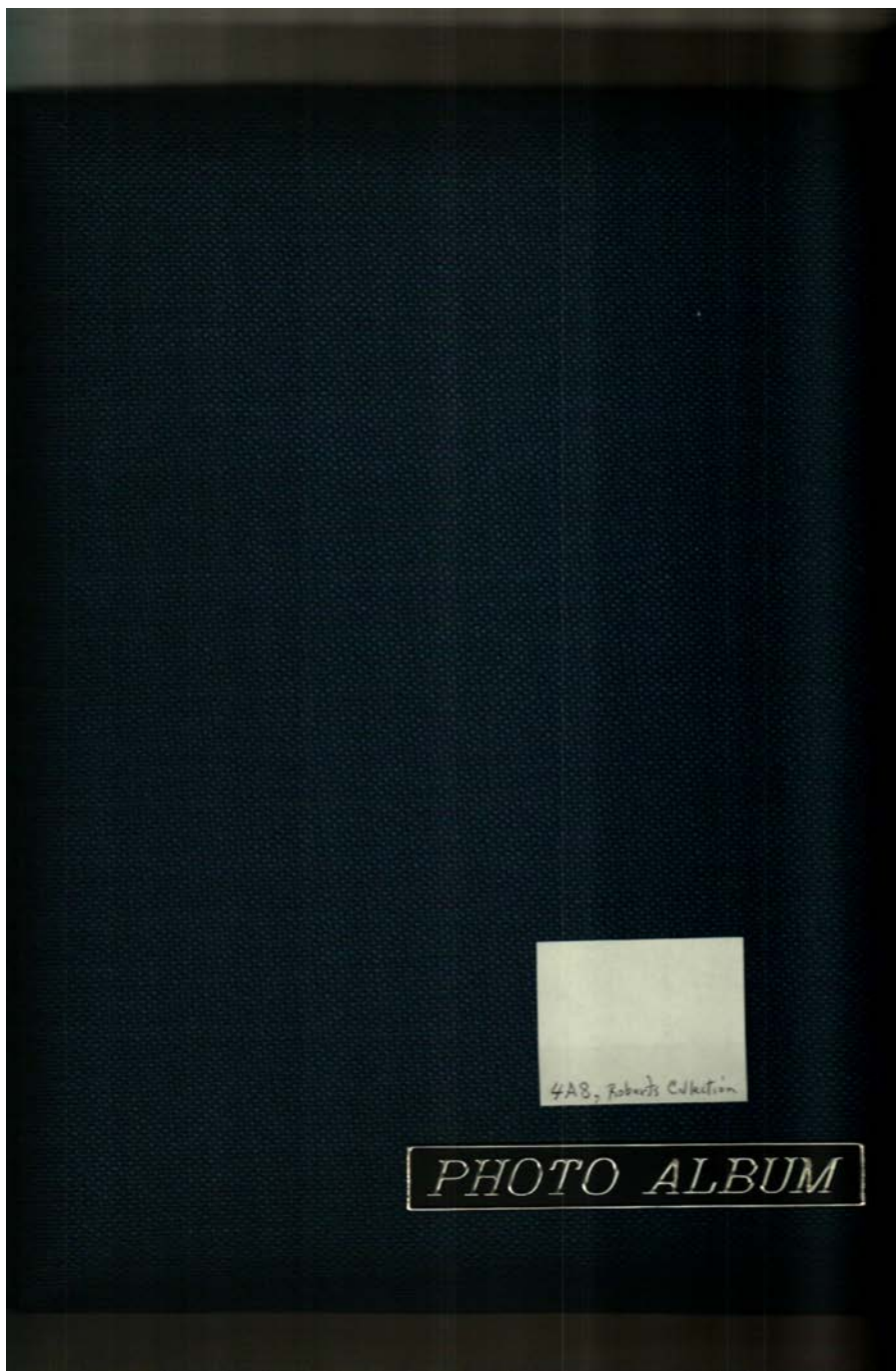

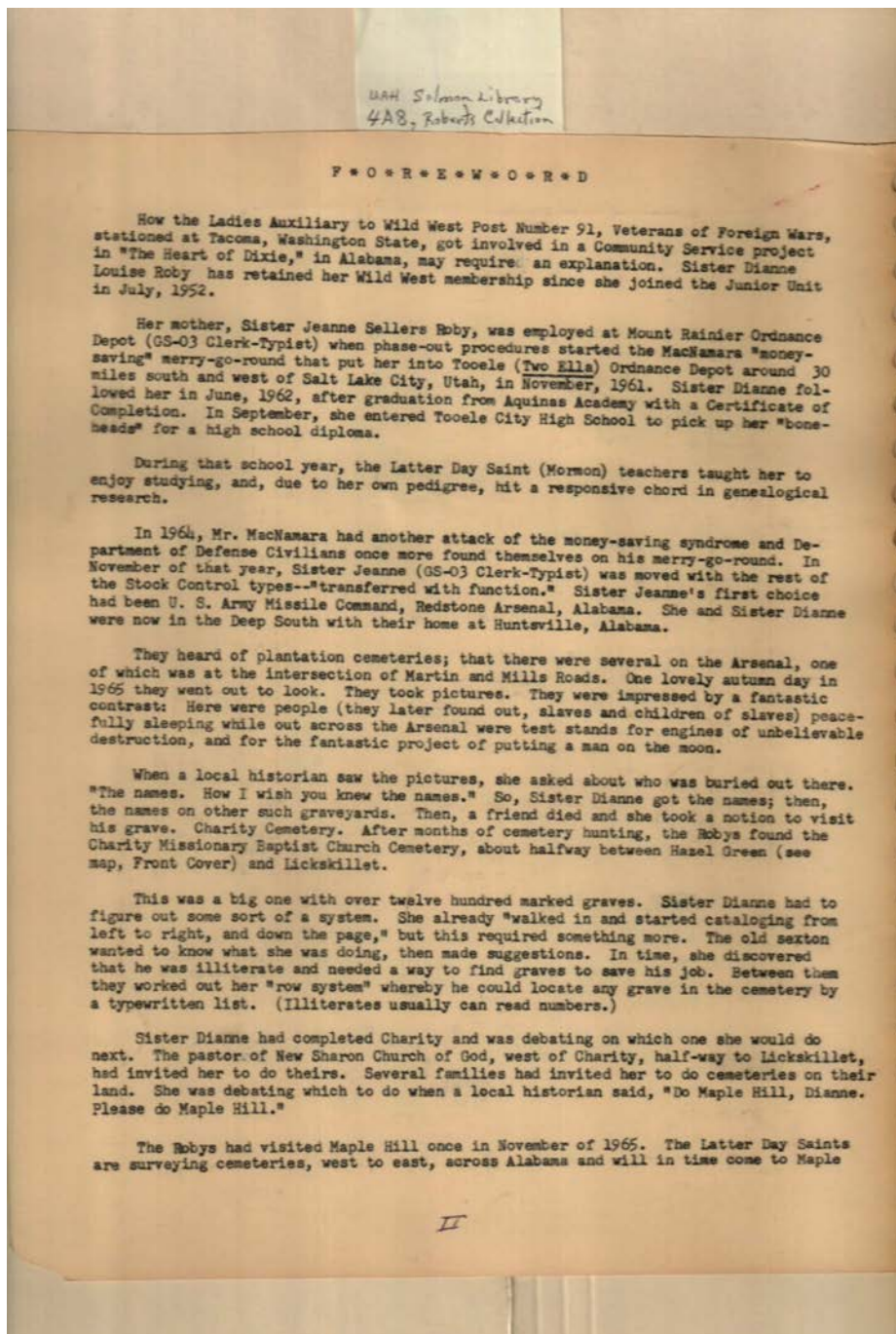

Hill. It encompasses 75 acres. The ball-park is not included. The graves were often set like the graves of the little cemeteries. They are in a pattern very like that made by a handful of paper clips dropped on a desk. The clips will fall into rows as well as being helter-skelter. Sister Dianne had not been interested in such a project. Anyway, she and Sister Jeanne were having too much fun meeting people right out of books about the Deep South and experiencing episodes that could only happen in the hills of the Tennessee River Valley.

Pressures on her built up and finally, on 23 February 1969, she started the work that is the subject of this report. She found herself working out a new procedure during the first several visits. She had many discussions with the Superintendent before she began the actual recording of epitaphs.

Due to the location of the Administrative Office, her list had to start "from the bottom of the page." Then, due to the size of the place, she had to determine areas/division--Sections, which are marked by curbed and paved roads. Then came the job of establishing identification of the Sections--simple numbering. By the time she had completed Section 2, she realized that she needed a chart. Again the project came to a halt while she charted the entire 75 acres (see page 5), determined boundaries of Sections, their sequence, and numbered them.

She was well into Section 3 when she realized that beyond the shadow of a doubt, she had hit a gold mine of history that would be of vital interest to historians, local, Alabamian, Southern/Confederate, and perhaps national. She went to Jimmy Record's office (see pages 24-25). His office girls were so rude, she turned on her heel and walked out.


Sister Dianne is no piker. Her next target was Frances Cabaniss Roberts, PhD, Professor of History, University of Alabama, Huntsville. After a year of persistence, Doctor History herself assigned Wild West's member an hour. They spent an hour at Maple Hill; another hour at Sister Dianne's home, the Doctor went home and put her history on a basement shelf. She had taken a sabbatical year to complete around 20 years of work and was within two weeks of publication. The epitaphs at Maple Hill show many, many discrepancies in histories that have long been accepted. Until her near-fatal illness in 1975, Doctor Roberts was revising and joyously adding to her history, using Sister Dianne's cards, as well as many unsuspected new sources.

\*\*\*\*\*

