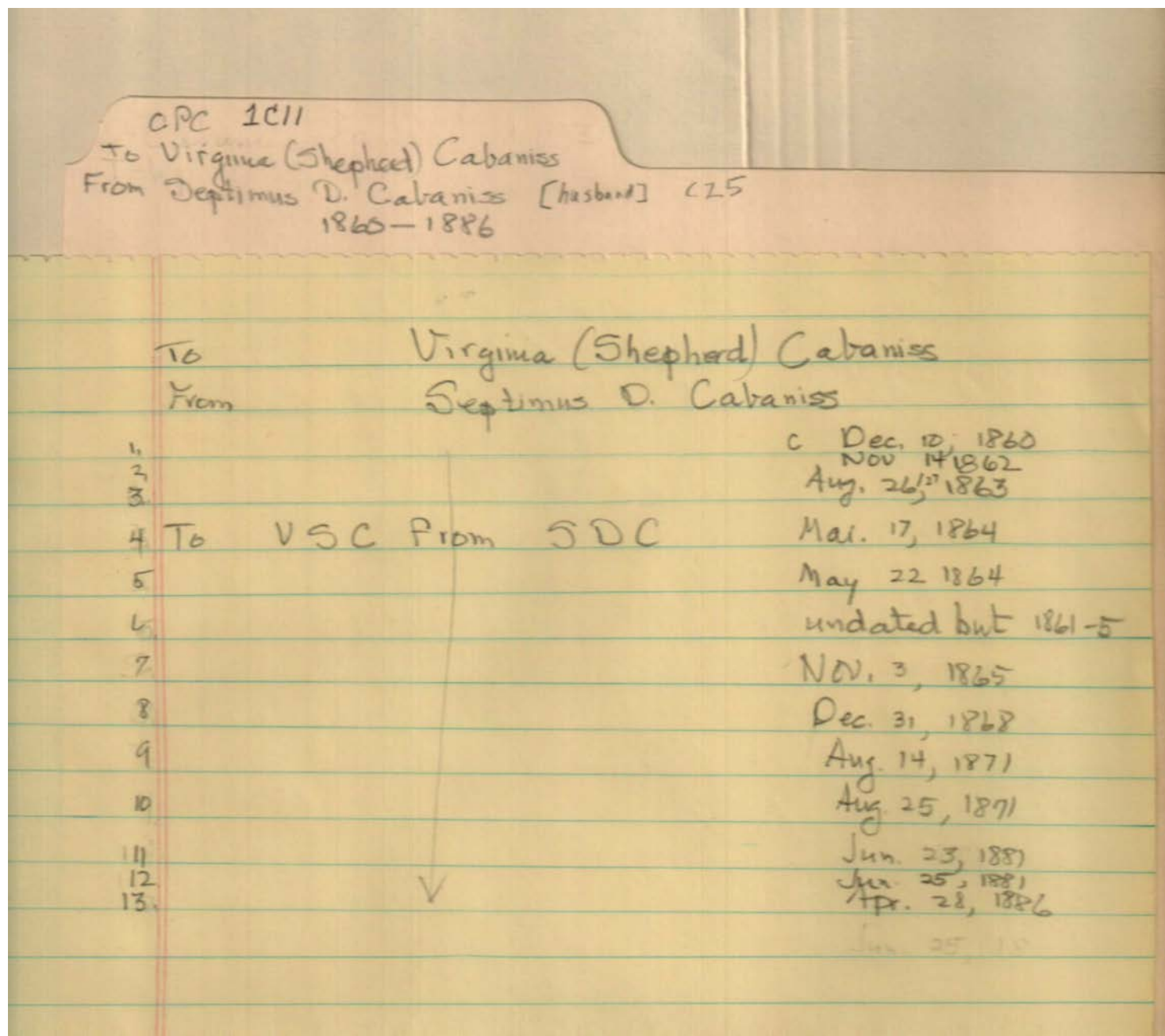

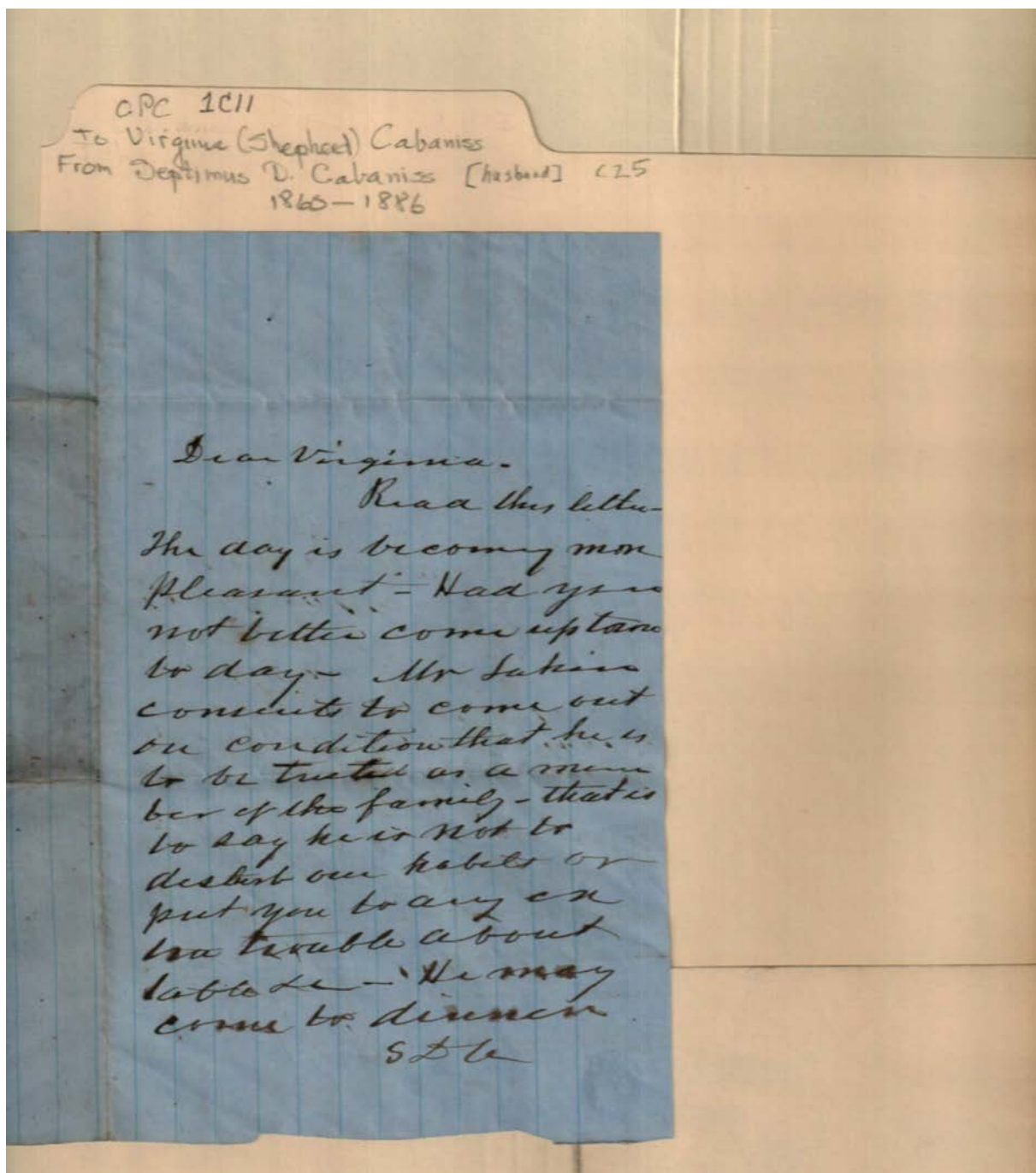

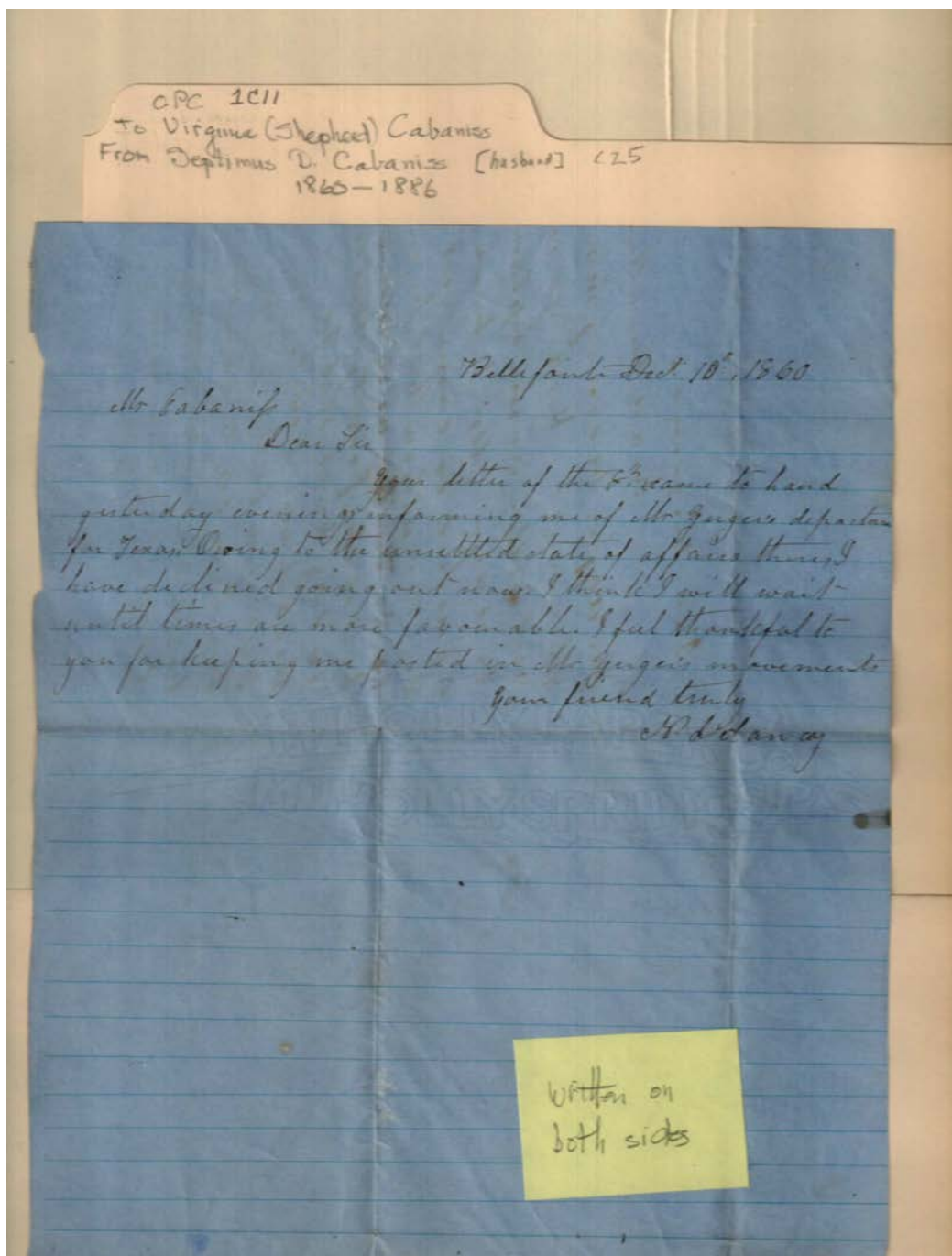

Dear Virginia-

Judge Hammond speaks of starting home tomorrow, and having no confidence in the mails I have concluded to write by him - I have had but one communication from you since I left home & that was brought by Hammond - To day I rec'd a letter from Mr. Cruse dated the 5th, and yesterday or day before I had one from Ferguson dated the 1st - This constitutes all that I have heard from Huntsville except a dispatch from Donegan which was rec'd on these days evening - I know that you will say, why could not Mr. Cabaniss come home as well as Hammond. The only answer which I can give is, that having undertaken to discharge this unpleasant trust, my sense of duty & propriety impels me to endeavor to prove faithful to my undertaking - I feel unwilling to desert my post, until there shall seem to be an absolute necessity for it - I incline to the belief that Genl Bragg will not have his position weakened so long as long as it can be done, and I trust that he can do so.

