My Dear Sister

I know that I deserve a good scolding from you on account of my negligence in not writing to you for such a long time and I expect that you will not be at all backward in giving me my just deserts in your next letter. I would plead an excuse in extenuation of my fault were it not for the best reason in the world. that is I have not got any. It is of no use though to say any thing further on the subject for I do not think that I could better the case any and I might perhaps make it worse. so I will even say no more - only that I hope that I have not committed an unpardonable offence and I will try to make proper and I hope acceptable amends for it by being regular hereafter to write to you at least once in two weeks.

I received your letter dated May 9th in due season and I will now answer it. You said that Mother wished me to inform you when my vacation would commence. It is all over now and the term has again commenced. I spent my time very pleasantly and (I hope) profitably. I wished very much to go home when I saw all the students leaving but after they were all gone I did not care much about it. I was very glad when the vacation commenced but ten times more so when it was ended. College is beginning to look like itself again though all the students are not here yet. The term commenced last Monday day and about two thirds of the students are now here and the rest are arriving daily. There was not more than 20 or 30 students that remained here during the vacation and the most of them were Southerners who did not have time to go home and back again in four weeks. So I have began my letter on a large sheet. I am afraid that I shall not have enough to fill it up with entirely. so I will try to give you an account of the manner in which I employed my vacation and leave it to you to decide whether or no I spent it profitably.

The Legislature has been in session all the session and I spent a good part of my time there in listening to the sayings and doings of the free men of Connecticut. On the whole I have come to the unanimous conclusion that they are about the worst looking set of men in the whole country that could possibly have been collected. Why there is not more than half a dozen of them that ever pretend to make a speech and they had as well let it alone for they make a "monstrous" poor speech to say the best for them. Take them all in all and this beat the Free-men class all hollow for goodness or anything of that kind and I might say the for ignorance. But I could not expect them to be any better for about two thirds of them are Doerspeak. Now just let me give you an instance. Last Wednesday one of them got up and moved that the House adjourn until the afternoon of Monday. So clock P.M. so that the Representatives could have time to go home and spend the Sabbath there. Another member got up and moved that afternoon be stricken out as it made the sentence ungrammatical, but the mover of the resolution would not agree to it on the ground that it would then mean 2 o'clock at night. The chairman however put the motion to the House after striking out afternoon and the motion was not carried. Another member rose then and moved that P.M. be stricken out which motion was also not carried. The chairman then put it to the vote as it stood at first leaving both P.M. and afternoon in it and it was carried.

I do not think that this says much for our Representatives and if they are that bad at learning what must be the people who elect them be. I understand that they are about to pass a bill disfranchising students because simply they are most of them Whigs. Whenever the Whigs want to pass a bill they get up and every one opposes it and then the Doers just for opposition sake vote for it and as they have the majority in both Houses the motion is always carried. I believe this is the way that they intend to do with the bill.

I mentioned a while ago and if they do the bill will not be carried. The Anti-Slavery Liberty Society of Connecticut met here at New Haven during the vacation as they do not dare to meet in town-time for fear lest the students should use the best argument (that is the worst for them) upon them to break up the meeting, that is to speak more plainly, they feared lest the students should pelt them with rotten eggs which argument they used upon them last year at their annual meeting with pretty good success and certainly to the exceeding detriment of their clothes, notwithstanding their precautions they did not escape entirely for the last night that they met those of the students who were here collected a crowd of the town leaders among them and kept such an everlasting confusion and uproar that the Abolitionists were glad to break up as soon as possible and accordingly they dispersed about 8 O'clock and after they were all gone the Abolitionists had the room to themselves to do whatever they wished, after a few speeches were made they adjourned. I went down there one afternoon to see how they carried on their business and while I was there I had the pleasure of seeing Miss Abby Kelly, the great advocate of "woman's rights" whom you have doubtless heard of. I expected to hear her speak but there was a rule in the constitution forbidding women either to speak or vote in the public meetings of the Society and I was therefore disappointed. I think that on the whole Abby is quite a gentle looking woman though she is hardly in her right mind about woman's rights. I have four new studies this time viz: Whately's Rhetoric, Cicero's Selections, Demosthenes and Cicero's De Oratore. I like them all very well but Cicero's Selections and that is too hard altogether to suit my taste. But the other three are easy enough. When is Mat Steele coming on here. I have been waiting with all the patience imaginable for him and it is very near exhausted now. But it is very nearly recitation time so I must soon stop for the present. Give my love to all.