Sister Dianne was working in Section 9 the day Sister Jeanne read something about Community Service in the Auxiliary Bulletin. She had been president of Herman Uddenberg Auxiliary (#1854, Gig Harbor) over 30 years before, but remembered that members were urged to report any hours they spent, thus building the reports to Department. The Robys wrote to Sister Helen Peterson, Sister Dianne's Auxiliary is still Wild West #91. Sister Helen was interested--and that is how Wild West got involved in a Community Service project in the Heart of Dixie, over 3,000 miles away.

office. In 1842, during the last stage of building, double parlors and a bedroom above were added. In the rear stand the original outbuildings which were the old kitchen and servant's quarters. The buildings have been fully restored.

The interior of the house preserves the flavor of the nineteenth century. Tall frescoed ceilings in classically proportioned rooms look down on mantels faced with Italian marble, beautifully handcarved woodwork and stairs, and the lovely old flooring used in such houses. Much of the window glass is original. There is a fireplace in every room including two in the basement. Each fireplace still has its original mantel. Much of the furniture in the home is of the early nineteenth century.

One of the many interesting features of the home is the iron grilling on the upstairs back porch. The grilling, made in 1840, is the same grill that is around the plot of Dr. Fearn's wife in Maple Hill Cemetery. Mrs. Fearn died in 1842. Dr. Fearn, born in Virginia, was appointed March 8, 1814, by General Andrew Jackson as surgeon's mate in charge of the military hospital in Huntsville. In 1817 Dr. Fearn went to London to study at St. Thomas' Hospital. Continental influence is seen in the architecture of the home he built in Huntsville. Dr. Fearn led his profession in the use of quinine to detect the difference between malaria and typhoid fever. He and his brother, George, installed the Huntsville public waterworks, first in the state. They also were active in planning the canal from the town to the Tennessee River.

Dr. Thomas Fearn's distinguished career included service in the state legislature. Honorary degrees were conferred on him by Rutgers College and Transylvania University. In May, 1862, he and eleven other prominent citizens of Huntsville were taken hostage by the Federal troops. Dr. Fearn died in January, 1863, having steadfastly refused to sign the pledge of allegiance to the Union.

His descendants value the reputation and position of Dr. Fearn in the early development of Huntsville and Madison County.

