It possesses a most salubrious climate, a pure atmosphere, a fertile soil and the most palatable of waters. Its healthfulness is beyond dispute. The military post formerly at Huntsville in the war between the states, was reported to have been the healthiest in the United States, and this record was sustained during the late Spanish-American war, when 16,000 soldiers were stationed here for their health, hundreds of whom were brought here sick. The mean annual temperature is about 57 degrees Fahrenheit, that of the winter being 40 degrees Fahrenheit and that of the summer about 73 degrees Fahrenheit.

It will be ready for the amusement season of 1905-7.

Its ten mills have an invested capital of \$1,500,000, over two hundred thousand spindles, over five thousand looms, which consume annually over fifty thousand bales of cotton, much of the product being shipped direct to China. It also has cotton oil mills, saw mills, planing mills, brick yards, spoke and handle factories, fiber and veneer factory, broom factory, flouring mill, ice factory, foundry and machine works, fertilizer factories, bottling works, steam laundries, carriage and buggy factories, business college, six large fruit nurseries and many other

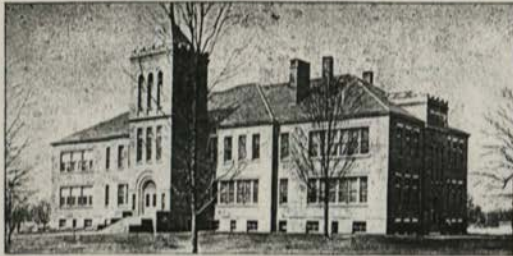