a poor fellow like myself, ~~contempt~~. I think that it is well that
vacation does not come any oftener than it does for they are enough
to kill one with laziness and having nothing to do. Here is a descrip-
tion "verba et liberatio". Breakfast at 7. Lie about doing nothing
until dinner, take dinner at 1. Lie about again until supper
take supper at 6. Go to bed and sleep until breakfast time and
so on through the vacation. Now am I not in an enviable
situation. However vacation is half over now think goodness!!!
Last Saturday I went out to West Rock and gathered some flowers.
West Rock is a very pretty place. It is more than 100 feet high
and almost perpendicular. Whenever you want exercise you have only
to go and climb up this rock and if you do not feel ~~the~~ tired to
a considerable degree then I do not know anything about it. By
the time I got half way up I got so tired that I had a great
notion to turn around and come back and so I would have done
but I found that it was almost impossible to come back the
same way that I got up. After we got to the top however we were
paid amply for all our trouble. When you once get up there you have
the best view of all the country and the whole harbor that you could
wish for. While I was up there I gathered some very pretty flowers,
which are the following. "wild actinidia" a flower resembling
the honeysuckle. 15th class 5th order. *Quercus laevis* - *Aspidelia canadensis*
Yankee. A small white flower of the 10th class 3rd order. *Quercus laevis*
Aspidelia latifolia. "crow foot" a small yellow flower of the 12th class
13th order. *Quercus laevis* *Ranunculus abortivus*. Besides these I gathered
several others but of not so much importance. I intend tomorrow to go
out again in search of some and I hope to have better success.

I saw some green peas yesterday for the first time this year and also some cherries though they were not more than half ripe, etc. they ripe there yet or not or are they all gone. They are considered very early for this climate but it appears to me that we always have them very near this time at home. Strawberries also will soon be ripe though they are much scarce up here. How long will it be before the peaches are ripe. They are not as large as the end of your finger yet up here, when they get ripe eat enough for both of us for I will give you my share as I can not eat them myself. I do not believe we are going to have any summer here this year for it has not been warm enough to pull off my winter clothes yet. We sometimes have a tolerable warm day but often the next day is cold enough to make up for it. I was in place of this letter when it gets home for I am quite tired of staying away from home so long. When I look back see how long I have been away I begin to take courage and hope that the rest of my time will pass away as quickly before I again see you. But when I look forward and see what a "monstrous" long time I have still got to stay away

As you did not write me a very long letter I shall not write any more at present to make up for it. Give my love to all of them