**T**ODAY, if one chose to arrive at the Cabaniss house on Randolph Street in a carriage, the stone carriage block is still waiting to allow visitors to step down to a brick sidewalk without effort.

Upon entering the two-story brick structure, built by George Steele around 1832, the visitor will be able to view a portrait of the second owner of the house, Septimus D. Cabaniss. The house, originally built for John C. Roach, one of George Steele's associates, was purchased by Mr. Cabaniss as a home for his bride, Virginia Shepherd Cabaniss, whom he married on June 20, 1843.

When the young couple set up housekeeping in their new home, it then contained seven rooms. In the basement were the dining room and kitchen with front and back steps leading to the second floor where there were two parlors—one formal and one informal. Ascending to the third floor were front and back stairs which led to three bedrooms. The front bedrooms were not connected in any way with the back room, but later a door was cut through the sixteen-inch inner brick wall to connect the two.


As the family grew, a wing consisting of two bedrooms, two dressing rooms, and a sun porch, was added at a different level between the basement and the second floor. Perhaps, from an architectural standpoint, the most interesting feature of the house is the back staircase which has five flights of steps connecting the four floor levels.

Because the home has remained in the Cabaniss family since 1843, most of its furniture is still in the same places where "Ma" Cabaniss, as she was affectionately known, originally placed them as she furnished her home over a period of sixty-four years of housekeeping. The master bedroom is furnished with a cherry suite brought by Septimus Cabaniss' father, Charles Cabaniss, when he moved his family from Lunenburg County, Virginia, to Madison County in 1809. Under the four-poster bed which stands four feet from the floor is a trundle bed which was pulled out at night for the children to sleep on. The cradle in which the twelve Cabaniss children were rocked is also to be found in this room.

During the War Between the States, the Federal troops did not occupy the house, but they used the Cabaniss yard as a camping ground. Though they burned the white paling fence which surrounded the block, Mrs. Cabaniss continued to keep her front gate locked in "defiance of the Yankees," and the family was required to use the key to open and close the gate as they went to and from the house.

Septimus D. Cabaniss was a local attorney in Huntsville from 1837 until the War Between the States started in 1861 when he served as a state legislator from Madison County and later as a colonel in the Intelligence Division of the Confederate Army. After the war, he returned to his law practice and remained prominent in local politics until his death in 1891.

The Cabaniss home remained in the hands of his widow until her death in 1907. At this time it was willed to Mrs. Cabaniss' youngest daughter, Miss Fannie Shepherd Cabaniss, who served as Registrar and Chancery of Madison County for 42 years. When Miss Fannie died in 1937, the Cabaniss home came into possession of her niece, Miss Ellen Douglas Roberts, whose mother was Lucy Cabaniss Roberts, oldest daughter of Virginia and Septimus Cabaniss. Miss Ellen resides there with her niece, Dr. Frances Roberts.

