I propose building an addition to the south end of my dwelling house of the following description.

Two stories high - with pilasters in front & at the back end, to correspond with the present house.

The lower story to be divided into two rooms, each 22 feet, measuring from front back, exclusive of the partition, and about 2 feet 3 inches wide - so as to make the present passage door the centre of the front with a double sliding door, as large as the width of the rooms will admit, between them. Each room to have one fire place, with Mantel & all complete and two windows to extend nearly to the floor - of those of the parlor in the present house and one door from the passage into each room, and also one door from the back porch into the back room.

The upper story to be divided into three rooms each about 15 feet by 2 feet 3 inches, with fire place, with Mantel & all complete in two of them - with two windows in the front, two in the back & one in the middle room - with a double sliding door, as large as the rooms will admit, between two of them, besides which there will be three other doors, in them to be situated where I may direct of common size.

The sleepers & joists of all the rooms to be as substantial & strong as those of the present house, and as near together - The floors to be of good pine plank & laid in the best manner - & set laid below.

The walls to be commenced on a good solid clay foundation & wide so that they shall not split or give way. To be not less than 2 bricks thick to the lower joints or sleepers & 1 1/2 bricks, exclusive of the pilasters, above.

to be laid in good mortar made with good sand & fresh lime.

The Windows above to be 24 lights 10 x 12 glass or 16 lights 10 x 18 glass, and the lower windows to be 32 lights 10 x 12 glass, or 20 lights 10 x 18 glass, as I may direct. All the windows to be finished with out, as those in the present house, with Venetian blinds, and within with plain jam with casing, those below to have ornamented pilasters and those above to have plain pilasters. The frames to be box frames and with weights, all complete.

In addition to the above the two windows in the south end of the present house are to be removed, both repaired thoroughly & one of them to be used as one of the windows above specified in the upper story & the other used for a false window in the lower end of the proposed addition.

All the doors to be finished with pilasters (ornamented below & plain above) with handsome paneled jam & transoms & sash.

Two good & neat wardrobes to be made in two of upper rooms.

All the rooms to be plastered with good strong mortar, true & even, without cracks. The walls ready for papering & the ceilings with a white coat.

The interstices between the pilasters at the end of the present house to be filled up by studding &c. so as to make a ^{true} smooth wall in the rooms.

The false chimney at the south end of the present house to be removed, and a small one made in place of the large over the little room in front.

The Cornices to be made plain & the front cornice

of the present house altered & repaired where necessary to correspond, and a blacking course to be put on the front & ends of the whole house.

The roof of the addition - to correspond with the roof of the present house, except that the gutters & valleys may be made to run to the end of the addition, if I should so direct - and the ceiling of the rooms to be made as much higher than the present house as is practicable without elevating the comb above the blacking course. The shingles to be ^{put} of Cedar.

The undertaker to furnish all materials - including best mortice locks for the common doors & sliding door locks for the sliding doors - with brass knobs & locks for the Wardrobes - nails, hinges, brads, sprigs - paints oil putty, glass, and in a word all that is necessary to finish said addition in a complete & workman like manner - The painting included - except the rollers & ways for the sliding doors, which I am to furnish - The improvement to be made during the ensuing summer & fall, and with as little inconvenience or annoyance to the occupants of the house as practicable -

And should any misunderstanding arise as regards the manner of executing any part of the work, or as to the character of materials, not herein specified, it is to be understood, that the materials shall be of as good quality & the work as well executed & in as good state as the dwelling house now occupied by Mr. Danegon.

And it shall be further understood that I shall have the right at any time to alter or change the plan & manner of execution of any part of the work, as I may think proper, provided, that I shall, in all cases pay in proportion

Int 1st Do you know or not whether Skelton Standifer got a negro-boy named Jim with his wife Lydia upon their marriage? If so from whom did he get him? and if he disposed of said negro boy Jim, state when and to whom and how he disposed of him?

Ans 6 After John Echols gave the girl Herrena to Lydia he (John Echols) had one man in his employ named Taylor whom it was supposed killed a mare belonging to Lydia by oppression to compensate Lydia for the loss of said mare he John Echols gave Lydia a negro girl named Clara and I think Jim (who was a son of Clara) was born after the gift of Clara to Lydia?

Int 7th Do you or not know whether Skelton Standifer ever sold, or disposed of a negro woman named Herrena and a negro boy named Jim? If so, state when and for what consideration said Skelton Standifer sold either, or both of them?

Ans 7th Skelton Standifer stayed all night at my house and had with him the boy Jim and some horses. My understanding was that he was on his way to ^{Rich} William Walker and that said Walker was to get the boy Jim and the horses to discharge a debt that he owed Walker, and that he was then on his way to cashier them. I state that the negro was especially assigned for Walker, whether he was to let Walker have the horses, or sell them for money to discharge the debt. I do not distinctly recollect.

My father took with him, from Madison County to Lawrence County, four negroes - to wit the boys Jim and Jonathan, and the women Silvy, Herrena, and Sarah. The boy Jim and the woman Herrena were brother and sister, and Silvy, Sarah, and the boy Jonathan, were children of the woman Herrena.

Question 11. Would you state the names of the children your father Skelton Standifer had by his first wife in the order in which they were born, and the date of birth?

Answer. Benton, Nancy, Skelton, James T. Standifer, Samuel Standifer, Lucy, Elizabeth, and Polly Mullins.

Question 12. State how many children your father had by his second wife Lydia, formerly, Lydia Echols, and their names, and where do they now reside?

Answer. John E. Standifer, and wife M. Standifer - both of whom now reside in the state of Texas - James E. Standifer who now resides in Monroe County Mississippi -


