on the powers confer<sup>d</sup> by the will and its validity by the laws of Ala. on which points I cannot pretend to advise. But, assuming that the slaves were lawfully introduced into Texas, without any restraint as to their power to dispose of them, I think they might be legally emancipated here, on condition, however, that provision should be made in the act of emancipation for sending them out of the limits of the state. The constitution of the Republic provided that no slaveholder should be allowed to emancipate a slave without the consent of Congress, unless sent with out the limits of the Republic. The act of Feb. 5. 1840 was also passed under the Republic which I have before quoted.

Our present constitutional provision is that, "the legislature shall have the right to pass laws to permit the owners of slaves to emancipate them saving the rights of creditors, and preventing them from becoming a public charge" - In the case in 12 Texas before alluded to the Supreme Court has before them the construction of a will, which emancipated certain slaves unconditionally - but further provided that if the State of Texas among of the testator's relatives should object to their freedom, or those conditions, he gave his sister full power to send them to a free state, or to Liberia as she & the negroes might agree - and giving his sister \$1600 to carry out the will. The court decides that the State of Texas through her laws does object to their unconditional emancipation of the State constitution they do not consider it an entirely prohibitory - taken in connection with the old constitution & the act of Congress of 1820 before cited which remains in force the condition of their removal from the state is implied - as their residence in the state is not permitted. But they uphold the validity of the trust to the sister for the purpose of carrying them out of the state - the policy of our law being as they declare not to prohibit emancipation absolutely, but only their remaining as free persons within the state. I tremble that they comment upon and approve a case in 6 ~~the~~ Porter vs R. which held a bequest of free dom removal from the state invalid, and that any mode of emancipation except that pointed out by law was prohibited - The case in 12 Texas seems very carefully considered, and no doubt settles the law with us against emancipation which does not provide for the removal of the slaves - and establishing its validity when I don't so provide.

I feel quite mortified not to have replied more promptly to your enquiries; but my time has been extremely occupied, and apprehending more difficulty in the subject than I have found, I have waited for leisure to enable me to be accurate in the examination. I cannot accept any part in the matter, and am only gratified to have the opportunity of complying with your wishes -