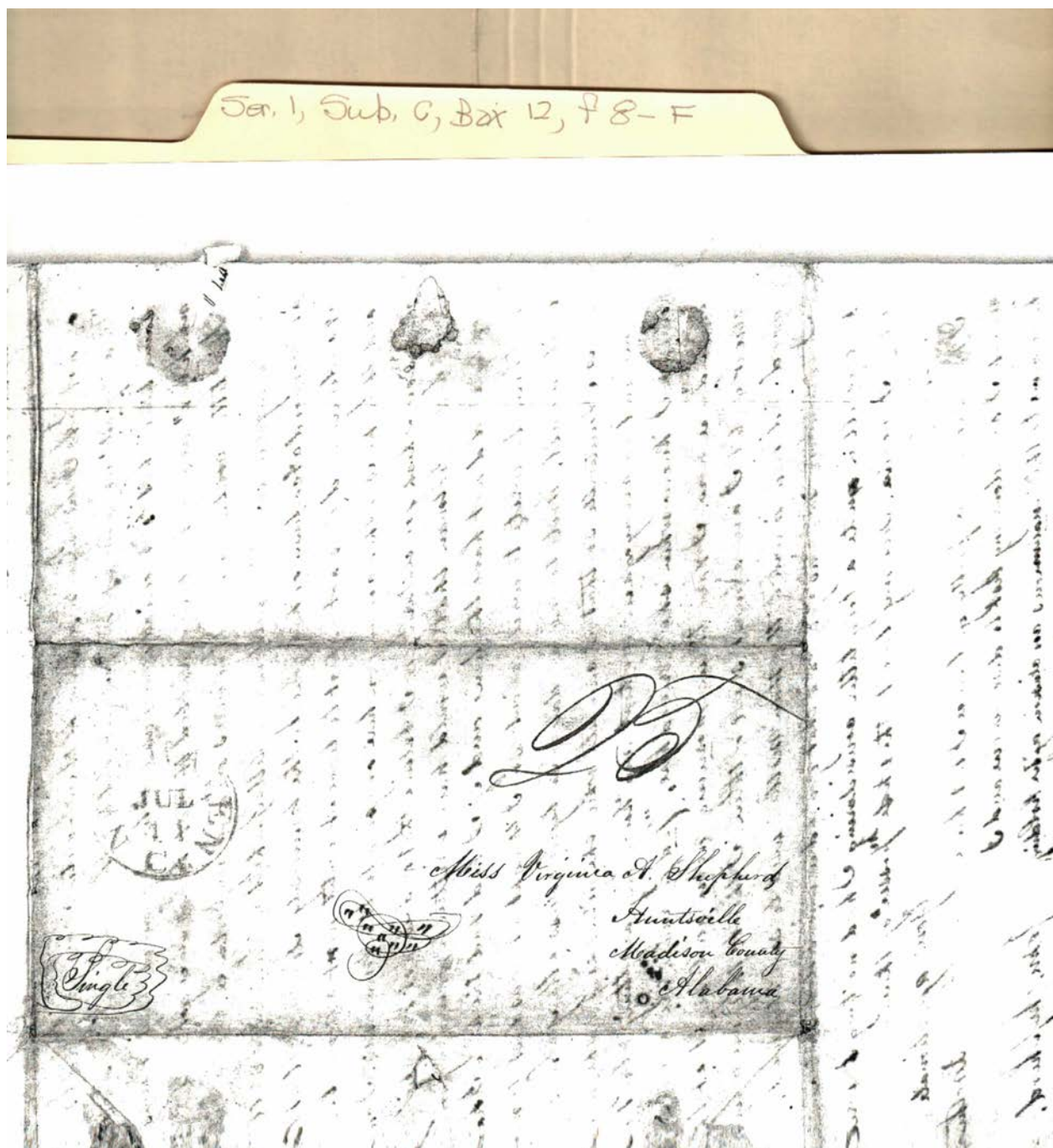

My Dear Sister
Since I last wrote to you which has been about three weeks ago the great change which I then spoke of has taken place. I am now a ^{graduate} of ^{Yale} the name of ^{Yale} and every thing connects with it. You ought to have seen me walk up the Senior aisle the other day last Wednesday the Seniors had their farewell oration delivered. We all met in the Chapel and after a little while the Professors and tutors came in in "disrupt array" and then the Seniors walked in together. The oration was exceedingly interesting. After they were all seated a "Veni" was delivered by one of the class after which the oration was listened to with a great deal of interest and the class then took leave of one another and then separated. At dinner time they all marched in procession to a large hall with the President and officers at their head and all took dinner together at the President's expense and that is the last of the Senior class for the present. At prayers that evening we all changed our state and I know it would have done your heart good to see the Sophomores when they walked up the Senior aisle for the first time. But enough of this, I suppose you would rather listen to other things of more interest. I suppose you know that last Monday was the 4th of July and for want of anything better to write about I will tell you how we passed the day here. At eight o'clock in the morning all the Sunday Schools and Temperance Societies in the city met in front of the public green. I had not ought to say "all in the city" for there were about half a dozen Sunday Schools from some of the little towns around the country with them. There had all come in during the fore part of the morning in wagons. You never saw such a sight I know as one of these Sunday Schools presented all mounted on board of "go-carts" of all sizes, descriptions and colors. Some of them were strung out in long rows nearly a half mile in length all going it at the top of their speed for fear that they should not get to New Haven in time to join the procession. By eleven o'clock they all got here and were ready for anything and everything that the next might propose the procession was then formed. They intended to march around the city but as the procession almost reached entirely around the city they

