On Sunday last being prevented by infirmity
and inclement weather from attending Church
I read in the Intelligence of the 14th Br. of the
debate in the Senate on the 3rd of the Supple-
mentary Reconstruction Act, in which
in reply to a threat from Mr. Perry who threatened
him for his unwillingness to support all the measures
of Reconstruction of the policy for the first, in
opposition to his own conclusion as to its
Constitutionality - he justified his violation of
the Constitution, on the ground, that "he
was convinced that that measure was better
calculated than any other likely to be
introduced, to bring peace to the South
and that it would be the first measure
in the subject" and that "he thought no
Senator had a right to stand upon his own
conviction of Constitutional duty when
such a course would result in still
greater injury to the country" - and he adds
that he would vote for the measures now
proposed if he could be morally convinced
that that good would result from them and
though he thought there were objections and
if possible more objectionable absolutely en-
countered with the Constitution than the confer-
