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WILLIAM ACKLEN, grandson of Capt. John Hunt, the founder of Huntsville, was born in 1802 in Tazewell, Tenn. His mother was Elizabeth Hunt, and his father Samuel Acklen, descendant of an old Devonshire family who originally spelled their name "Acalen". William was a graduate of Greenville College, Tenn., and practiced law in Huntsville, representing Madison County in the house in 1826 and returned for four successive terms. He was elected solicitor in 1832, and held this position for twelve years; defeated William Fleming for the state senate in 1853 and served four years. His wife was Louisa King, and his last residence Madison.

Little is known of the ancestry of DANIEL B. TURNER, who came to Madison County as a young man and held the position of sheriff of Madison County and postmaster at Huntsville. From 1839 to 1852 he represented his district in the state senate. During the latter years of his life he engaged in business in Huntsville, in which he was very successful. He died in 1866 in Huntsville.

ROBERT MILLER PATTON, twentieth governor of Alabama, was born in 1809 in Russell County, Virginia. His parents had come to America from Londonderry, Ireland, settling first in Virginia and later moving to Huntsville, where his father was one of the founders of Bell Factory Cotton Mill, the first cotton mill in the Gulf States. Robert received his education at Green Academy, Huntsville (the only academy in Alabama at that time) and was placed in a commercial house to learn the business. He is said to have had charge of the first cotton gin ever to be operated in Alabama. In 1829 he moved to Florence and engaged in the mercantile business. He was a planter, owning over 2000 acres of land and 500 slaves. In 1832 he was elected to the state legislature from Lauderdale County, and altho he was a Whig, was a member of the special legislature of 1837 called to relieve the people of the state from the distress of the financial panic of that year, and served almost continuously from that time until the outbreak of hostilities. He was opposed to secession, believed that it meant war, but was a member of the national convention which met in Charleston in 1860, and of the state convention which passed the secession ordinance. When the state left the union he gave his entire support to the southern cause, spending his time and fortune aiding Confederacy, and raised millions of dollars to support the armies in the field. During the war his large estate was overrun by the enemy, and much of his land laid waste.

In 1865 Patton was elected governor of Alabama. In 1867 he issued \$500,000,000 worth of what was known as "Patton Certificates" to enable the state to pay a portion of its expenses in anticipation of the collection of taxes. Before his term had expired every dollar had been redeemed in national currency. His administration was conducted under difficulties arising out of the conflicting sentiments of the people of the state and the hostile legislation of congress, and all of his orders and appointments were subject to the supervision of the military authorities. Nevertheless, at the close of his term the bonded indebtedness of the state was little more than one million dollars and he had administered affairs for a whole year without collecting taxes. Besides about 30,000 persons made paupers by the war were fed. He was largely responsible for having Congress suspend the collection of war tax due the Federal Government by each of the southern states at a time when its collection would have ruined Alabama.

Patton was active in building railroads in the state after the war, aided in the rebuilding of the University of Alabama, which had been burned by Federal troops, and served as trustee for four different colleges. He was married in 1832 to Miss Jane Locke Brahan of Huntsville, and to them nine children were born. He is buried in Huntsville.