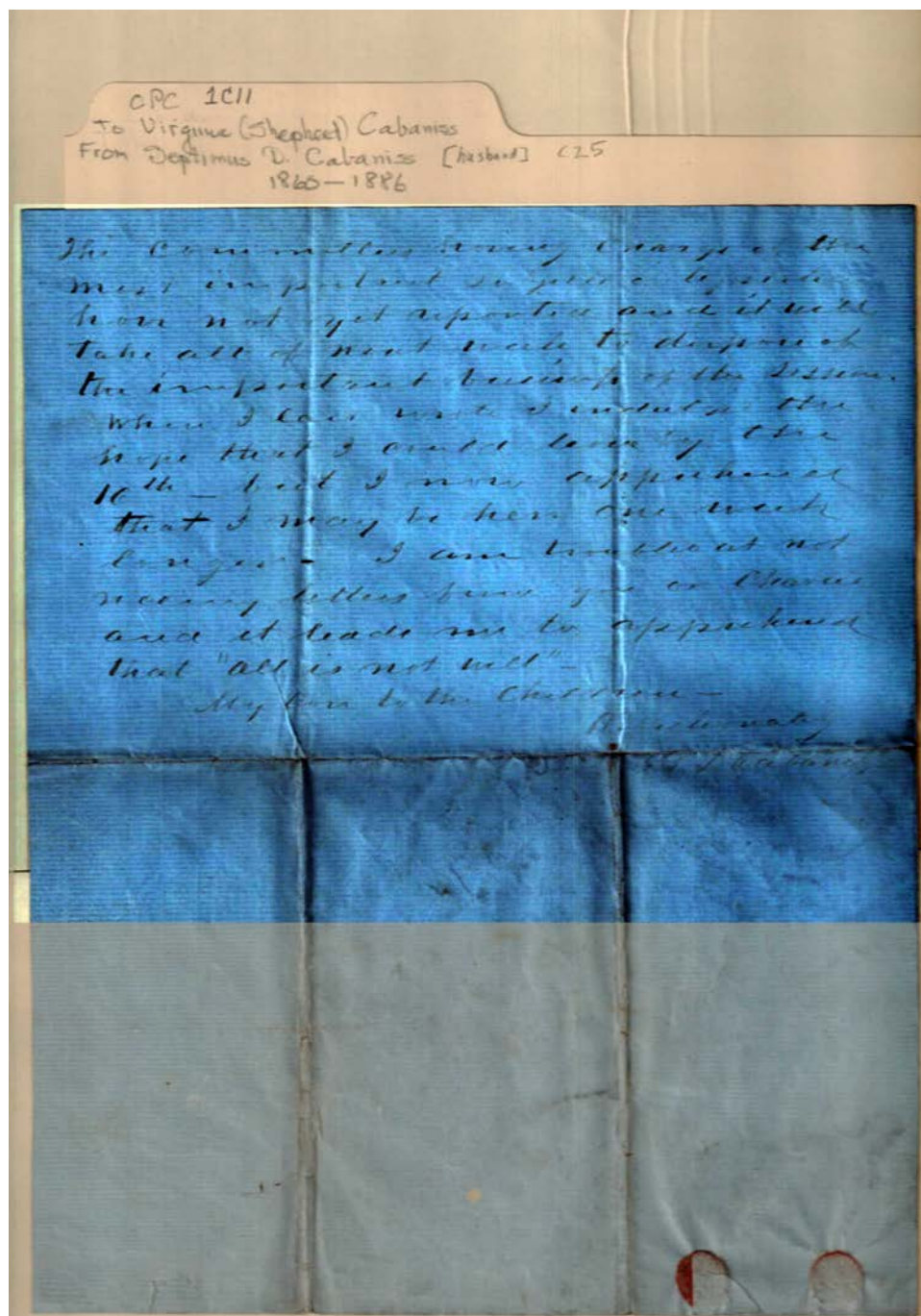

I wrote you a very long letter yesterday, which I sent to Whiteburg this morning. It was not all written at one sitting & may have been interrupted during its progress - I did not I believe say all that it was my purpose to say on only except for some of the difficulties of subsistence ~~in the~~ - I intended to say that whilst it was difficult to get any thing on the mountains & people would ask high prices in the valley when you are considering ~~it~~ that I would apprehend no difficulty in getting corn in the valley (for the pea crop is very abundant) and that I could buy a cow & would not doubt be able to buy beef - but that it would be exceedingly difficult to buy pork or bacon - But with Bank notes & sugar, we would have as good a chance as any one else & a better chance than most families to get subsistence. We have got four hams untouched - The other

as there was no brown or Graham bread
here - After supper which was at 6 P.M.

