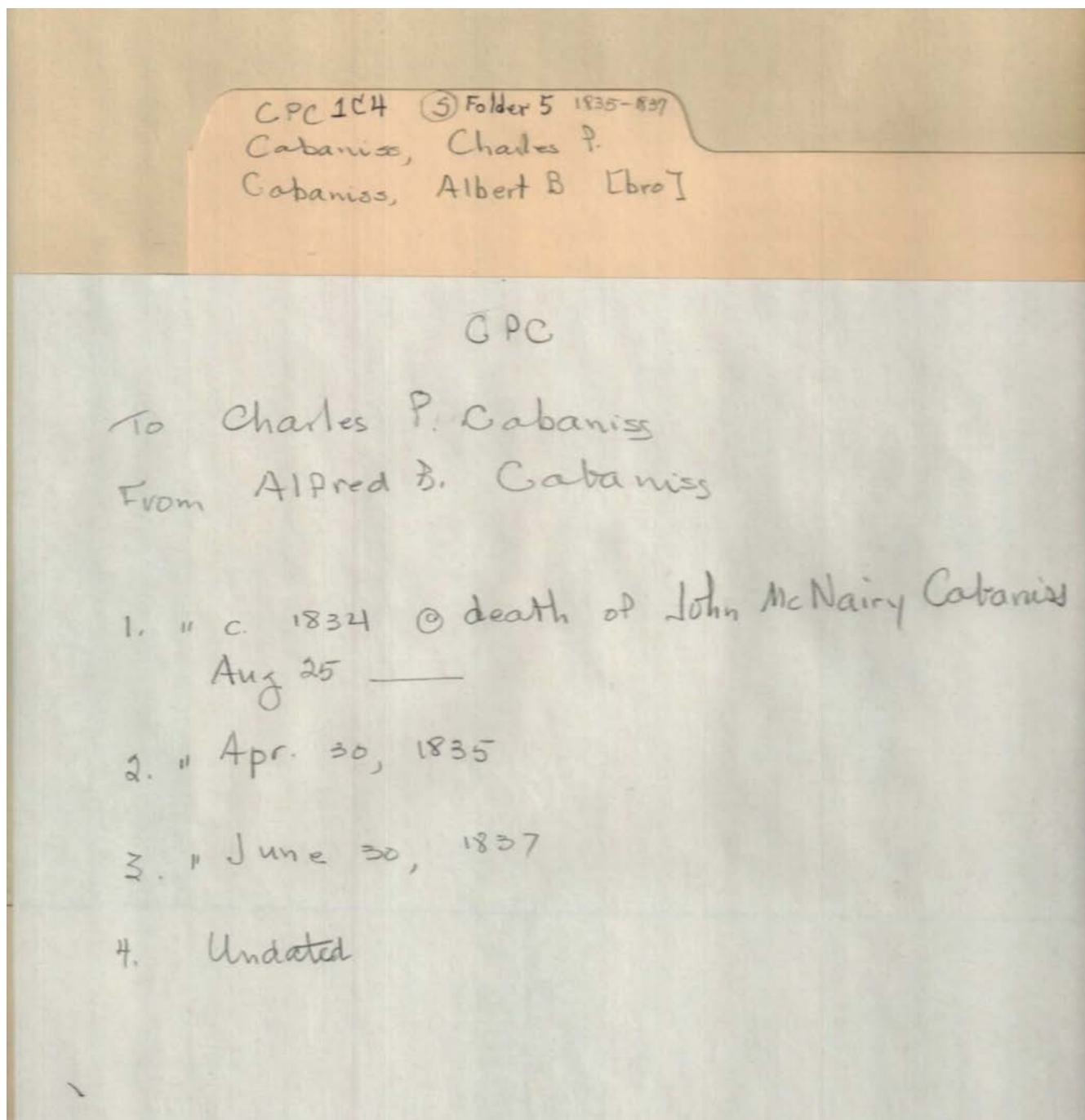

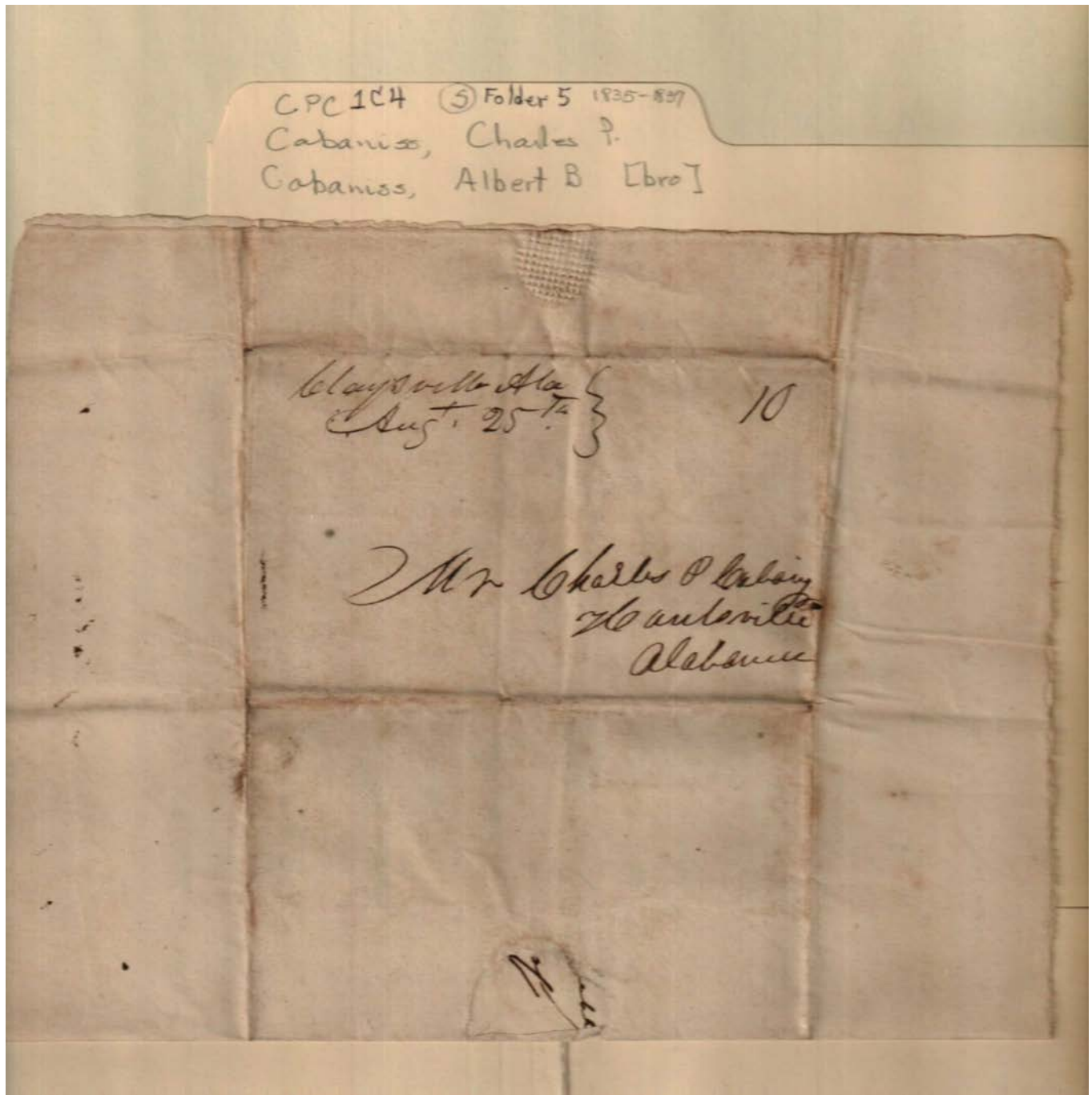

Dear Brother

I arrived here on the evening after I left Huntsville and found brother Mico much worse than I had reason to expect, from the account which Mrs Baird gave me. Indeed he became worse ^{after} ~~from~~ the time Baird left. He continued to grow worse until this morning, since which time the symptoms have seemed decidedly favourable. His case is ~~undoubtedly~~ of a congestive form - and until this evening has appeared a very dangerous one - I might say hopeless - I fell very much flattered this evening that he will now recover.