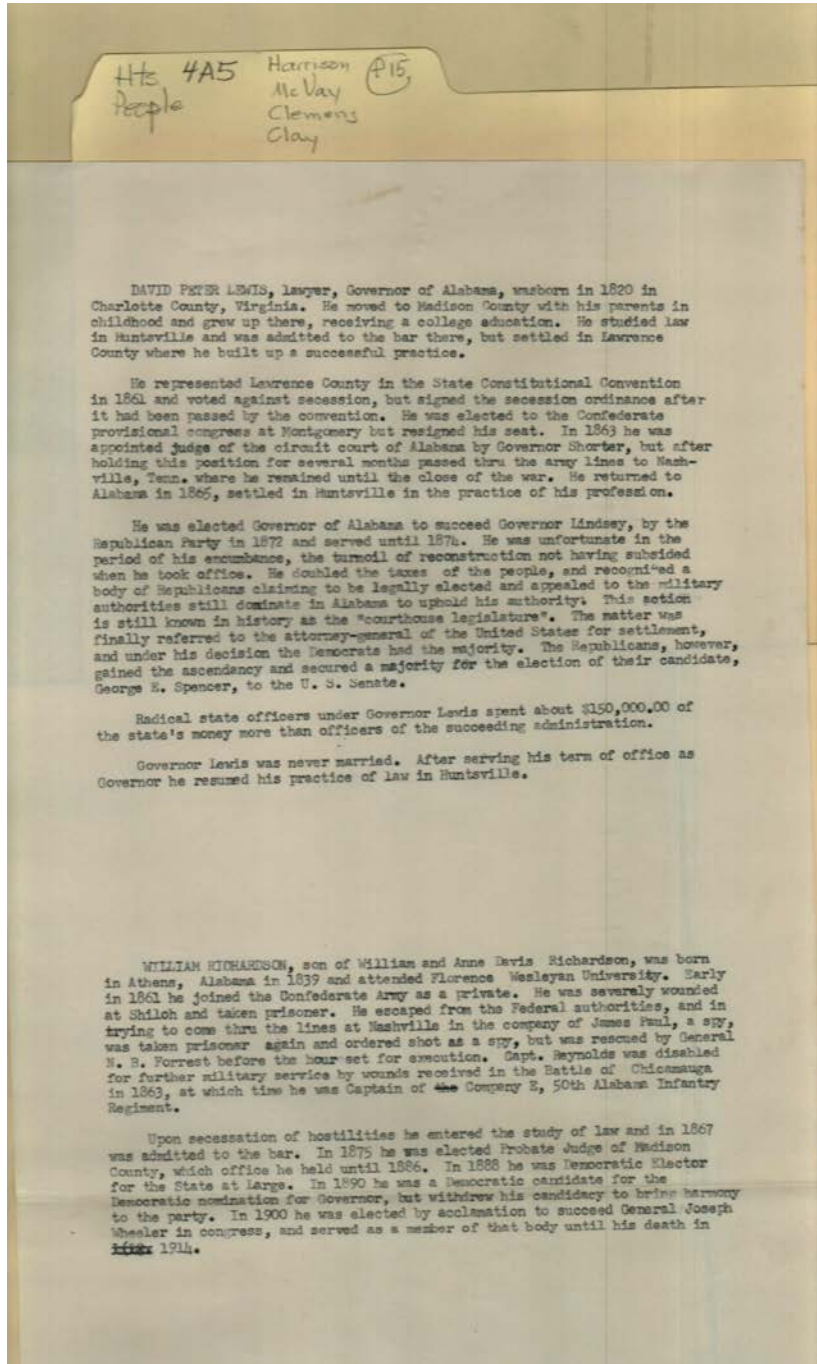

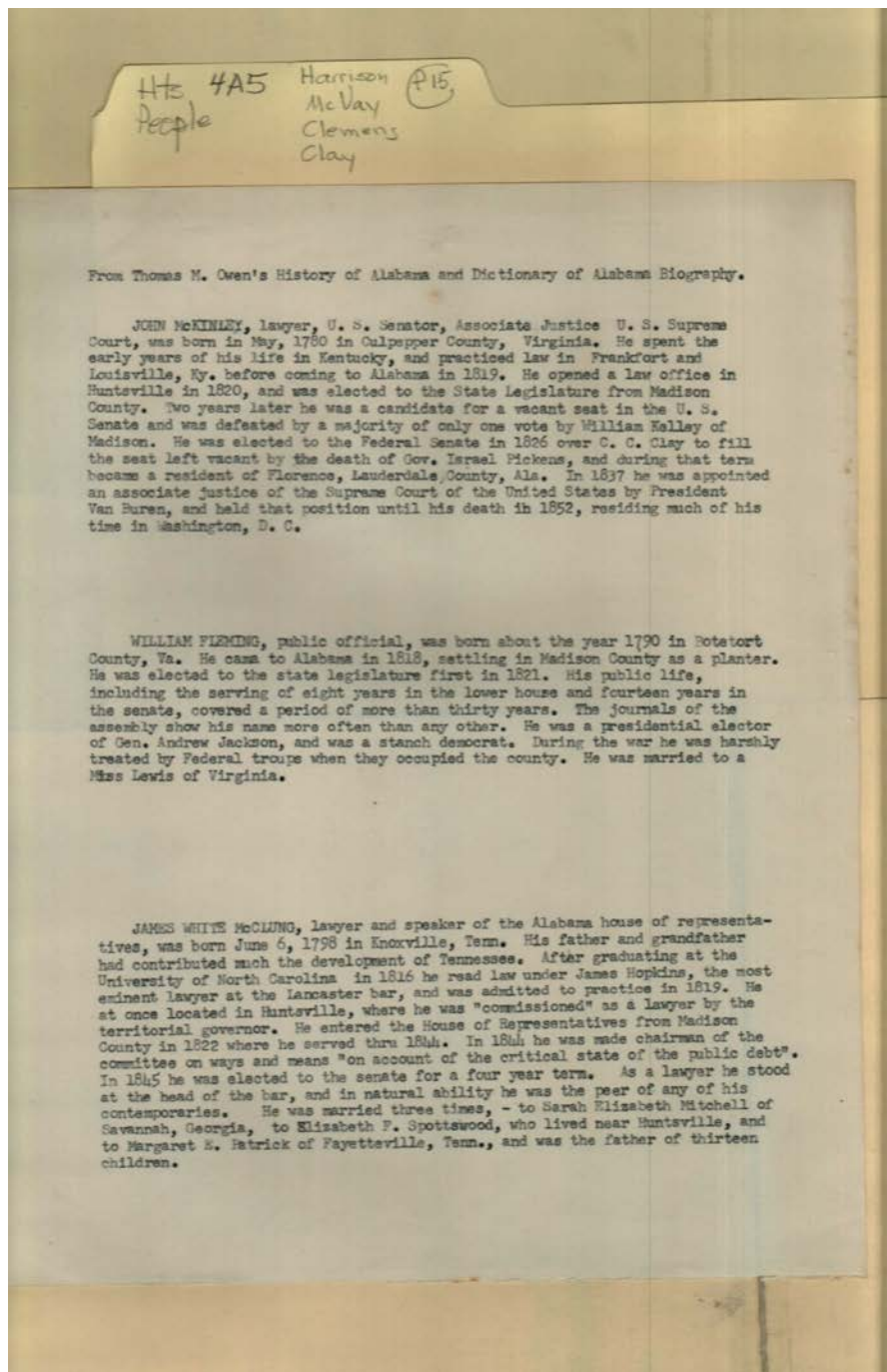

JOHN MCKINLEY, lawyer, U. S. Senator, Associate Justice U. S. Supreme Court, was born in May, 1780 in Calpepper County, Virginia. He spent the early years of his life in Kentucky, and practiced law in Frankfort and Louisville, Ky. before coming to Alabama in 1819. He opened a law office in Huntsville in 1820, and was elected to the State Legislature from Madison County. Two years later he was a candidate for a vacant seat in the U. S. Senate and was defeated by a majority of only one vote by William Kellay of Madison. He was elected to the Federal Senate in 1826 over C. C. Clay to fill the seat left vacant by the death of Gov. Israel Pickens, and during that term became a resident of Florence, Lauderdale County, Ala. In 1837 he was appointed an associate justice of the Supreme Court of the United States by President Van Buren, and held that position until his death in 1852, residing much of his time in Washington, D. C.

WILLIAM FLEMING, public official, was born about the year 1790 in Botetort County, Va. He came to Alabama in 1818, settling in Madison County as a planter. He was elected to the state legislature first in 1821. His public life, including the serving of eight years in the lower house and fourteen years in the senate, covered a period of more than thirty years. The journals of the assembly show his name more often than any other. He was a presidential elector of Gen. Andrew Jackson, and was a staunch democrat. During the war he was harshly treated by Federal troops when they occupied the county. He was married to a Miss Lewis of Virginia.