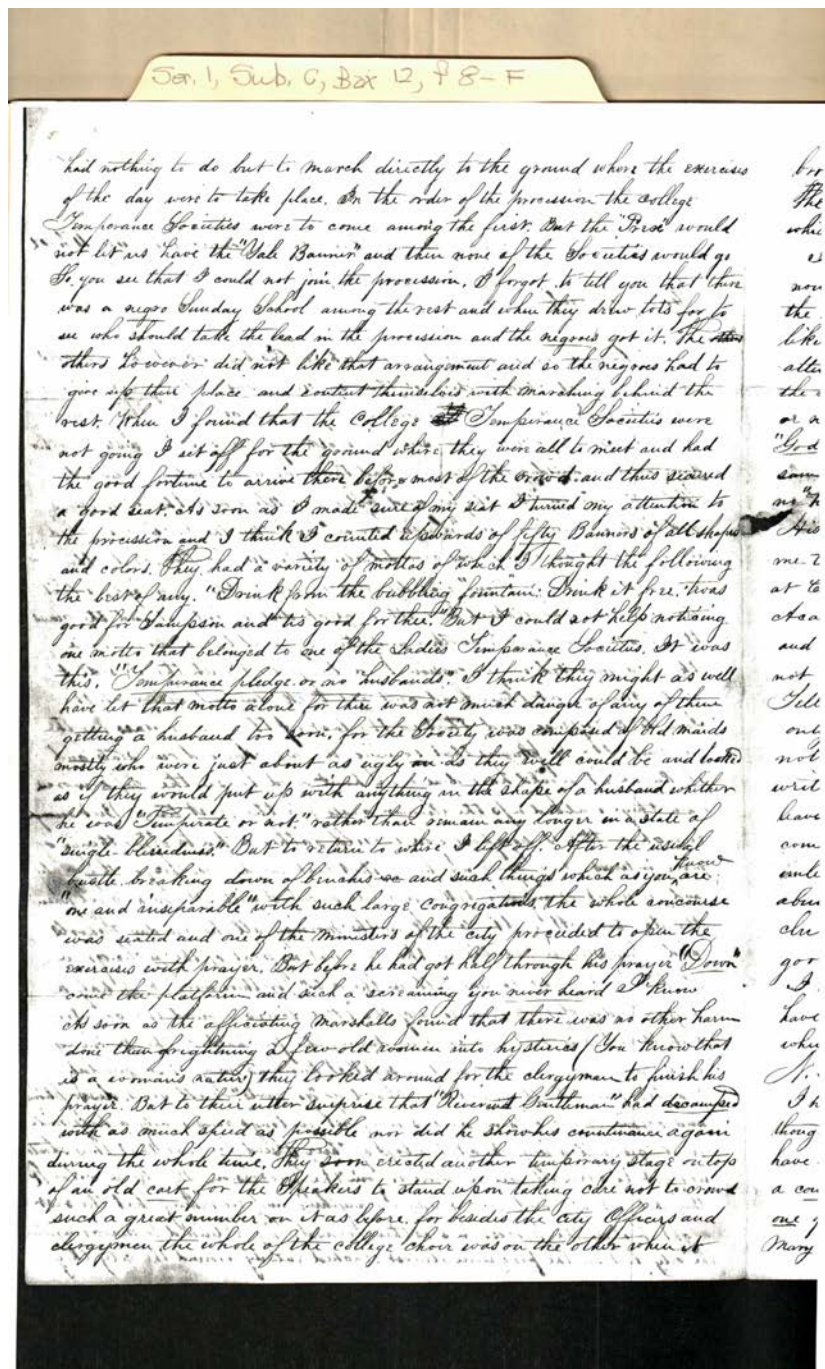

 abundance now. I have them morning noon and night at the
 Old Baptist I am almost sick of them. I think they are very
 good and even much better than Mother used to say they were.