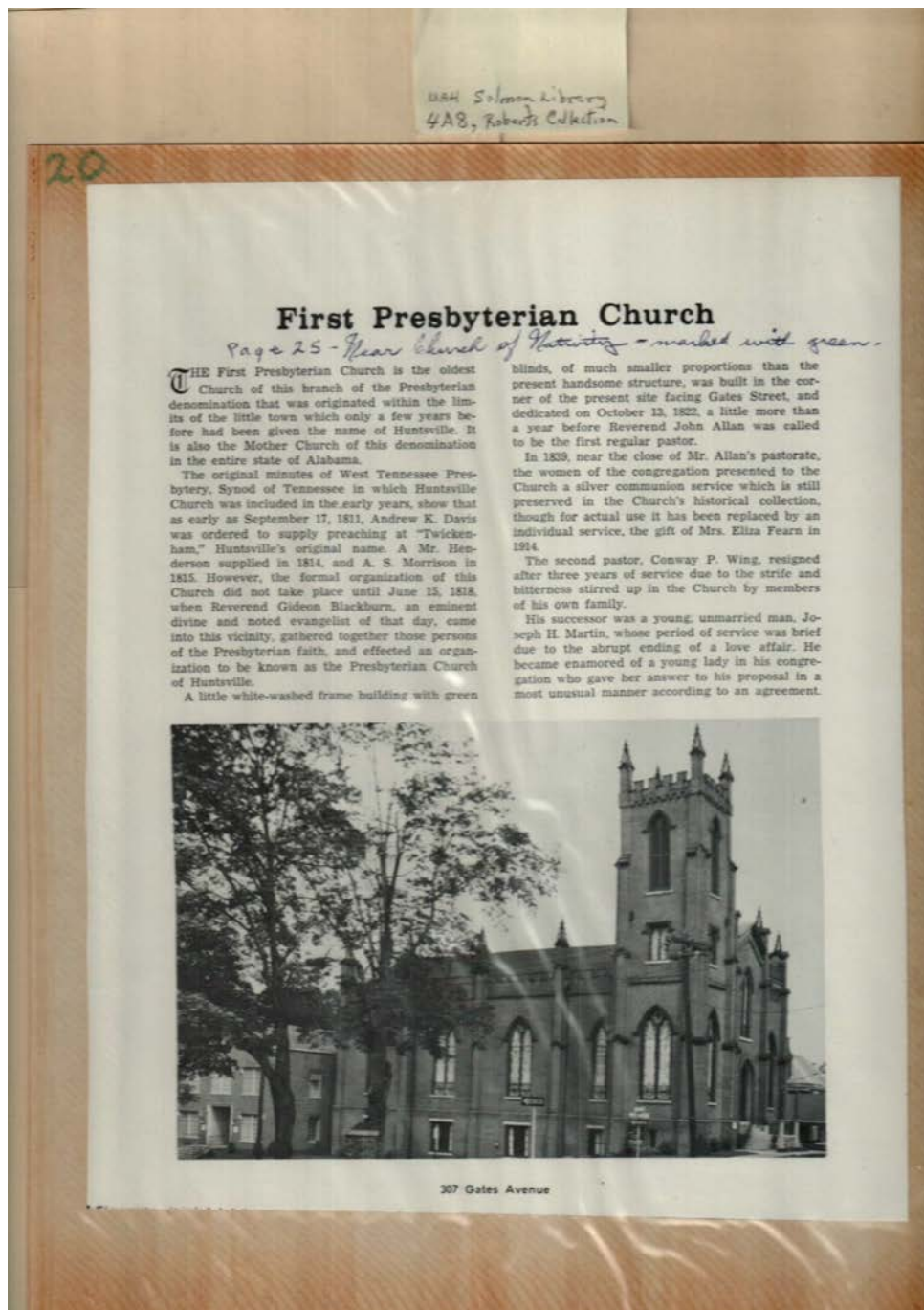

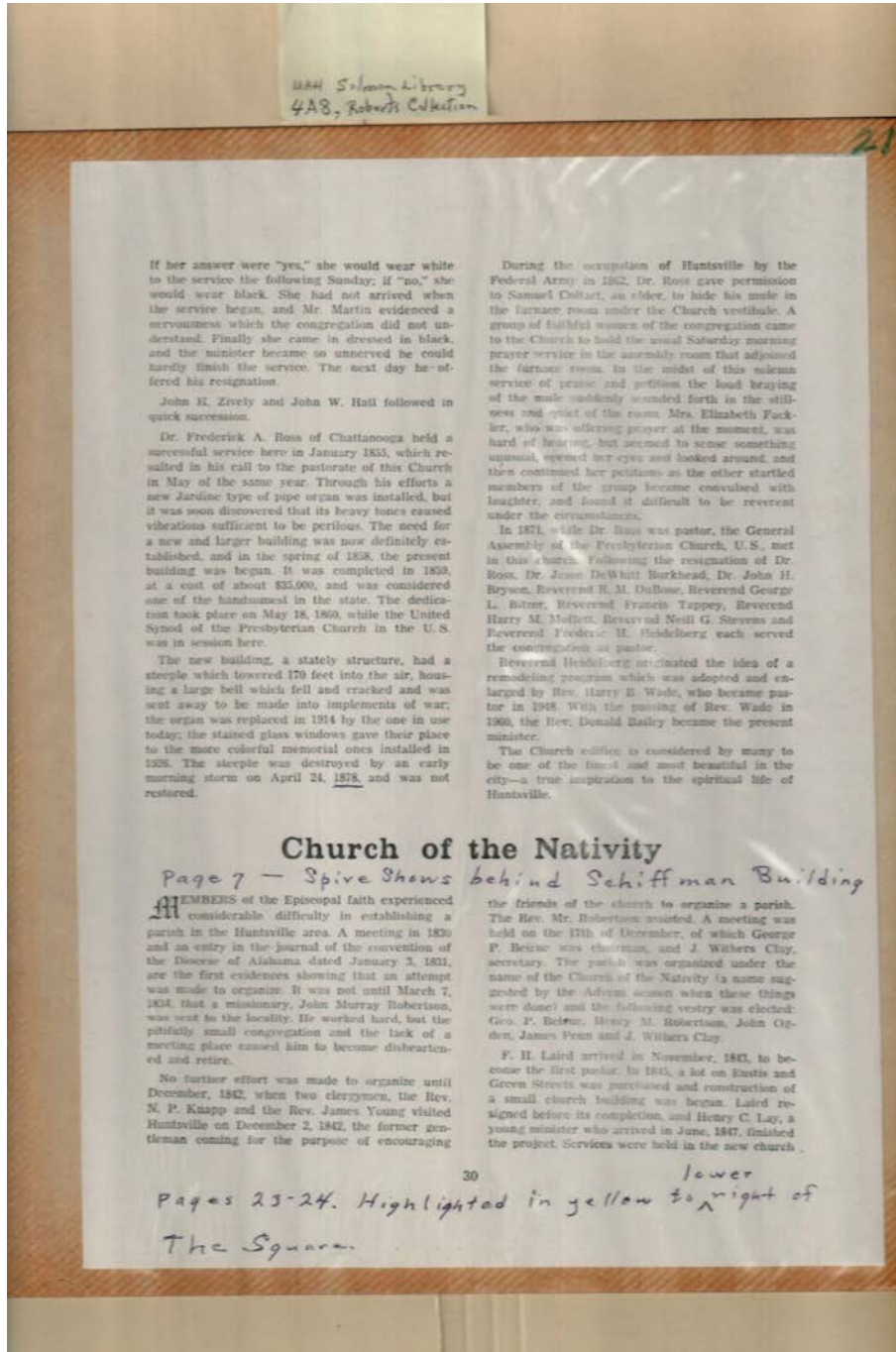

MEMBERS of the Episcopal faith experienced considerable difficulty in establishing a parish in the Huntsville area. A meeting in 1839 and an entry in the journal of the convention of the Diocese of Alabama dated January 3, 1831, are the first evidences showing that an attempt was made to organize. It was not until March 7, 1834, that a missionary, John Murray Robertson, was sent to the locality. He worked hard, but the pitifully small congregation and the lack of a meeting place caused him to become disheartened and retire.

No further effort was made to organize until December, 1842, when two clergymen, the Rev. M. P. Knapp and the Rev. James Young visited Huntsville on December 2, 1842, the former gentleman coming for the purpose of encouraging

the friends of the church to organize a parish. The Rev. Mr. Robertson visited. A meeting was held on the 17th of December, of which George P. Beirne was chairman, and J. Withers Clay, secretary. The parish was organized under the name of the Church of the Nativity (a name suggested by the Advent season when these things were done) and the following vestry was elected: Geo. P. Beirne, Henry M. Robertson, John Ogden, James Penn and J. Withers Clay.

F. H. Laird arrived in November, 1843, to become the first pastor. In 1845, a lot on East and Green Streets was purchased and construction of a small church building was begun. Laird resigned before its completion, and Henry C. Lay, a young minister who arrived in June, 1847, finished the project. Services were held in the new church

The Rev. Lay served as rector for twelve years, and during his stay, the present church building was planned and built during the winter of 1858-59. Church services were first held in the new building on Easter, 1859.

