OUR H.M.C. FEDERAL CREDIT UNION

The H.M.C. Federal Credit Union was established to provide the employees with a means to save money systematically and painlessly through payroll deduction plan, to afford a way to borrow money at a low rate of interest, and to promote thrift.

The Credit Union has been chartered and in business for slightly over two years. During the first year of operation the growth of the organization was steady, but not spectacular; however, this year the growth has been very pronounced; for example, the amount of money loaned has increased from \$82,412.14 in 1959 to \$144,490.00 in 1960, the membership has increased from 425 in 1959 to 771 in 1960, and the maximum loan limit has been raised from \$200.00 to \$250.00.

The Credit Union offers many advantages to its shareholders. All savings are insured by F.C.I.A. and Cuna Mutual Insurance. Share withdrawals and deposits can be made easily and conveniently. Loans can be made without a lot of red tape and the books are audited periodically by Federal representatives.

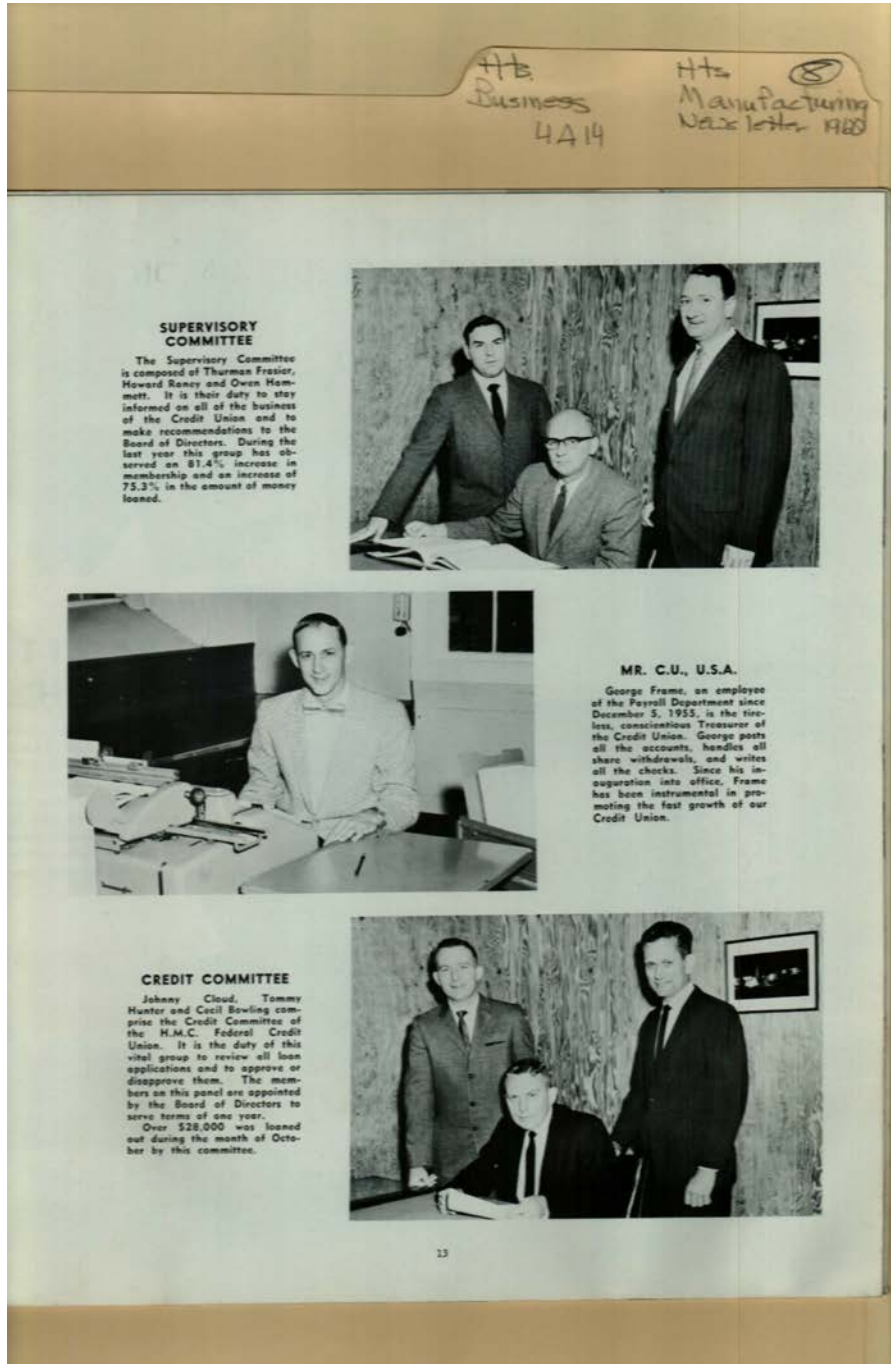

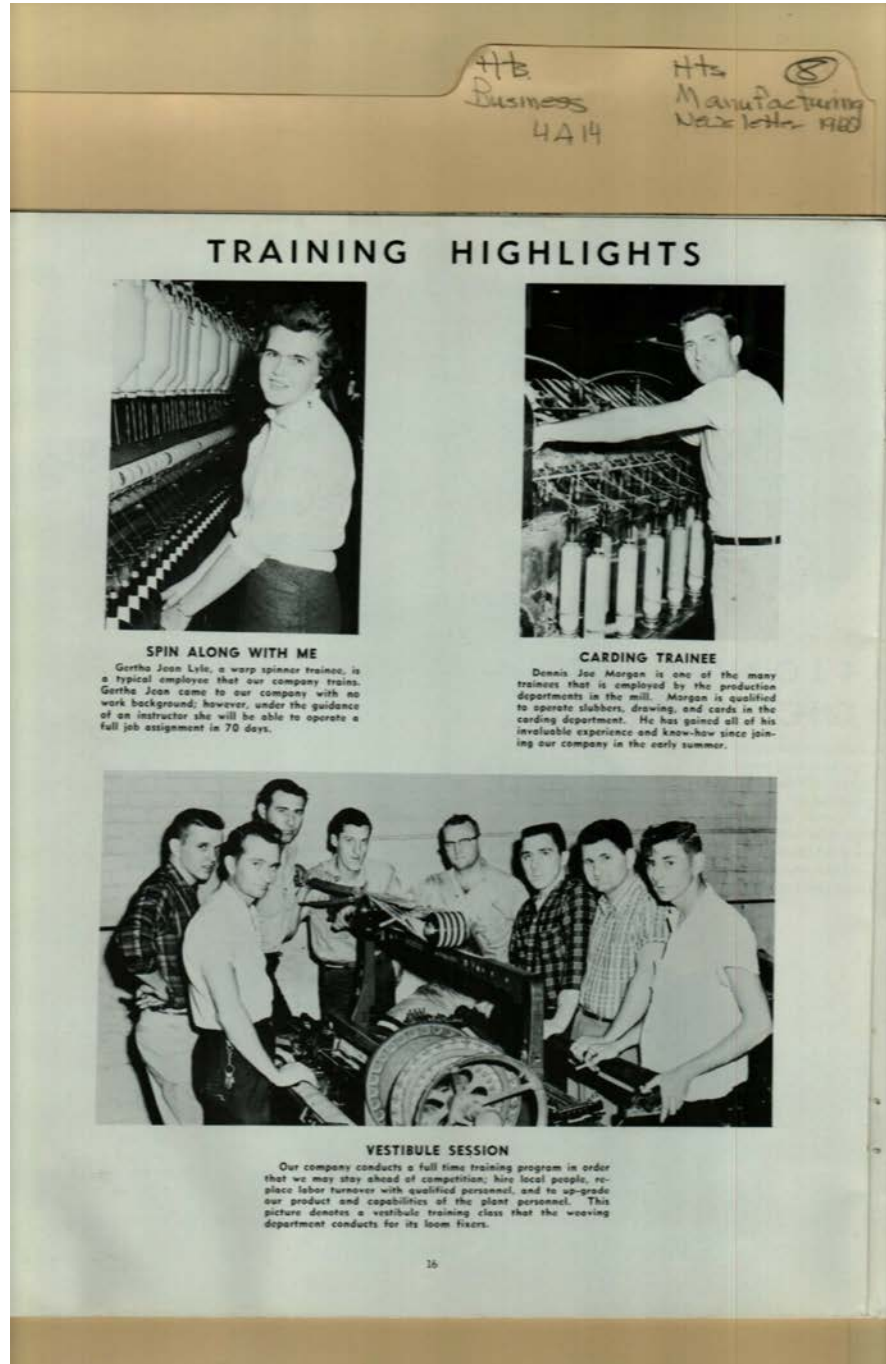

In the waning weeks of September, a tremendous response was given to the United Givers Fund campaign. Your overwhelming generosity swelled the 1960 contribution of \$15,077 to \$23,039 for 1961, a 52% increase.