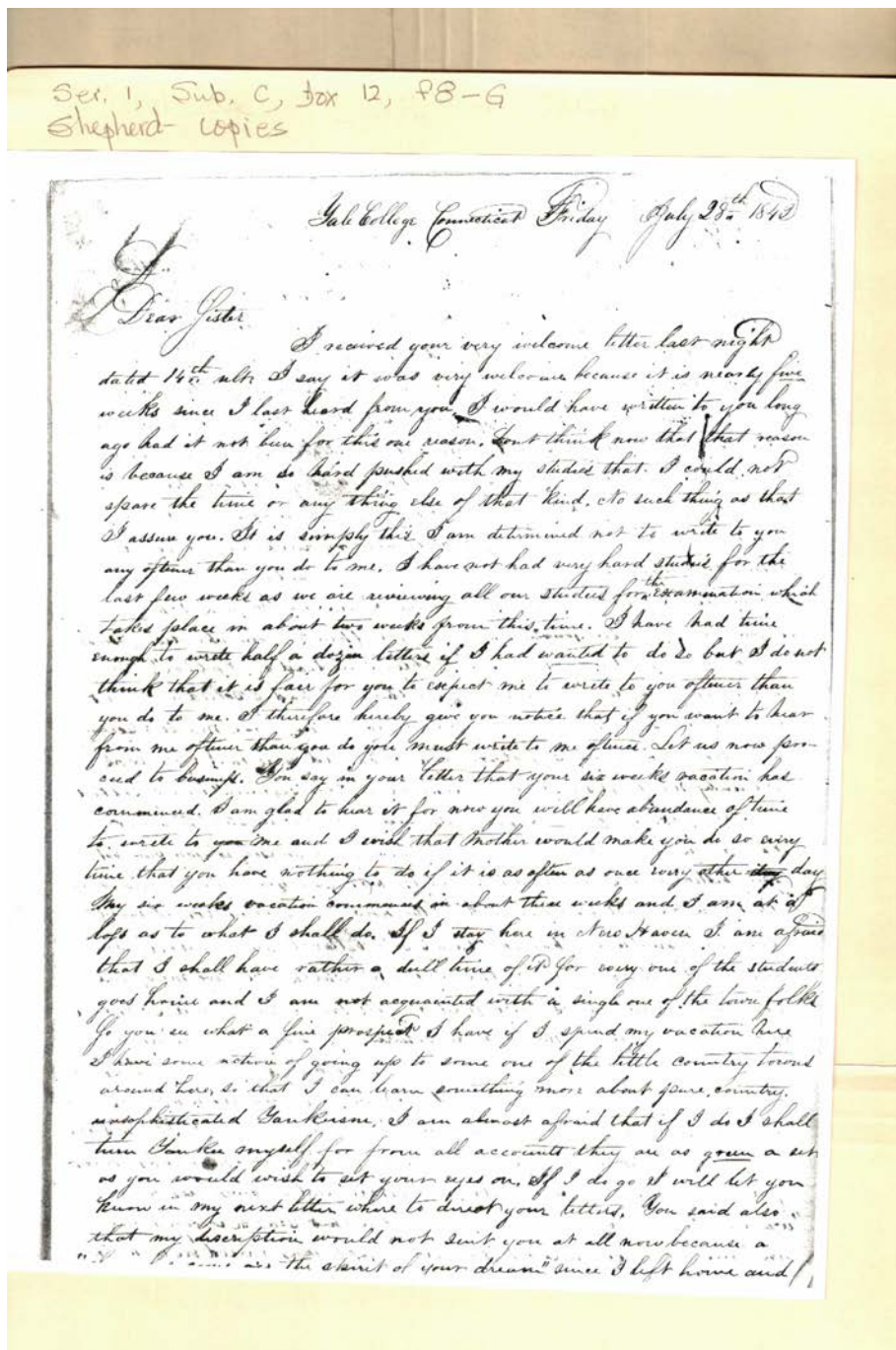

that instead of sitting around the fire of an evening as we did when I was
there you now are out at lecture or private or something of the sort: very
nearly every week. I recollect very well that it was very seldom that we
used to go out to such things in "bygone days" and I am glad to hear
that it is not the case now. I consider that a sufficient proof that
"Change and Reform is the watchword of the present day." I should like
to be at home now to attend some of your concerts myself although I go
to one about every other night here and I might go often only I
am too lazy always to get my lesson before coming for the next
morning and so I have to stay at home and get it in the evening