spent a night - Butts had gone to Sophia

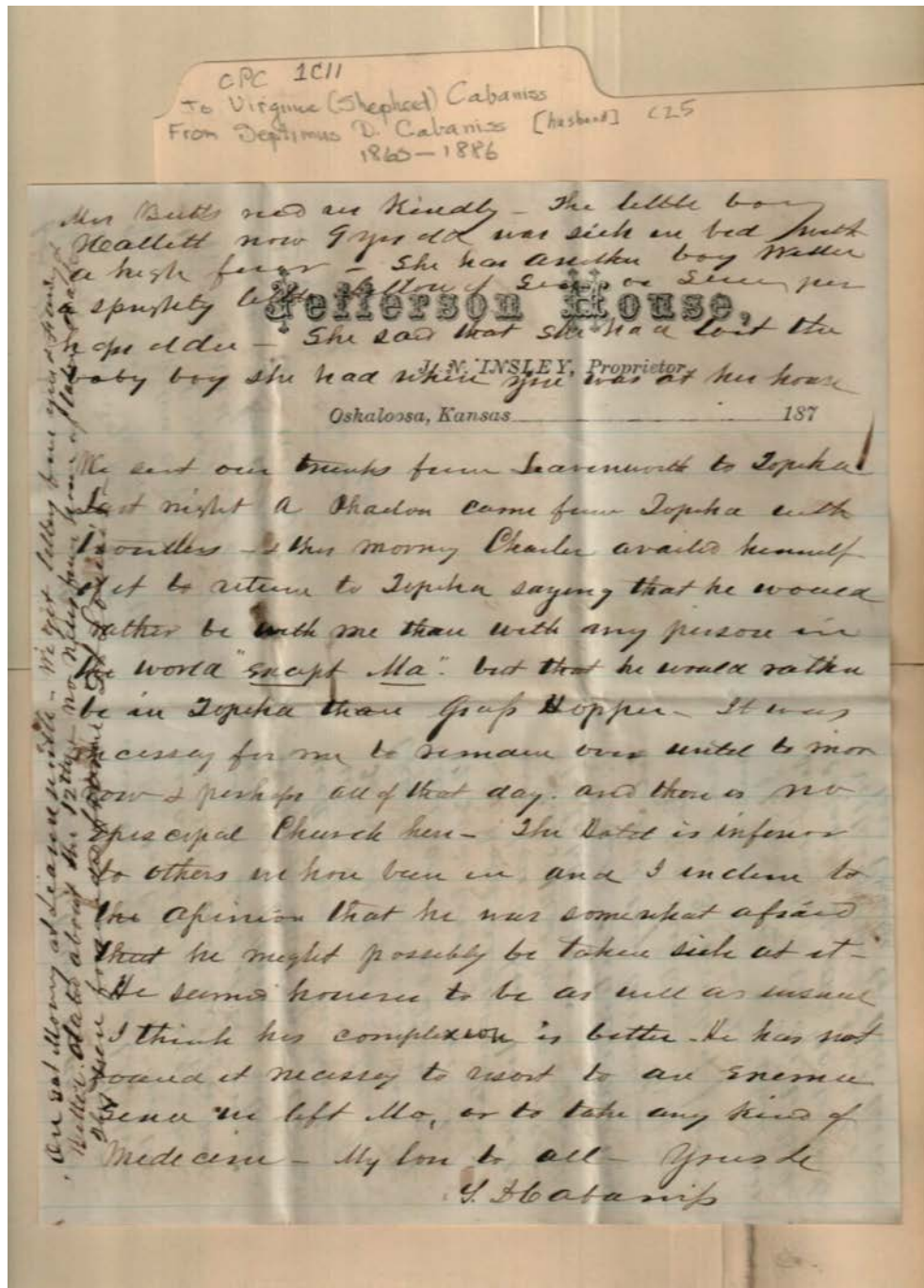

