

410 Histon 4A19 public land office was moved from Mashville to Huntsville in 1811, a newspaper was established a year later, and mumerous stores were built around the Public Square. Soon after came the organization of a public school, a bank, a library, the first Masonic Lodge in Alabama, the first organized Presbyterian Church in the state, and what is believed to have been the first water system in the South. By 1819, Huntaville had become so important in the territory that it was chosen as the convention city where Alabama's first constitution was drafted. The first governor of the state of Alabama was inaugurated here on November 9, 1819, and in this city, the state legislature held its initial session. Runtsville produced many of the early political leaders of the state. The president of the First Constitutional. Convention, many governors, United States Senators, and representatives were all statesmen of Huntsville and Madison County. As an educational center, Huntsville boasted of its Green Academy for boys, the Huntsville Female College and many other private schools as being the best in the state. Not only did the city grow prosperous as a commercial center of a rich agricultural area, but it also drew some of its wealth from the manufacture of cotton goods, flour, shoes, lumber, copper stills, pumps, and various other products of early times. Transportation for Huntsville kept pace with the early development of the area. The Indian Creek Canal connected the "Big Spring" Creek with the Tennessee River by way of THEFT

Indian Greed. Flint and Faint Rock Rivers were developed for transportation of cotton barges to the Tennessee. Toll roads were constructed and many stage coach lines connected Runtsville with other parts of the South. In 1851, the city government of Runtsville aided in financing the construction of a division of the Nemphis and Charleston Railroad which greatly improved transportation facilities of the County.

During the War Between the States Hantsville suffered considerable damage while it was occupied by federal troops, At the end of the war, the whole area was in a weakened financial condition, but Huntsville's merohants and farmers worked hard to revive the economic activity of the city. The National Bank of Huntsville was organized, largely with the use of northern capital, in the fall of 1865. With such a stable credit facility, businesses were gradually reorganized, and as soon as Madison County's rich farm lands were put into cultivation again, Huntsville began to prosper.

During the 1880's and 1890's some of Huntsville's leaders encouraged business men from other sections of the country to aid them in the industrial and real estate development of the area. Textile mills, hardwood factories, and murseries were established, and Monte Sano became a thriving summer tourist resort. Further railroad expansion added to the city's accessibility to new markets. By 1900, Huntsville was considered to be one of the most thriving textile centers in the state. Though surrounded on three sides by mill villages, the city continued to maintain its set boundaries of about one mile radius from the Public Square.