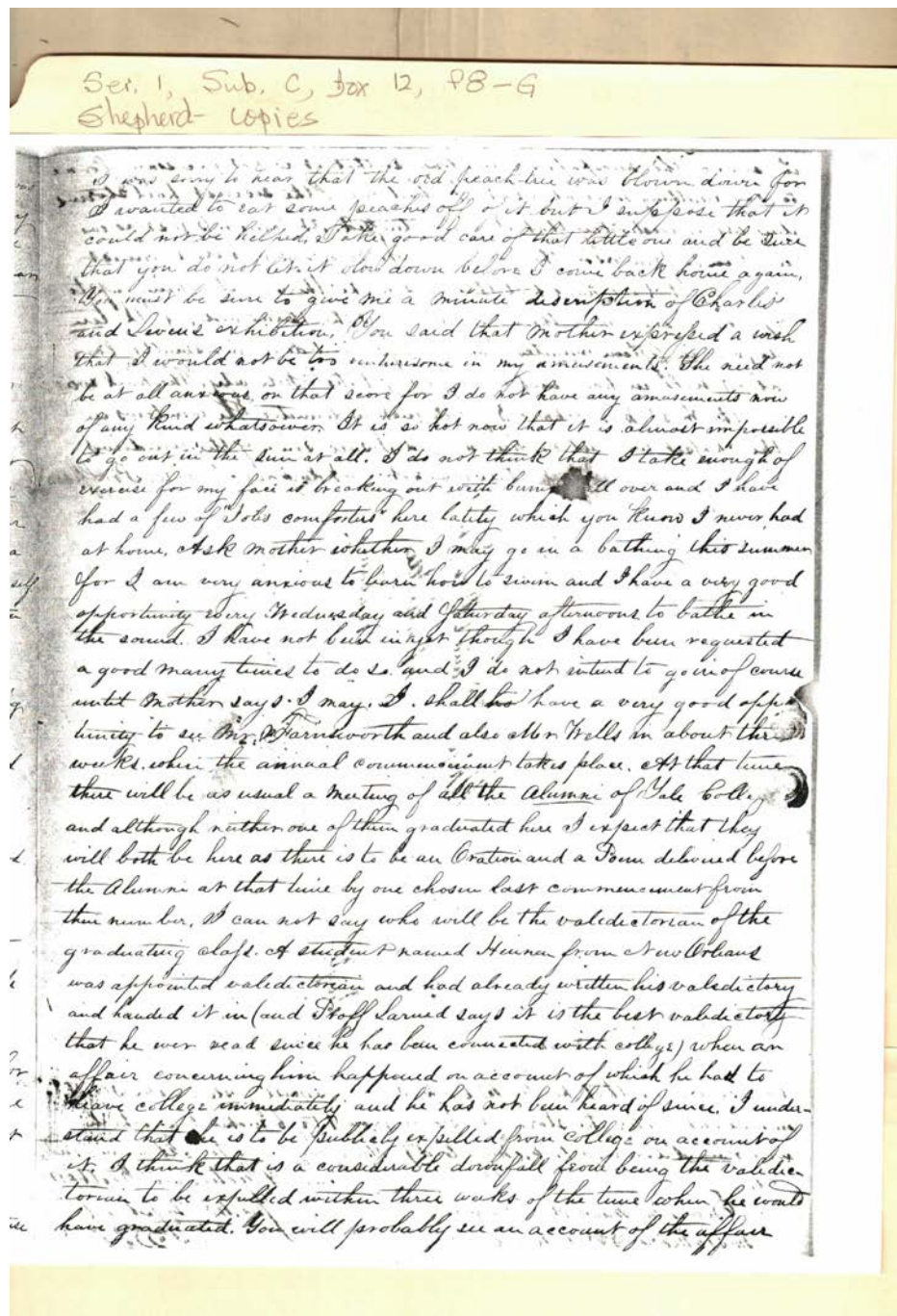