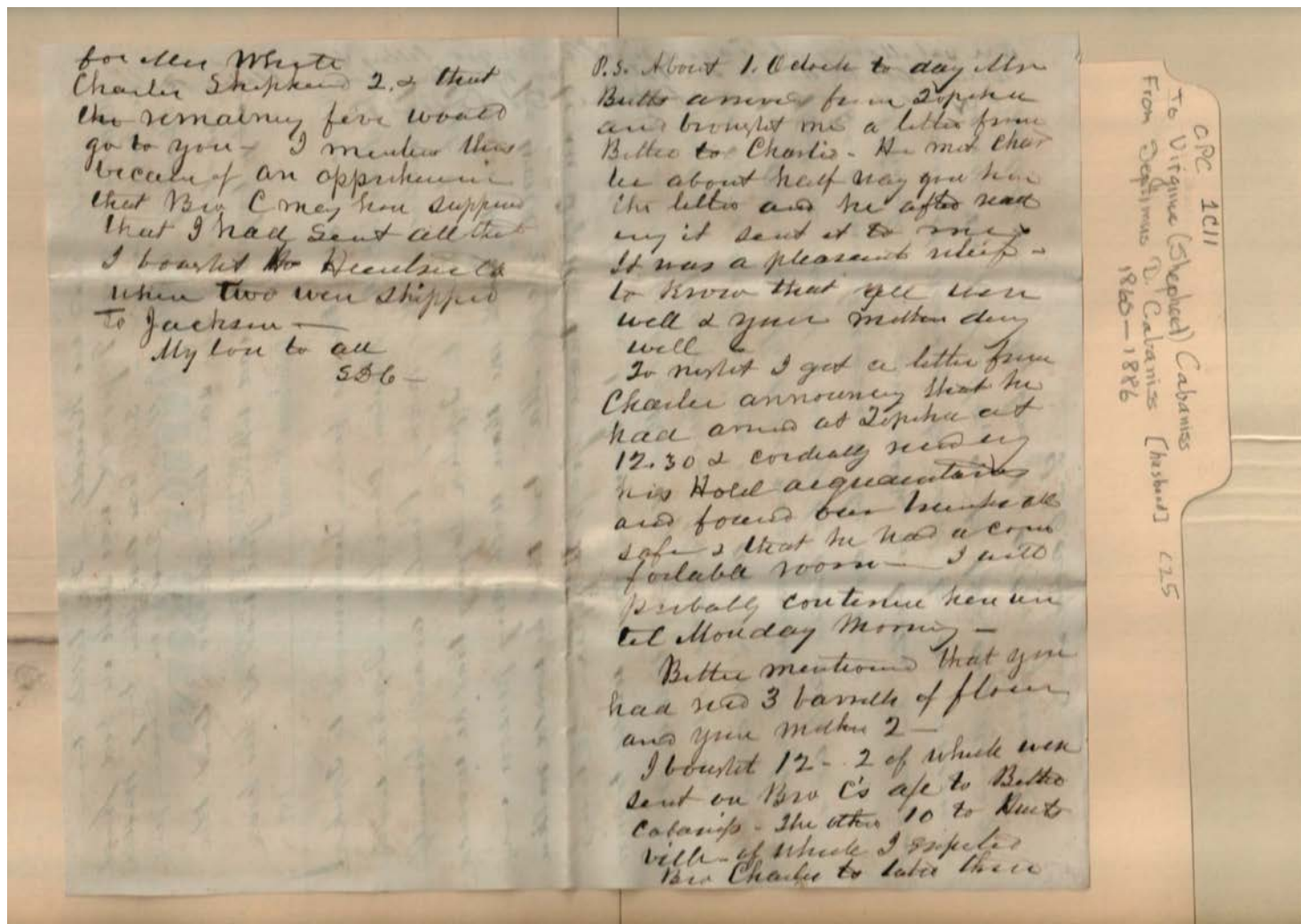

Dear Virginia -

I write to you on Friday or Thursday last