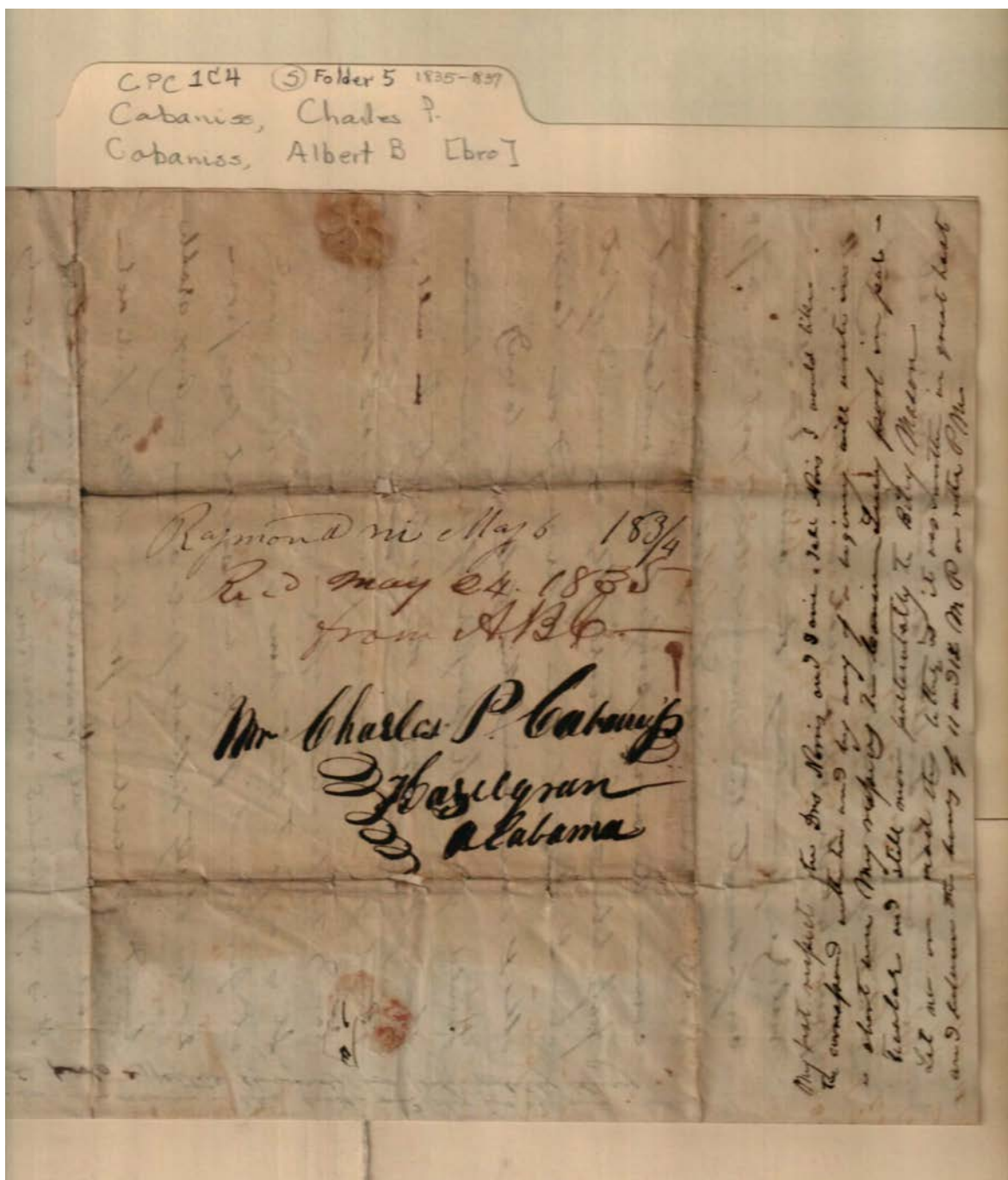

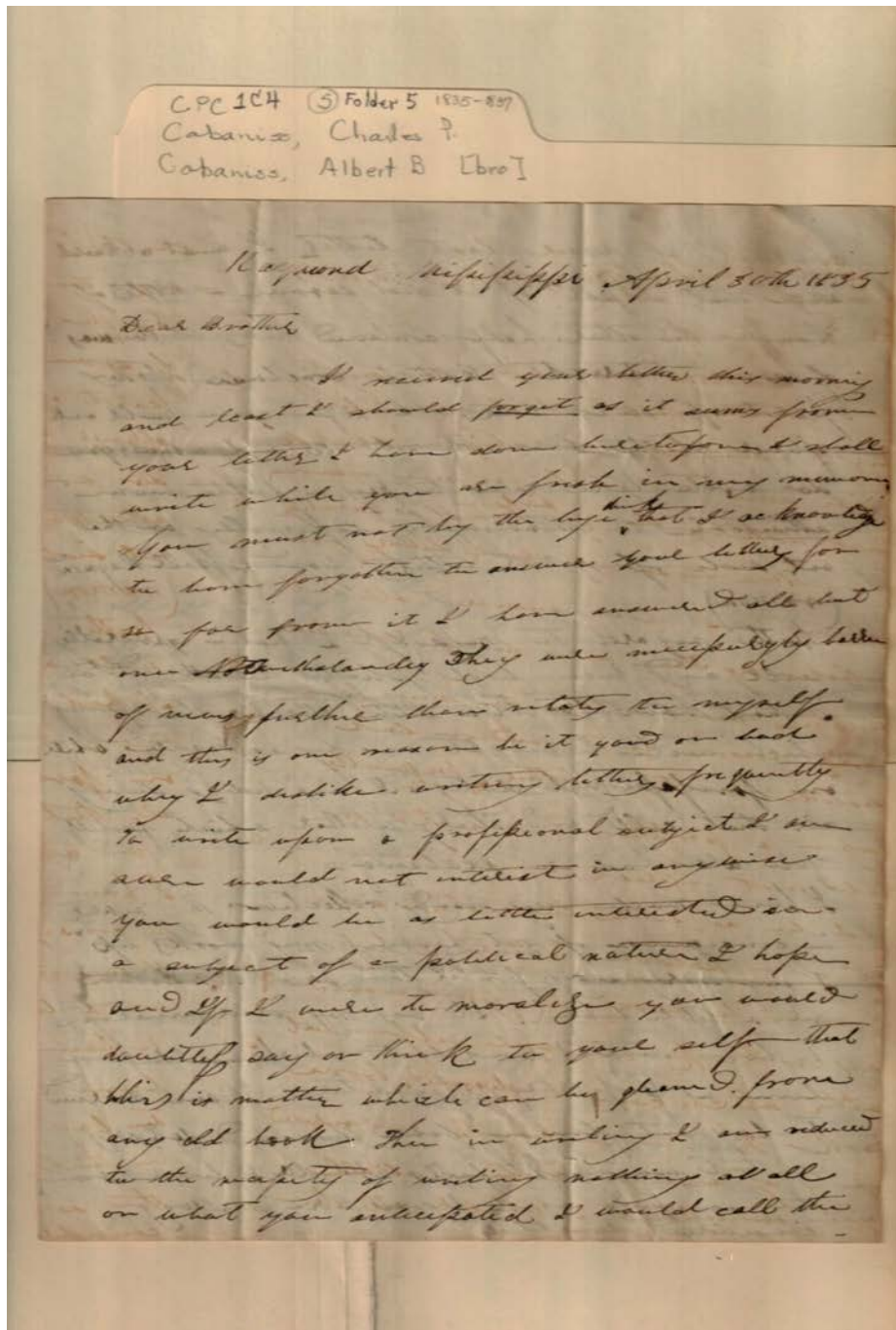

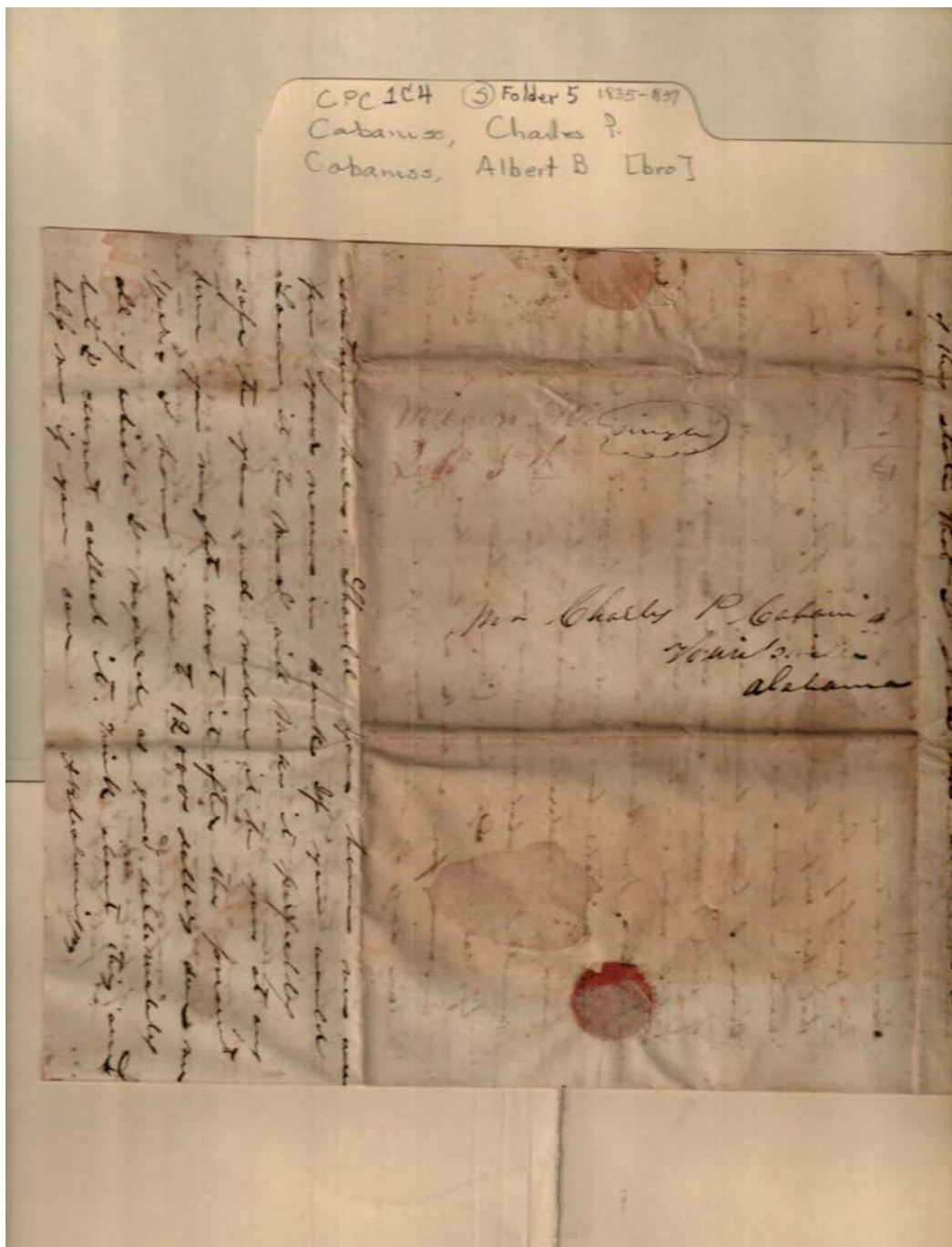

Dear Charles,

Yours of the 2nd was received yesterday and I hasten to answer it. You complained that my last was hasty and unsatisfactory and insisted that I should commence my