The building, one of the finest examples of Gothic architecture in America, was designed by the late Frank Wills of New York and built by Hugh Moore. It consists of a nave and aisles lighted by windows of tracery of varied description, a vestry and an organ chamber. The tower on the northwest corner is built in two stages, flanked with buttresses, and the spire is octagonal and broached. The interior roof is open, with timbers exposed and paneled. Entrance is through the north end of the nave and tower and the space inside will accommodate approximately 600 persons.

To the left of the church is the Bibb Memorial Chapel, built in 1886 as a memorial to Wilson Cary Bibb. Each year the church is the scene of a traditional Christmas Festival Service for children. Surrounding the grounds is a heavy old iron fence which gives to the church an atmosphere of seclusion, although it is located in the rapidly expanding and busy business district of the city. Dr. John Monro Banister was called in July, 1860, and served forty-six years as rector and two years as rector-emeritus. It is claimed that during the War Between the States, a Federal order was given to seize the church and use it for a stable; however, the order was revoked when the soldiers saw the inscription on the marble slab over the entrance. The words "Reverence My Sanctuary," caused the officer in command to revoke his order.

Willoughby N. Claybrook, divinity student, Edward D. Johnson, and Alexander C. McCabe served short terms as rector and in July 1909, Cary Gamble began a nineteen-year rectorship. During his term, the store building on the adjoining lot was purchased to provide additional space for the Sunday School.

Randolph R. Claiborne, Jr. was called as rector in September, 1908, and in a colorful ceremony in the church on June 29, 1949, he was consecrated as suffragan bishop of the Diocese of Alabama. The Rev. Randolph Claiborne was succeeded by John H. Bonner, Jr., who served as rector from 1950 to 1956. In 1953, Ridley Hall was completed to house the Sunday school and assembly rooms for the congregation. The present rector is the Rev. Emile Joffrion who came to Huntsville in 1967. The Rev. Henry Heath, Jr. joined the church staff as curate in 1964.

## Lost lithograph 100-year old sketch to be circulated here

Studying lithographs of New Orleans, circa 1811, recently County Commission Chairman James Record, came upon a rare find in the Library of Congress in Washington—a drawing of Huntsville, 1871, in full color.

Startled, Record went to the curators and told them of the misfiling and requested copies of the Huntsville, 1871 sketch.

This week, a copy of the lithograph, with the sketch by an unknown artist, was sent to Record, a local historian.

The sketch, drawn during Reconstruction, shows portions of the foundations of a Union embarkment on what is now Echols Hill.

A race track existed just beyond Mills Street.

Beyond California Street, the area was wilderness.

But, the Church of the Nativity, the First Presbyterian Church and the towering spire of the United Methodist Church on Randolph, all still standing, are depicted in the sketch.

Also shown are sketches, down to minute details of the 1835-constructed First National Bank Building and the Huntsville Female College which was closed because of Reconstruction financial problems in 1874.

The second Madison County courthouse, constructed in 1838, is also depicted. So, too, is the 1856-constructed old Huntsville Hotel which burned in 1910.

The lithograph was produced by Ehrigott & Krebs of Cincinnati. The old Memphis and Charleston railworks, that was later to move to Memphis is depicted also.

Eustis and a few streets names are misspelled. But, all and all, during a Reconstruction that was not to end until 1877, Huntsville, with a population of about 5,000 was "quite a town."

"It was uncanny to find the lithograph where I did," said Record. It should greatly add to historical lore here, he feels.

Record said copies of the lithograph will be placed around the courthouse. None will go on sale, he said. (R-233 v. 1.2.1.2)

Glancing at the sketch of a race track just above what is now the Southern Railway tracks, Record said with a laugh: "With all the talk about dog racing (the Mobile and Jefferson referendum questions), it seems a little comical to know Huntsville had horse racing in 1871." That was the year (1871). Huntsville's bigger neighbor to the south, Birmingham was chartered.

Just as today the 1871 lithograph shows an abundance of trees in the city that was to become known as the Rocket City long before rockets were dreamed of in any realistic sense.

The Square is highlighted in yellow. The area on the 1819 map (page 13) is outlined in black ink. Blue strip below copy of lithograph shows positioning of places as mentioned, and color-coding of same. The Cabaniss - Roberts home (page 15) on Randolph and Cahoun is outlined in black/red, edge of lithograph. Lower right corner highlighted in yellow now in Section 12 - Veterans' use.