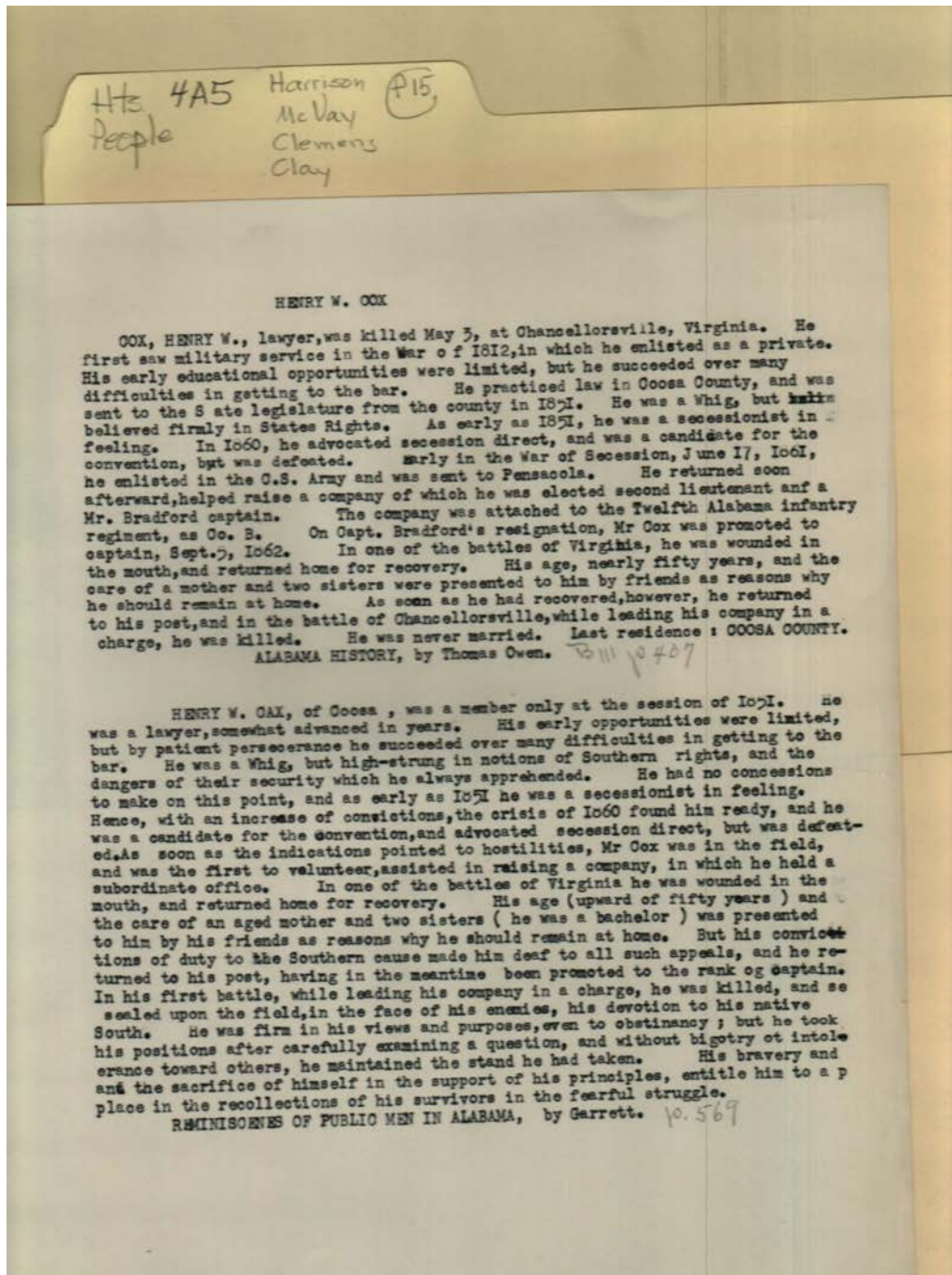
JAMES WHITE McCLUNG, lawyer and speaker of the Alabama house of representatives, was born June 6, 1798 in Knoxville, Tenn. His father and grandfather had contributed much the development of Tennessee. After graduating at the University of North Carolina in 1816 he read law under James Hopkins, the most eminent lawyer at the Lancaster bar, and was admitted to practice in 1819. He at once located in Huntsville, where he was "commissioned" as a lawyer by the territorial governor. He entered the House of Representatives from Madison County in 1822 where he served thru 1834. In 1834 he was made chairman of the committee on ways and means "on account of the critical state of the public debt". In 1845 he was elected to the senate for a four year term. As a lawyer he stood at the head of the bar, and in natural ability he was the peer of any of his contemporaries. He was married three times, - to Sarah Elizabeth Mitchell of Savannah, Georgia, to Elizabeth F. Spottswood, who lived near Huntsville, and to Margaret E. Patrick of Fayetteville, Tenn., and was the father of thirteen children.