next 'earlier' than I might have time to be more explicit. I have accordingly commenced two hours before day and if Wm should continue to sleep soundly, I trust that before the dawn I shall have replied to all of your queries. From the date of my last Wm continued to improve slowly until the 13th when there was a change in the weather and he ~~continued~~ to decline again, and on the night of the 20th he had become so bad that we did not think that he could survive until morning. For four or five days we were under continual apprehensions of his death, and he too seemed to have given up all hope, though he had previously been very sanguine in his hopes of recovery. On yesterday there was a change for the better and I have some hope that he will commence improving again. On Tuesday Dr. Wat. Vaughan told me that there was no chance of his recovery and that he thought it scarcely possible for him to live a week longer. He has not slept any for six weeks and his strength is not only bad, but it is a broad complaint which has come so near killing him. He has had an affection of the bowels for five months, and every remedy that could be devised has been resorted to without effect. Within the last two or three days his exertions have become so frequent and in consequence of this, it is, I presume, that he has improved. I don't think it right to speak of doing when I don't expect, and

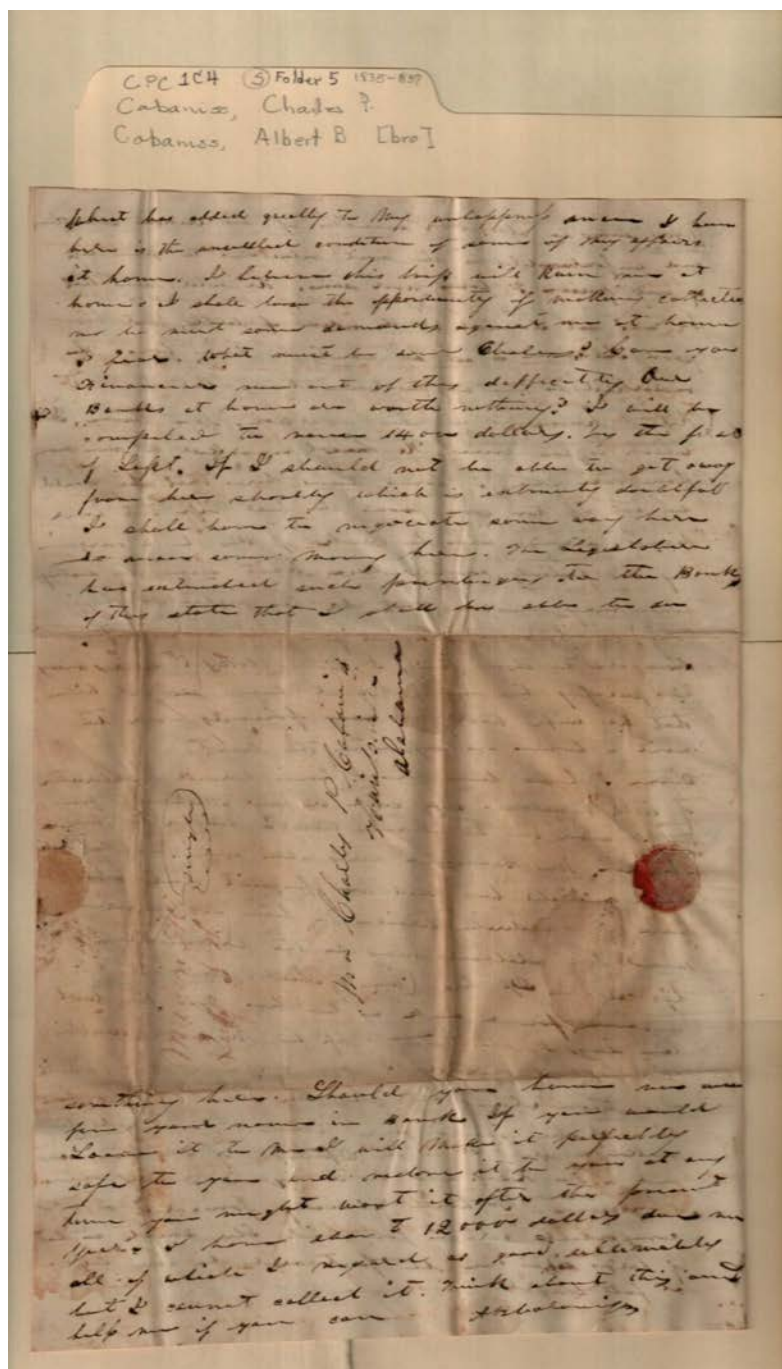

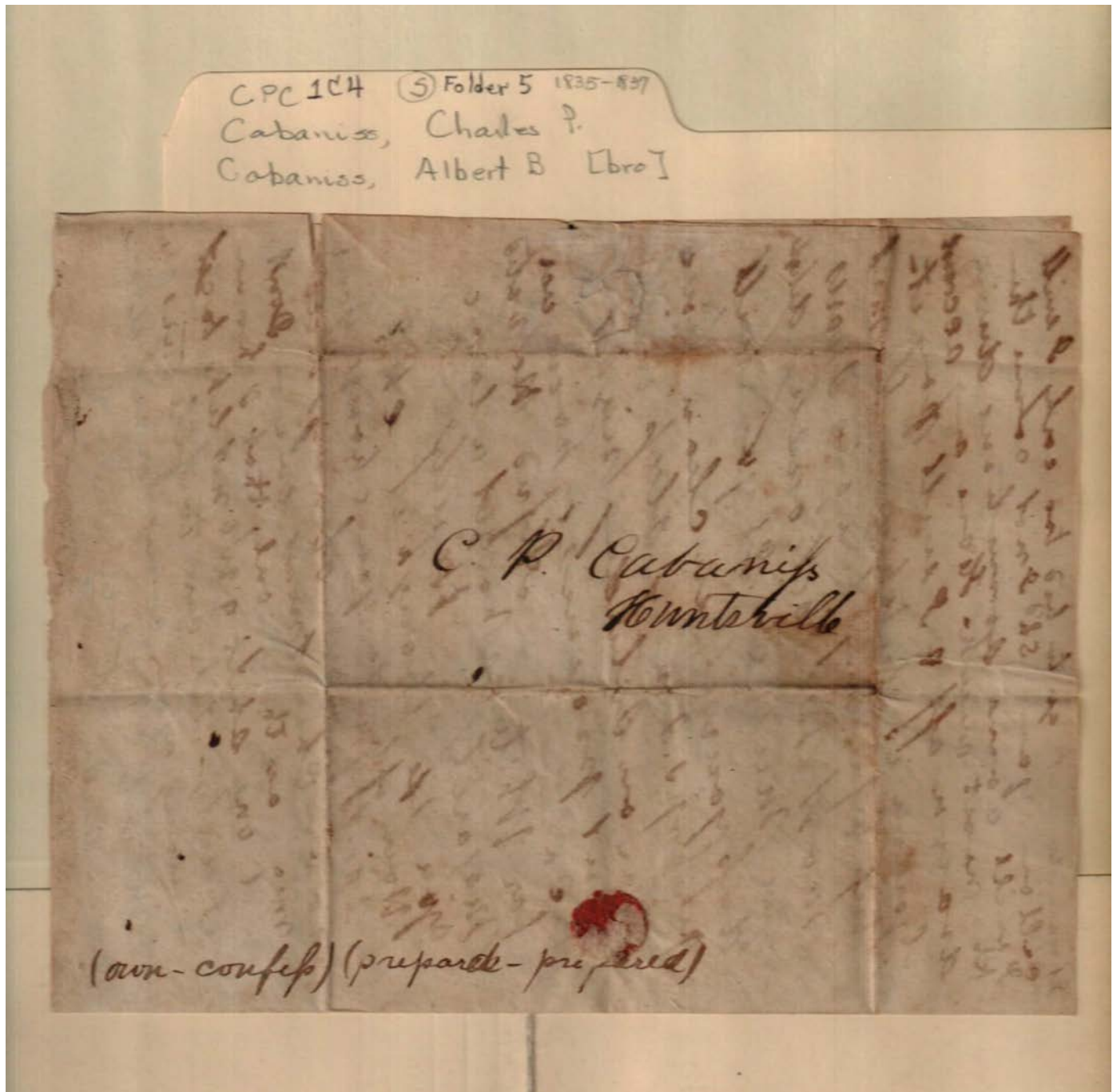

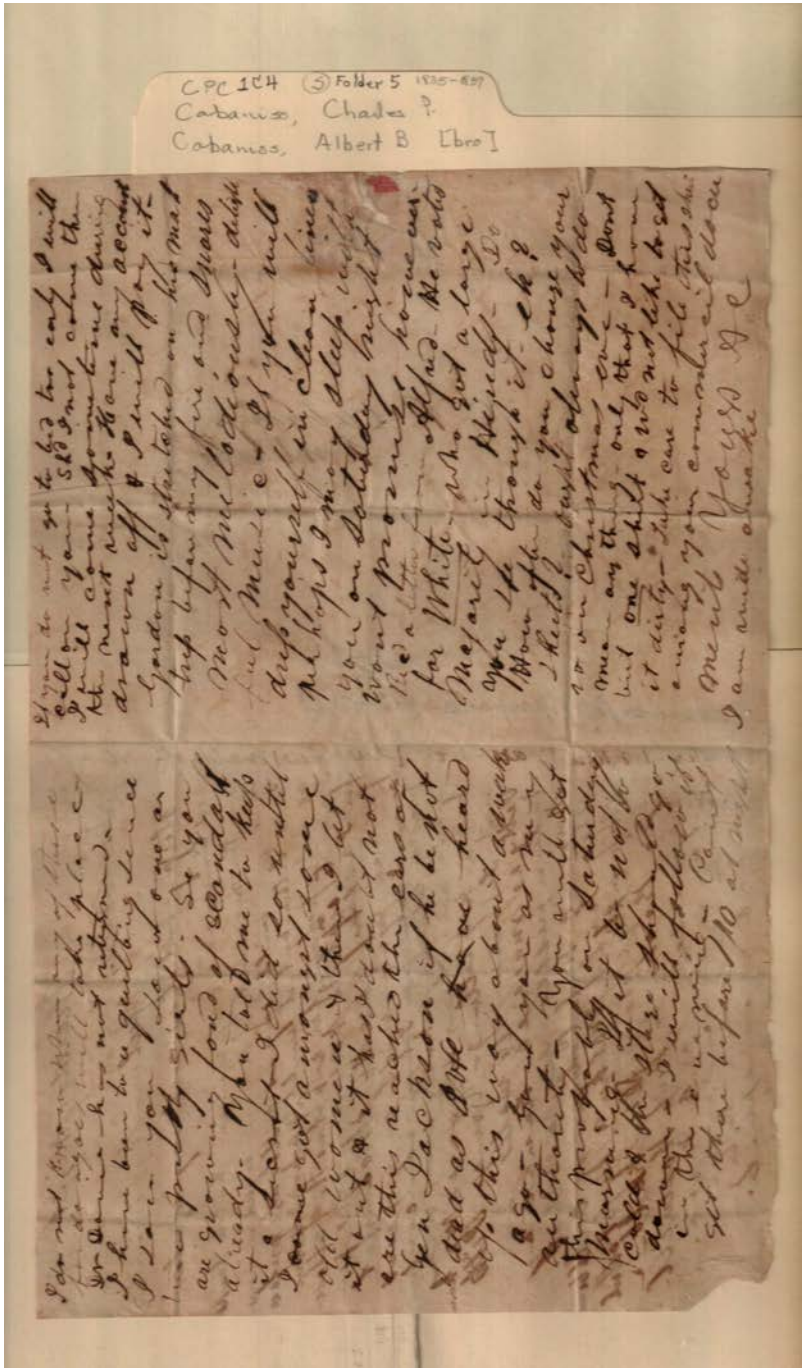