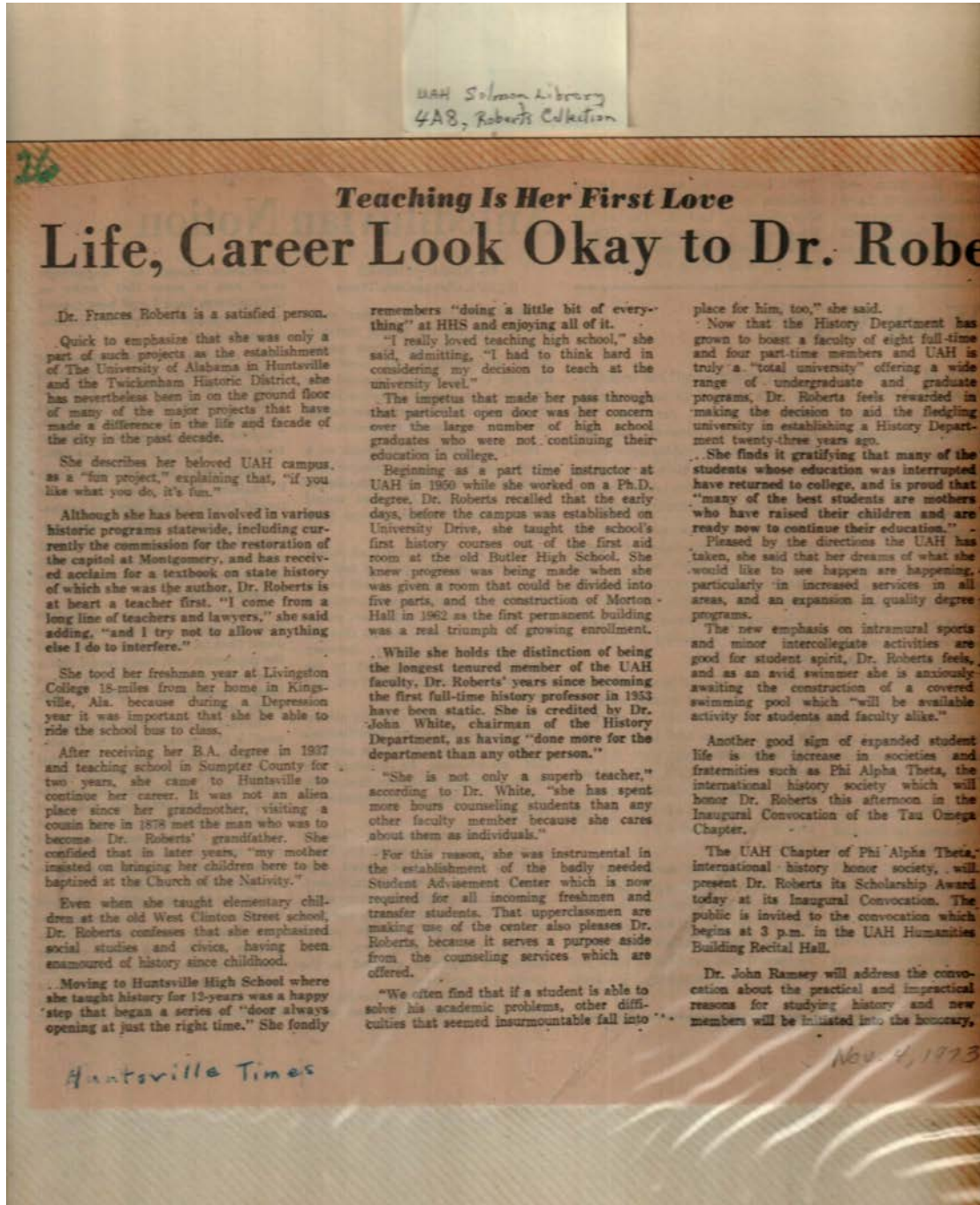

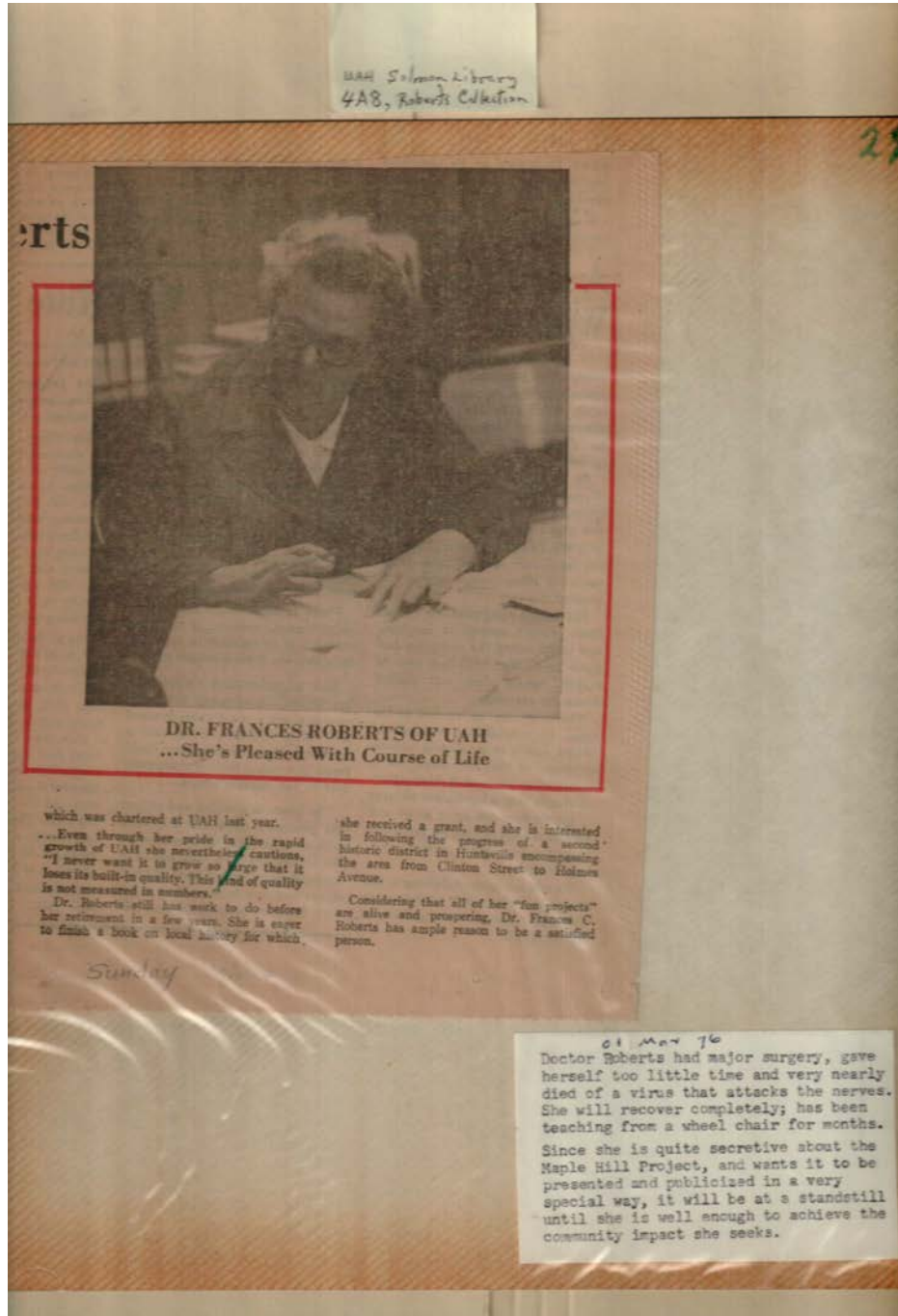

Dr. Roberts honored by AAUW

Dr. Frances Roberts, one of Huntsville's most respected and beloved citizens, has been honored by the Huntsville branch of the American Association of University Women.