HENRY W. COX

COX, HENRY W., lawyer, was killed May 3, at Chancellorsville, Virginia. He first saw military service in the War of 1812, in which he enlisted as a private. His early educational opportunities were limited, but he succeeded over many difficulties in getting to the bar. He practiced law in Coosa County, and was sent to the State legislature from the county in 1821. He was a Whig, but ~~was~~ believed firmly in States Rights. As early as 1821, he was a secessionist in feeling. In 1860, he advocated secession direct, and was a candidate for the convention, but was defeated. Early in the War of Secession, June 17, 1861, he enlisted in the U.S. Army and was sent to Pensacola. He returned soon afterward, helped raise a company of which he was elected second lieutenant and a Mr. Bradford captain. The company was attached to the Twelfth Alabama infantry regiment, as Co. B. On Capt. Bradford's resignation, Mr Cox was promoted to captain, Sept. 3, 1862. In one of the battles of Virginia, he was wounded in the mouth, and returned home for recovery. His age, nearly fifty years, and the care of a mother and two sisters were presented to him by friends as reasons why he should remain at home. As soon as he had recovered, however, he returned to his post, and in the battle of Chancellorsville, while leading his company in a charge, he was killed. He was never married. HENRY W. COX, of Coosa, was a member only at the session of 1821. He was a lawyer, somewhat advanced in years. His early opportunities were limited, but by patient perseverance he succeeded over many difficulties in getting to the bar. He was a Whig, but high-strung in notions of Southern rights, and the dangers of their security which he always apprehended. He had no concessions to make on this point, and as early as 1821 he was a secessionist in feeling. Hence, with an increase of convictions, the crisis of 1860 found him ready, and he was a candidate for the convention, and advocated secession direct, but was defeated. As soon as the indications pointed to hostilities, Mr Cox was in the field, and was the first to volunteer, assisted in raising a company, in which he held a subordinate office. In one of the battles of Virginia he was wounded in the mouth, and returned home for recovery. His age (upward of fifty years) and the care of an aged mother and two sisters (he was a bachelor) was presented to him by his friends as reasons why he should remain at home. But his convictions of duty to the Southern cause made him deaf to all such appeals, and he returned to his post, having in the meantime been promoted to the rank of captain. In his first battle, while leading his company in a charge, he was killed, and sealed upon the field, in the face of his enemies, his devotion to his native South. He was firm in his views and purposes, even to obstinacy; but he took his positions after carefully examining a question, and without bigotry or intolerance toward others, he maintained the stand he had taken. His bravery and the sacrifice of himself in the support of his principles, entitle him to a place in the recollections of his survivors in the fearful struggle. 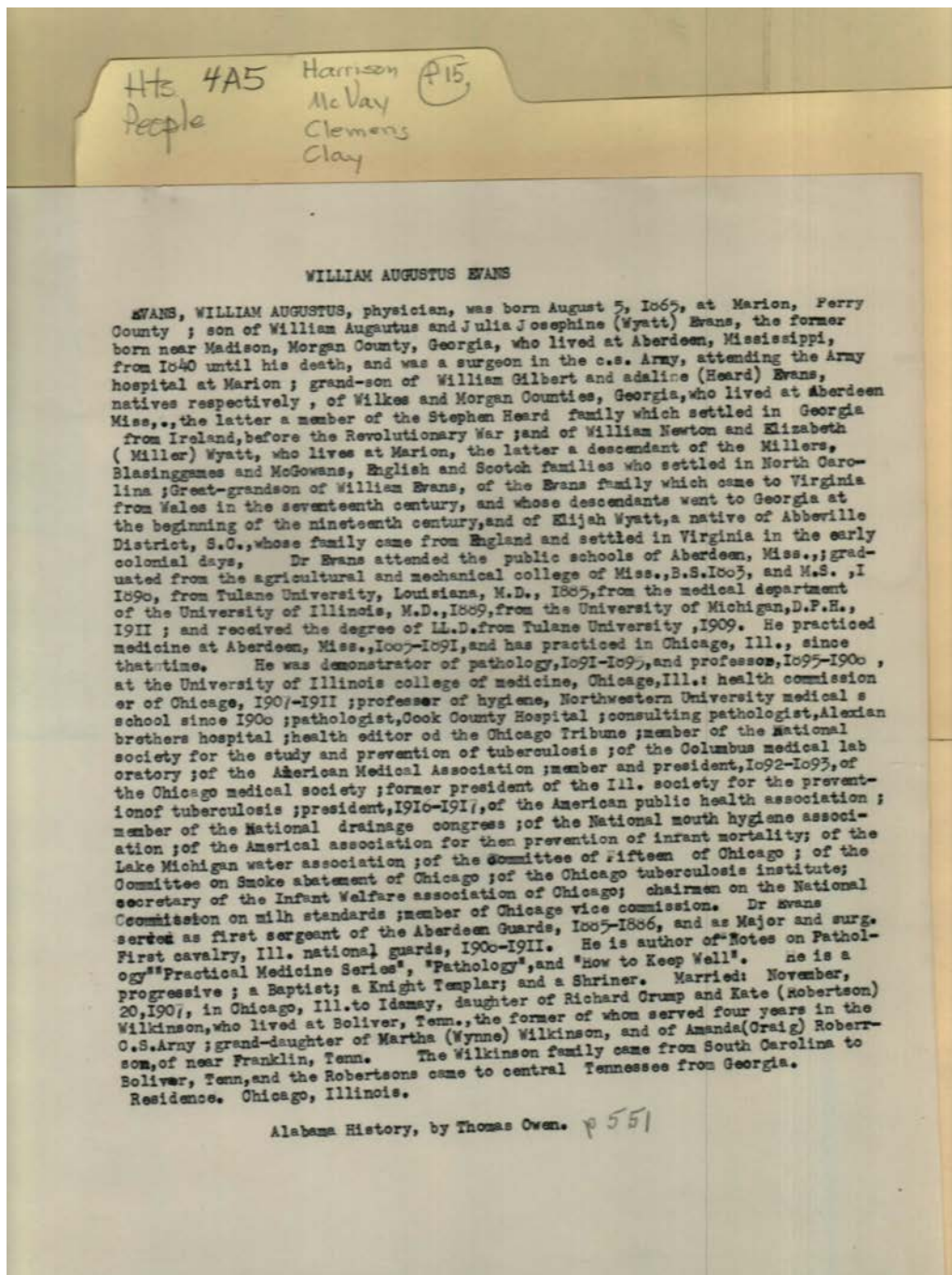