and to Charles on Saturday. On Sunday Fanny had a letter from C. 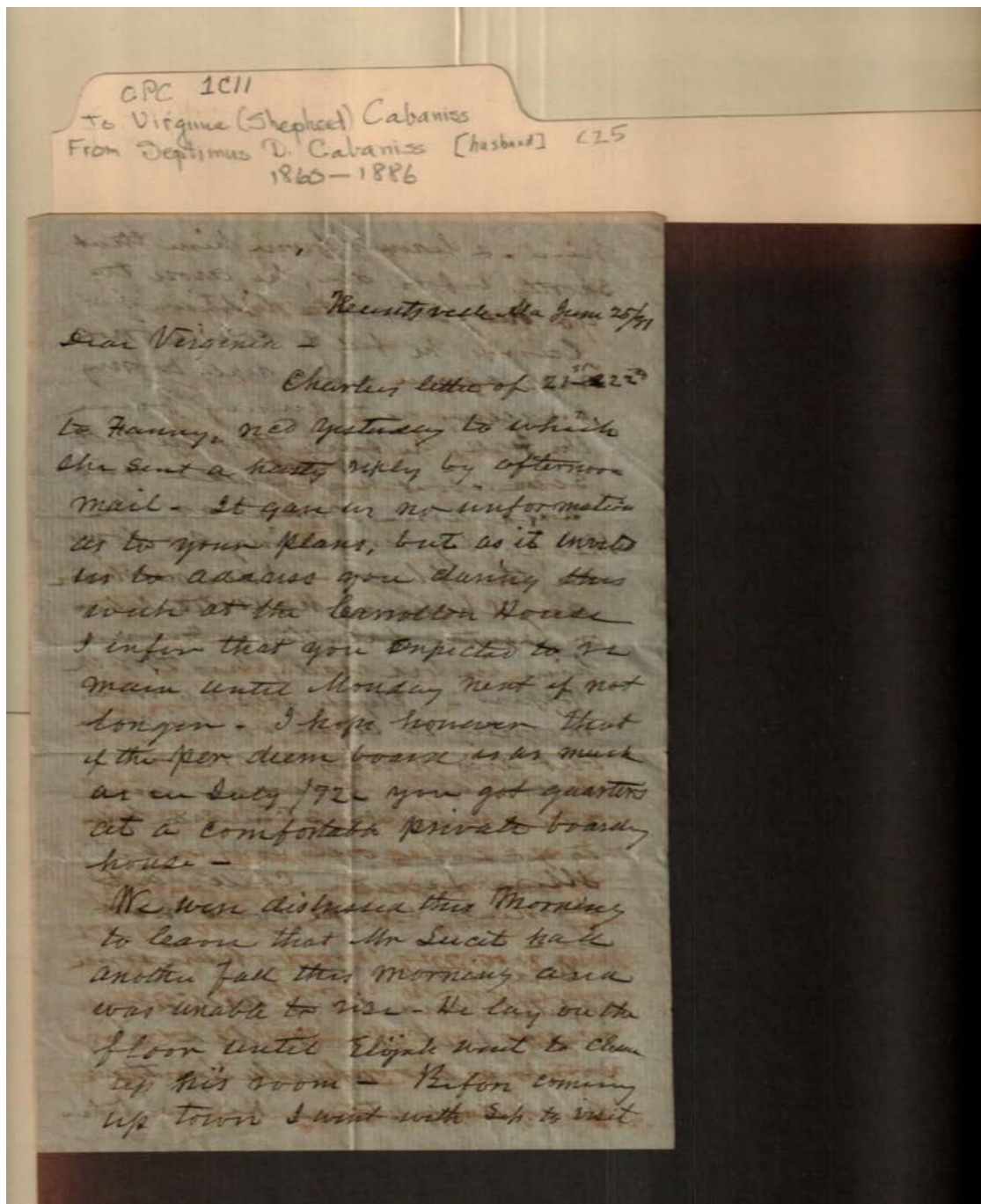