A contribution of \$500 to the International Graduate Fellowships Program of the AAUW Educational Foundation, has been designated the Frances Roberts Fellowship. Dr. Roberts is being presented a booklet, in which her name is included, Names Honored: AAUW Educational Foundation, 1972-73.

It is appropriate for the local branch's first named fellowship to honor Dr. Roberts, for she was the first president of the Huntsville Branch when it was formed in 1949. She has maintained her interest and membership in the organization and has pursued charitable, educational, and public service purposes.

Dr. Roberts earned her B.S. degree from Livingston State University and her M.A. and Ph. D. degrees from the University of Alabama. She taught in the Huntsville City Schools for 15 years and since 1960 has been on the faculty of UAH. She is presently Professor of History and Chairman of the Academic Advise ment Center.

In addition to her academic duties, she works with the Burritt Museum Board, Huntsville Symphony Board, Twickenham Historical District Board, Huntsville Historic Commission, State Commission on the Preservation of the Capitol Building, and the State Committee on the Humanities and Public Policy.

The AAUW presentation is only one of the many honors that Dr. Roberts has received. She was given the State Historic Presentation Award in 1969, the Liberty Bell Award in 1970, and the Phi Alpha Theta Scholarship Award for Teaching in 1973.

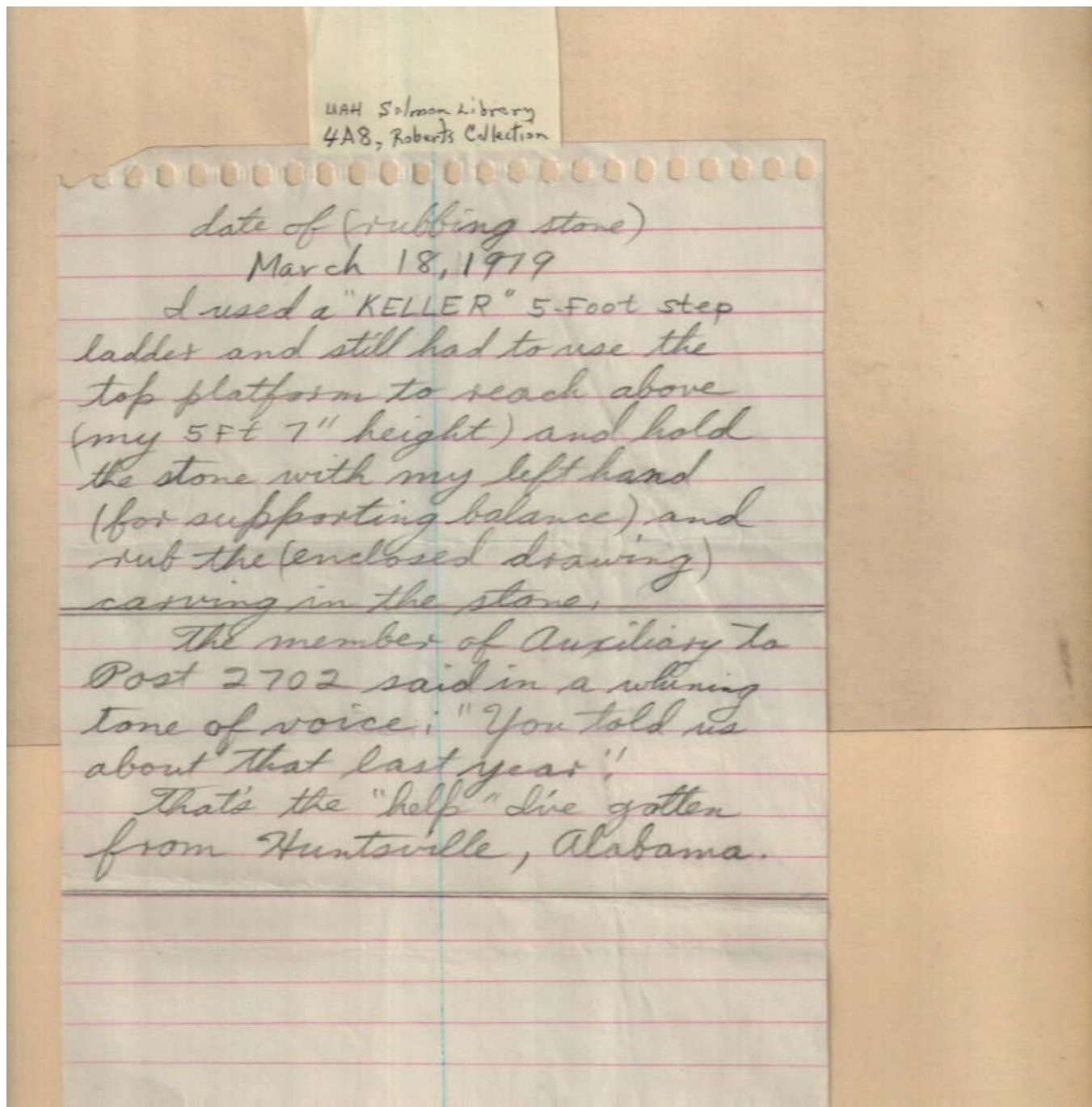

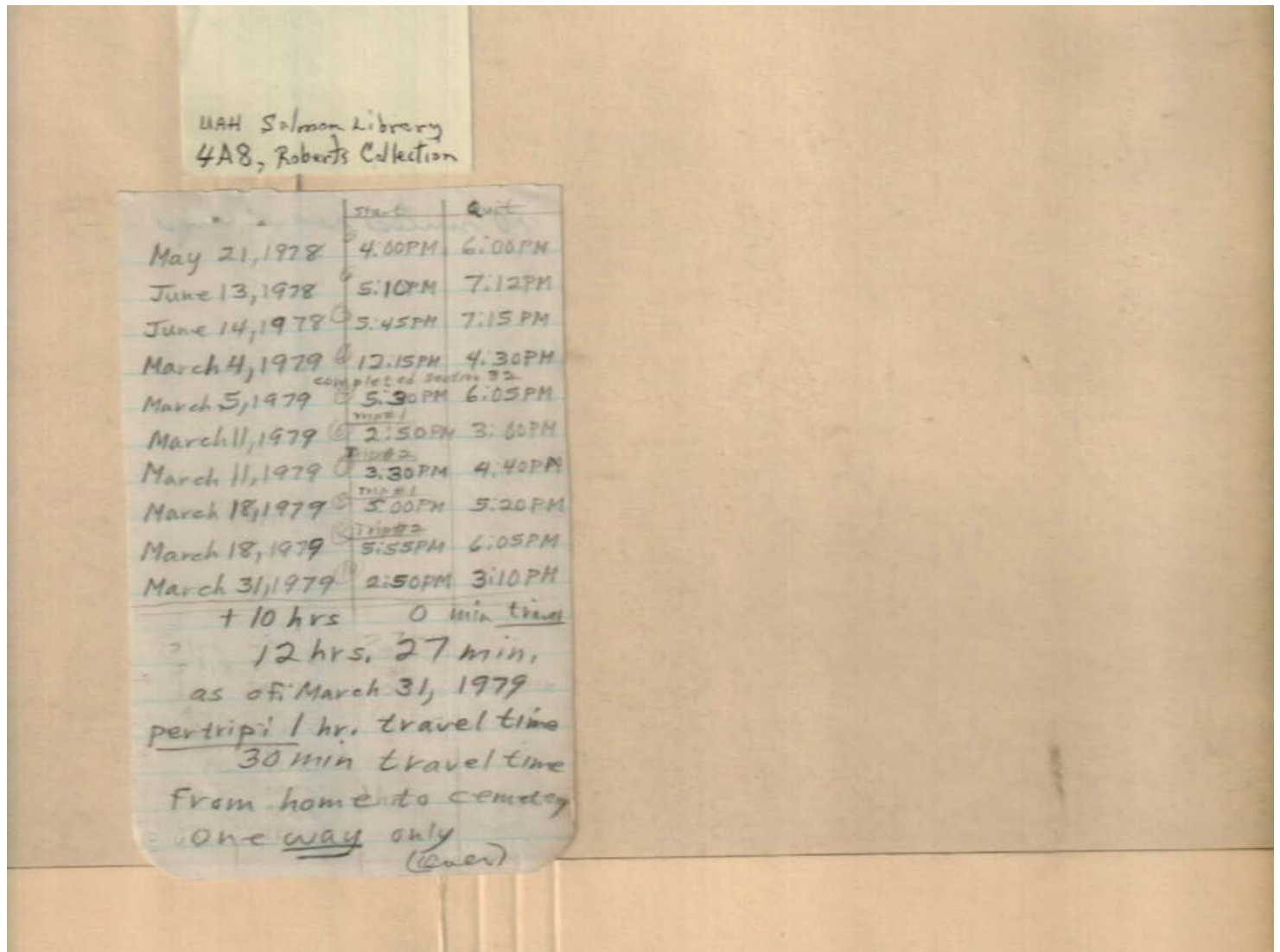

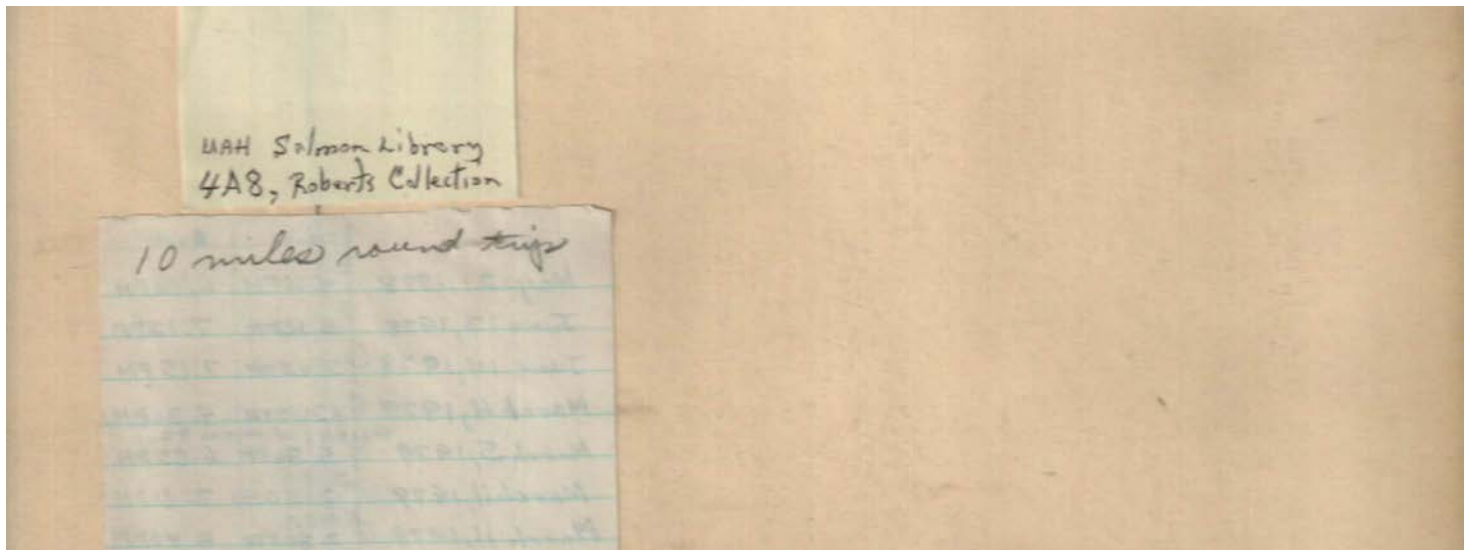