WILLIAM AUGUSTUS EVANS

EVANS, WILLIAM AUGUSTUS, physician, was born August 5, 1865, at Marion, Perry County ; son of William Augustus and Julia Josephine (Wyatt) Evans, the former born near Madison, Morgan County, Georgia, who lived at Aberdeen, Mississippi, from 1840 until his death, and was a surgeon in the c.s. Army, attending the Army hospital at Marion ; grand-son of William Gilbert and Adaline (Heard) Evans, natives respectively, of Wilkes and Morgan Counties, Georgia, who lived at Aberdeen Miss., the latter a member of the Stephen Heard family which settled in Georgia from Ireland, before the Revolutionary War ; and of William Newton and Elizabeth ( Miller) Wyatt, who lives at Marion, the latter a descendant of the Millers, Blasingames and McGowans, English and Scotch families who settled in North Carolina ; Great-grandson of William Evans, of the Evans family which came to Virginia from Wales in the seventeenth century, and whose descendants went to Georgia at the beginning of the nineteenth century, and of Elijah Wyatt, a native of Abbeville District, S.C., whose family came from England and settled in Virginia in the early colonial days, Dr Evans attended the public schools of Aberdeen, Miss., graduated from the agricultural and mechanical college of Miss., B.S. 1885, and M.S., 1889, from Tulane University, Louisiana, M.D., 1889, from the medical department of the University of Illinois, M.D., 1889, from the University of Michigan, D.P.H., 1911 ; and received the degree of LL.D. from Tulane University, 1909. He practiced medicine at Aberdeen, Miss., 1887-1891, and has practiced in Chicago, Ill., since that time. confined to the armies, and should not visit the homes of families or private interests.

But in other examples, a different rule obtained the sanction of historical authority. I will only instance that, when in the reign of William and Mary, the English army occupied Ireland, then in a state of revolt, the inhabitants were actually dispossessed of their property and a new population introduced. To this day, a large part of the north of Ireland is held by the descendants of the Scotch emigrants sent there by William's order, and an act of Parliament.

The war which prevails in our land is essentially a war of races. The Southern people entered into a clear compact of government, but still maintained a species of separate interests, history, and prejudices. These latter became stronger and stronger, till they have led to a war, which has developed the fruits of the bitterest kind.

We of the North are, beyond all question, right in our lawful cause, but we are not bound to ignore the fact that the people of the South have prejudices which form part of their nature, and which they cannot throw off without an effort of reason or the slower process of natural change. Now, the question arises, should we treat as absolute enemies all in the South who differ with us in opinions or prejudices—kill or banish them? Or should we give them time to think, and gradually change their conduct so as to conform to the new order of things which is slowly and gradually creeping into their country?

When men take arms to resist our rightful authority, we are compelled to use force, because all reason and argument ceases when we are resorted to. When the provisions, forage, horses, mules, wagons, etc., are used by our enemy, it is clearly our duty and right to take them, otherwise they might be used against us.

In like manner, all houses left vacant by an inimical people are clearly our right, or such as are needed as store-houses, hospitals, and quarters. But a question arises as to dwelling used by women, children, and non-combatants. So long as non-combatants remain in their houses, and keep to their accustomed business, their opinions and prejudices can in no wise influence the war, and therefore should not be noticed. But if anyone comes out in the public streets and creates disorder, he or she should be punished, restrained, or banished, either to the rear or front, as the officer in command adjudges. If the people, or any of them, keep up a correspondence with parties in hostility, they are spies, and can be punished with death or minor punishment.

These are well established principles of war, and the people of the South having appealed to war, are barred from appealing to our constitution, which they have practically and publicly defied. They have appealed to war, and must abide its rules and laws. The United States, as a belligerent party claiming rights in the soil as the ultimate sovereign, have a right to change the population, and if it may be and is, both politic and best, that we should do so in certain districts. When the inhabitants persist too long in hostility, it may be both politic and right that we should banish them and appropriate their lands to a more loyal and useful population. No man will deny that the United States would be benefited by dispossessing a single prejudiced, hard-headed and disloyal planter and substitute in his place a dozen or more patient, industrious, good families, even if they be of foreign birth. I think it does good to present this view of the case to many Southern gentlemen, who grow rich and wealthy, not by virtue alone of their industry and skill, but by reason of the protection and impetus to prosperity given by our hitherto moderate and magnanimous Government.

It is all idle nonsense for these Southern planters to say that they made the South, that they own it, and that they can do as they please—even to break up our Government, and to shut up the natural avenues of trade, intercourse and commerce.

We know, and they know if they are intelligent beings, that, as compared with the whole world, they are but as five millions are to one thousand millions—

JOHN M. TAYLOR.