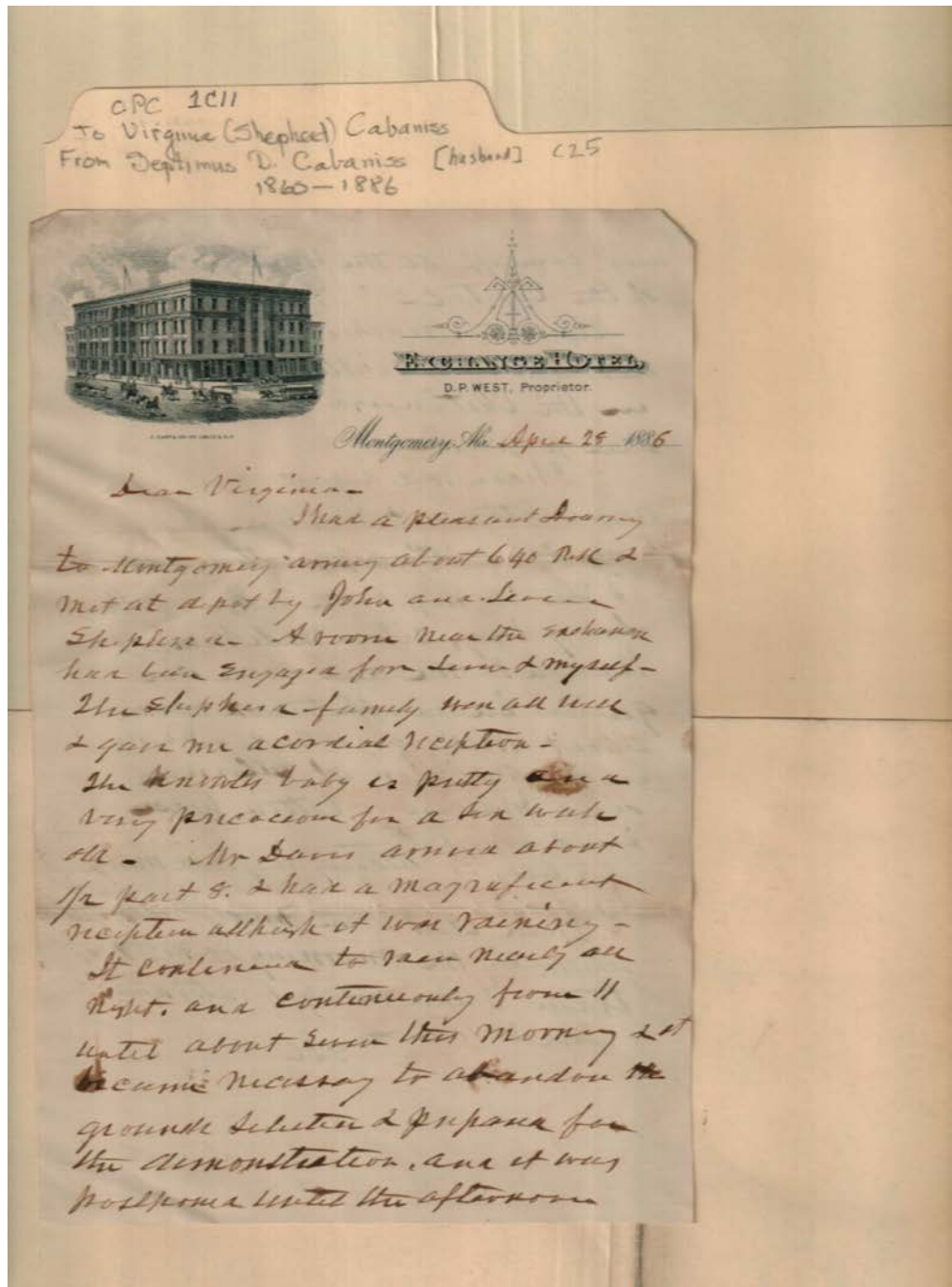

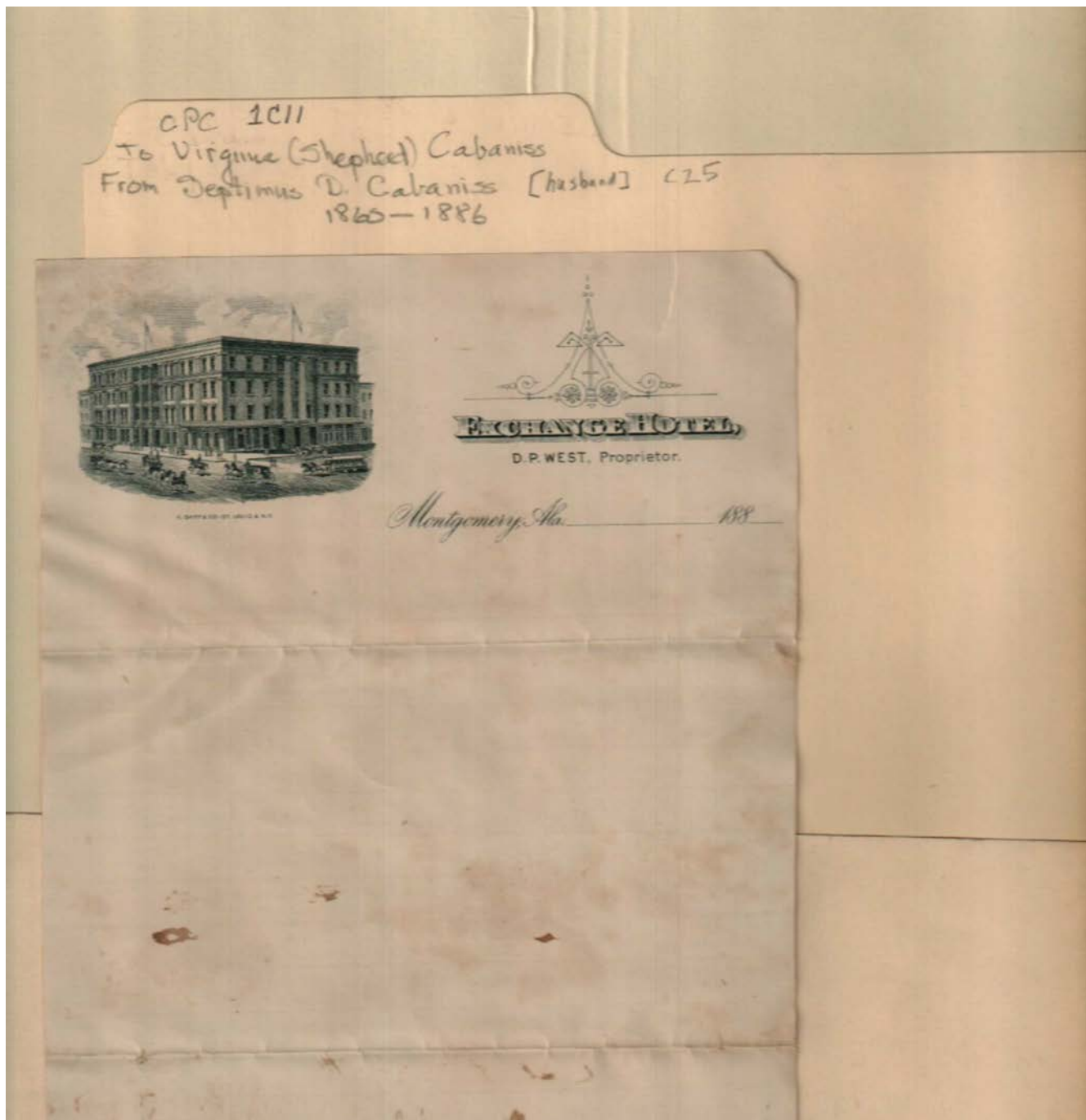