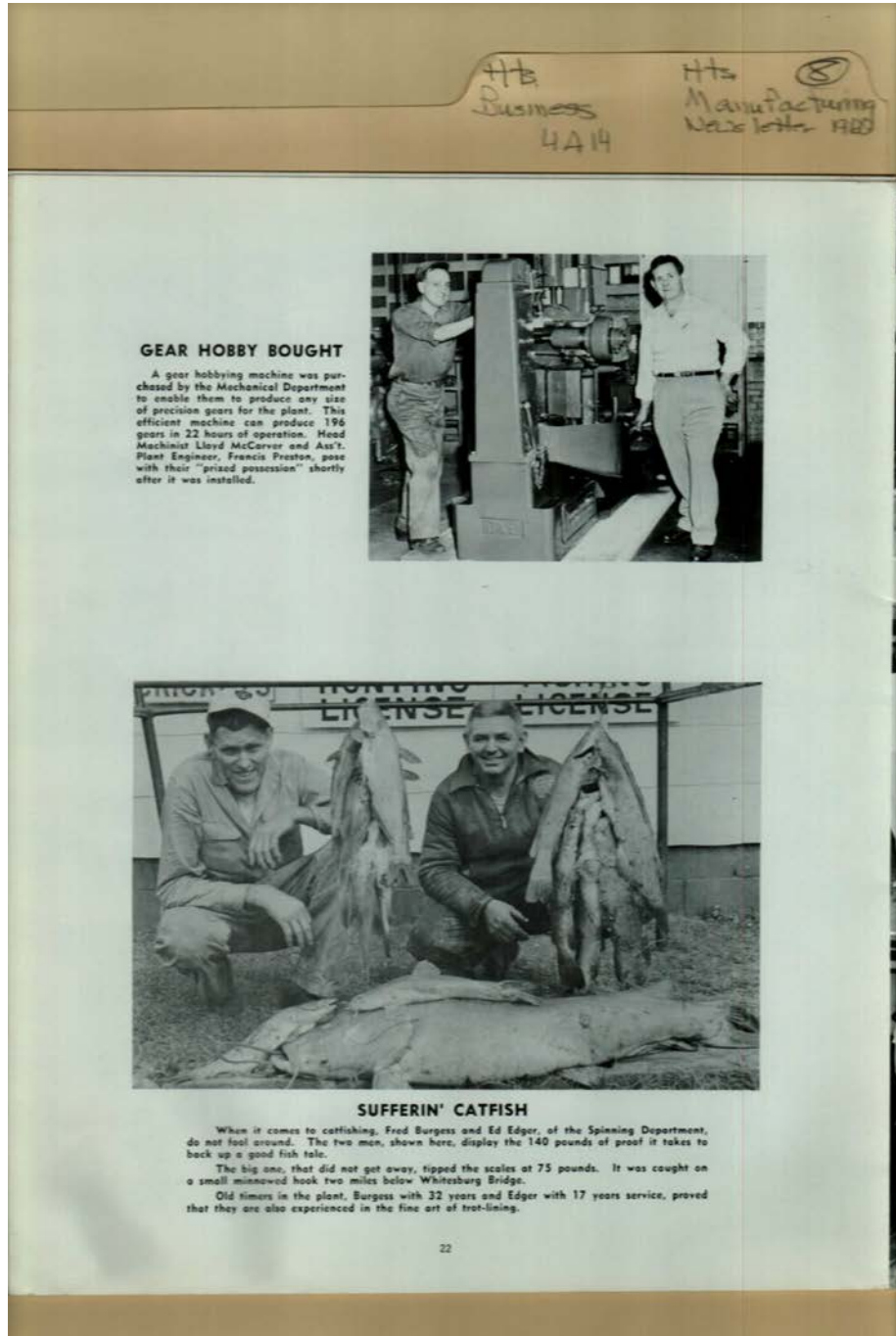
