Brooklyn's Bedford-Stuyvesant area, which has a predominantly Negro population, public school 258 incurred the wrath of the Jewish controlled NAACP!

P.S. 258, a new junior high school with 1,500 Negro students and less than 5 or 6 white students was not integrated enough to sult the NAACP.

The white families, trying to protect their children had moved out of the neighborhood as fast as the Negro families had moved in, thus making the Bedford-