JOHN M. TAYLOR, one of the earlier jurists of the State, was born in Orange County, Virginia, about the year 1768. He was a scion of an excellent family, and was thoroughly educated. After practicing law for several years in his native State, he came to Huntsville in 1817. Here he was at first a merchant, but soon resumed his professional labors. He was a member of the convention called to form a constitution for Alabama, and was one of the three ~~sub-committee~~ mitteemen who drafted that instrument. He was subsequently the law partner of Judge Minor, whom he succeeded on the supreme court bench in 1827. In this high position he was retained for eight years, and then resigned. A year or two later he removed to Mississippi, where he was a leading practitioner till his death in 1859 or 1860. Judge Taylor was of a comely figure and person, and of pleasing address. His mind was logical, and he stood at the head of his profession, while on the bench he sustained a high reputation. His wife was a sister of Philip Foote, a merchant of Huntsville.

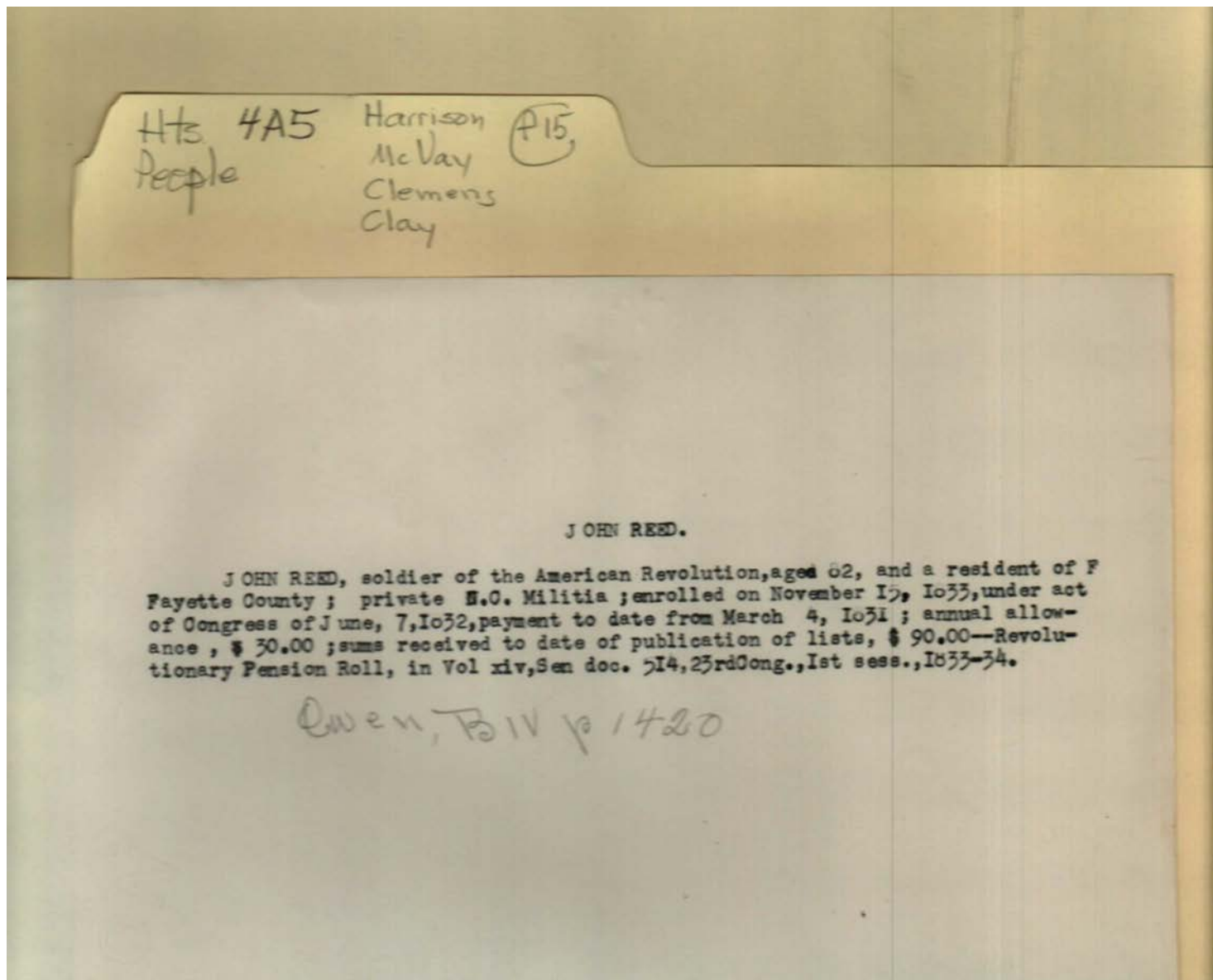