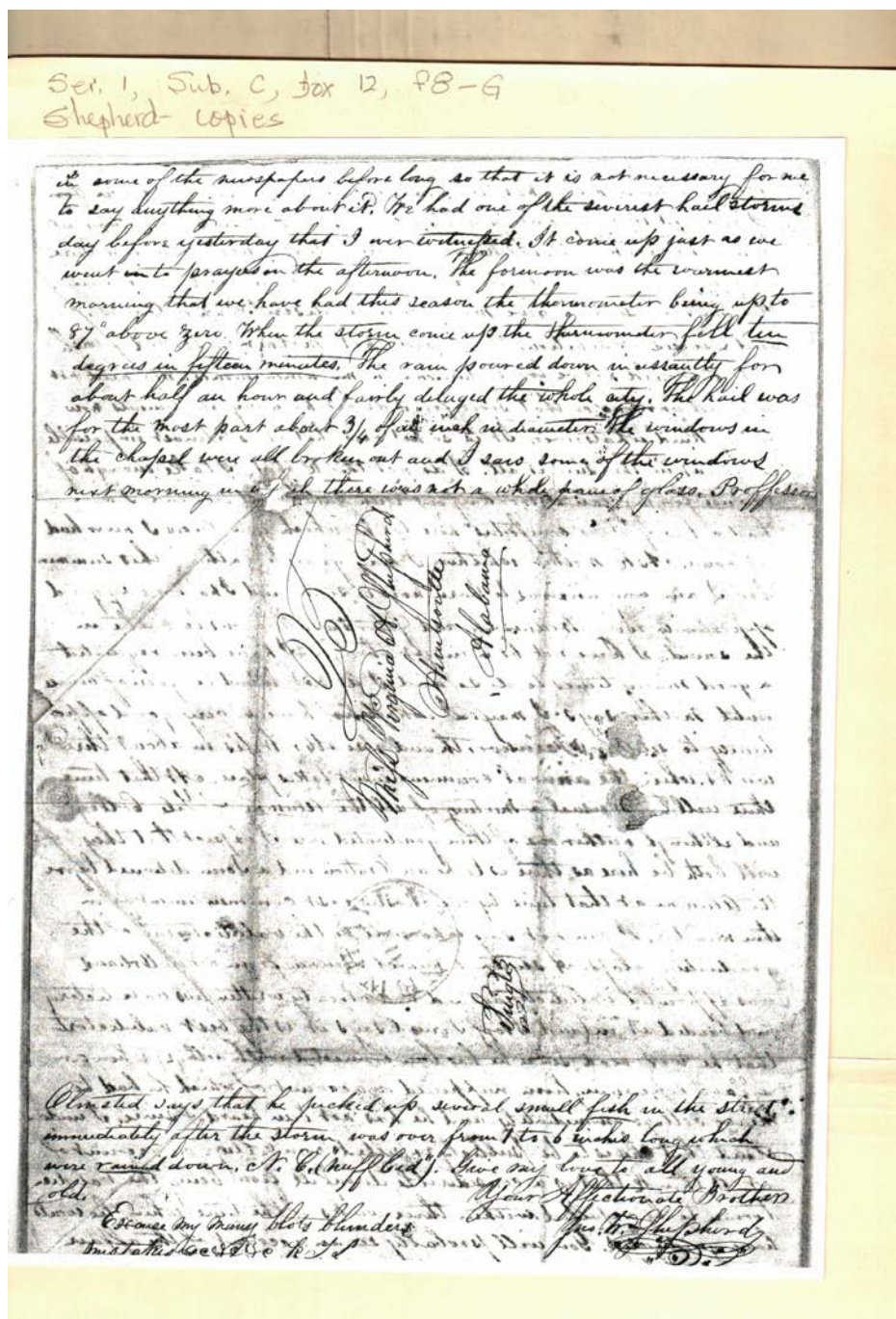
