Dear Sister Yale Committee. Dec. 29th 1842

Your letter dated December 14th arrived here on Christmas day. I did not however get it until the next day. I had asked a fellow student in the morning as he was going to the Post Office to see if there was anything there for me. As this was Sunday the Office was only open a little while in the morning and a little later in the afternoon and it was too late then for me to go to it. In the morning I had to wait (not very patiently of course) until the afternoon before I could get your letter out. But in the afternoon just as the old "Chapel Bell" was ringing to remind us that although it was Christmas and every one black or white (or white or black) was enjoying their freedom nevertheless the students of Yale College were not exactly in the same situation but must abide off to the Chapel according to the law, in that case made and provided by the honorable Faculty. As the old bell was ringing (with that sound so peculiarly its own, which strikes a terror to the heart of many a student every morning which none but they who have experienced it can know or even conceive of) to remind us of all that the cry of fire was raised down town and away went all the students after No. 4 leaving the bell to ring on or stop just as might suit the convenience of the bell ringer. It was then just two o'clock and when we pulled No. 4 down to the place where the fire was, we found that the fire was in the building next to the Post Office. The fire continued from two until five o'clock and of course the Post Office was kept closed all the

time and I therefore was compelled to wait until the next
day for your letter. You seem to find yourself very much on answering
all my letters as soon as you receive them which you say I do not do.
Now it is very probable that all this may be true but on looking over the
account which I keep of all the letters that I both write and receive
I find that there is a great disparity between the dates of the letters
that I have written to you and those that I have received from you. I do
not pretend to say that this is your fault for I believe the fault lies
somewhere among the Post Offices since I receive letters that take from
fifteen to eleven days to get to New Haven after they are mailed at Haver-
hill. But there is something else I have noticed that I think is your
fault notwithstanding your boasted punctuality in answering all my
letters as soon as you receive them. It is that there is generally two or three
days difference between the times that your letters are dated and the
times when they are mailed. And from this I argue that although
you may begin your letters soon enough you are a long time in finishing
them which does me no more good than if you did not begin them so soon.
If you want an instance of this I would only refer you to your letter now
before me which is dated 12th and mailed 14th. I thank you much for your
punctuality. You say that you do not judge the time necessary to write a
long epistle but are only at a loss what to write. My case is a little different
from this for although I am pretty much at a loss what to write yet the
time is what I most stand in need of as you will readily agree when I tell
you that for the last week or so I have not averaged ~~seven~~ seven hours
sleep "per noctem" and this week I believe I have never got to bed under
twelve, and this is the chief reason why I have not answered your letter
before. I thought one night I would answer it if I had to sit up all night
to do so but I had to give over and go to bed before one o'clock. I would not

now have time to write to you had I not have got excited from
tomorrow's morning's recitation With regard now to that "Disposition"

part of tomorrow. We have had to be sure a few warm and pleasant days now and then during the whole winter but before the snow would have time to melt entirely the weather would turn cold again and we would have another snow storm, and thus it has continued during the whole winter.