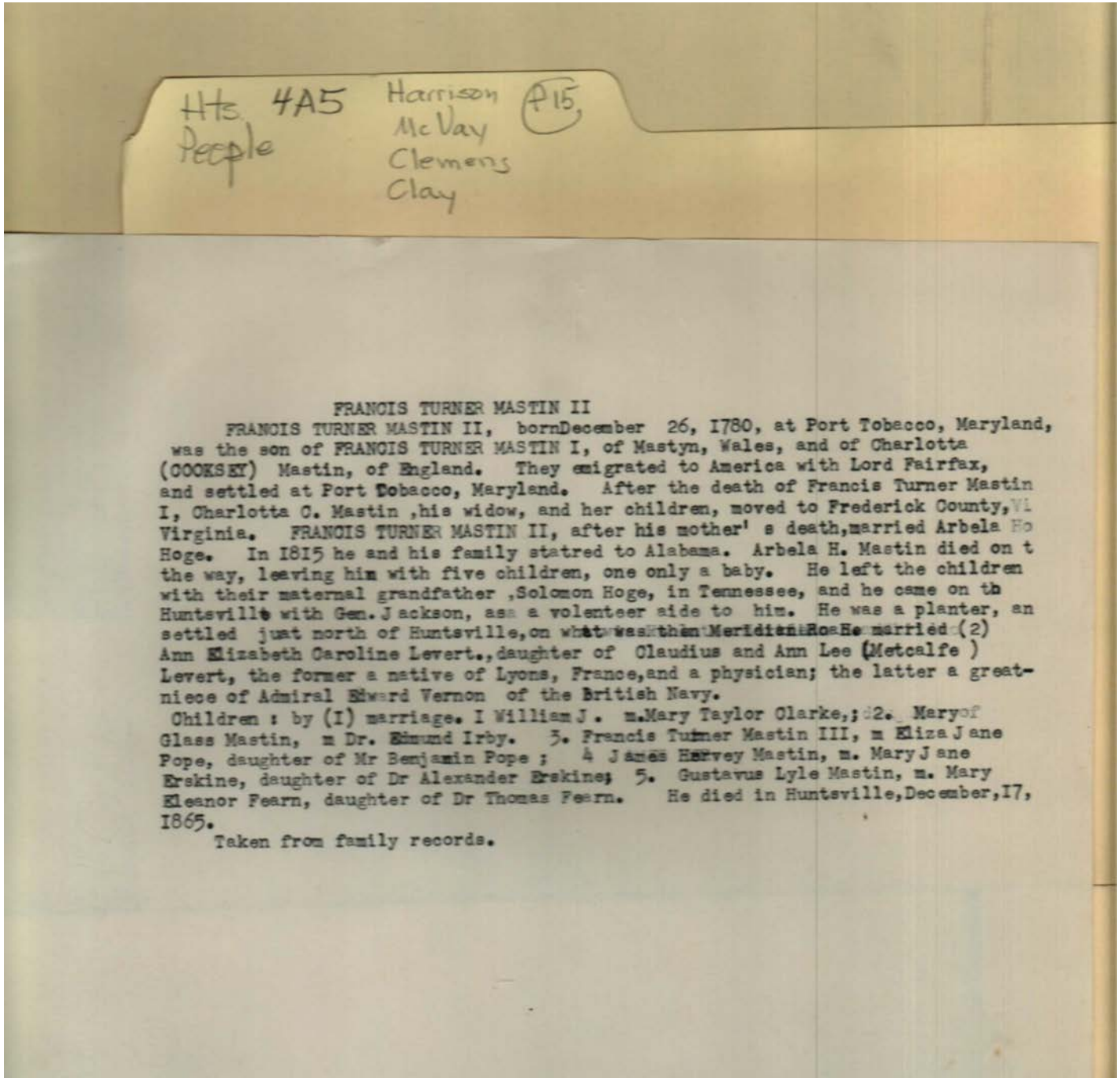

FRANCIS TURNER MASTIN II

FRANCIS TURNER MASTIN II, born December 26, 1780, at Port Tobacco, Maryland, was the son of FRANCIS TURNER MASTIN I, of Mastyn, Wales, and of Charlotta (COOKSEY) Mastin, of England. They emigrated to America with Lord Fairfax, and settled at Port Tobacco, Maryland. After the death of Francis Turner Mastin I, Charlotta C. Mastin, his widow, and her children, moved to Frederick County, VI Virginia. FRANCIS TURNER MASTIN II, after his mother's death, married Arbela H. Hoge. In 1815 he and his family started to Alabama. Arbela H. Mastin died on the way, leaving him with five children, one only a baby. He left the children with their maternal grandfather, Solomon Hoge, in Tennessee, and he came on to Huntsville with Gen. Jackson, as a volunteer aide to him. He was a planter, and settled just north of Huntsville, on what was then Meridian Road. He married (2) Ann Elizabeth Caroline Levert, daughter of Claudius and Ann Lee (Metcalf) Levert, the former a native of Lyons, France, and a physician; the latter a great-niece of Admiral Edward Vernon of the British Navy.
