Dear Mr. Chiles:

Your letter about having received your Minnesota deed without its being recorded, your copy of letter to Mr. Olson, and your receipt and release have all been received. I want to thank you for all of it.

I too got my deed back and so did Dr. Helmers, for Mr. Olsson wrote to both of us at the same time, and sent one of us a carbon. I have done nothing about it so far for your letter came about the same time and I have been waiting to hear the verdict of their attorney before proceeding. I sincerely hope that we will not have to collect all these deeds again and change them, for that will be difficult since all have been signed and notarized, but if it must be it must be.

I have had my North Dakota deed recorded, Thank Goodness! At least it seems that that is clear for me. They did not question the "joint tenants and not as tenants in common". I wish I had sent a copy of the deed to determine whether it was properly executed as I did with my N.D. deed.

With this letter I am sending you a check for the amount which I owe you for the taxes on the Minnesota land. This is what you paid before I decided that I could take the additional acres from Ruth. Miss Bauer sent a check for the \$18.50 to me and a very cordial letter. She said that she and Miss Rath would be satisfied with any plan of operation of the farms. Miss Ruth is in Cape this summer going to school, and is doing very well in her work.

You will note from the Banner that Mr. Asling has resigned in favor of a better position. I shall be sorry in many ways to see him go, for again I am left with no one who knows the ins and outs of the State Department of Education and our relations with The University of Missouri, etc. Even tho we can get a good man to take his place, I know who is going to have to answer the many questions which come up from day to day, and it will not be the new dean. All of our other Faculty members either do not concern themselves or they are from out of the state-- and so I am the goat! That is not so bad, if I don't go to pieces under the strain and I just can not afford to do that. I sincerely hope we can get a good man. There is some talk of introducing Chemistry instead of Physics-- if we can get such a teacher.

As you probably know, the earliest records of this county in Cherokee County, Ala. do not exist.

Mrs. Frank B. Stewart, Centra, Ala. has recently written me about Cherokee Co. Ala. She loaned to me her manuscript, with all the names she had copied, and other data. She lists the cemetery at Bluff, but no Frost tombstones. If they are buried there, they had not have tombstones when she copied the cemetery. I looked over the entire book, and saw several Frost stones, but none born earlier than 1850. You might write Mrs. Stewart, as she is an inhabitant of Cherokee Co.

The earliest census for Cherokee Co. was 1840, and the only Frost family listed was headed by J.D. Frost, 20-30. In 1850, the only one was Jedediah Frost aged 36 born S.C. He appears to be the same J.D. Frost, who married in St. Clair Co. Ala. Nov. 3, 1835, Nancy Bell.

In Madison Co. Ala. one Hannah Frost married Edmond Blankenship, 15 April 1809 (Ek 1 p. 31). Could she be Thomas' aunt? One Hannah Frost obtained a land patent in Madison Co. Ala. (then Miss. Territory) Dec 23, 1809. Also in Madison Co. one Hannah Frost married Marshall Smalling, Dec. 21, 1811. A deed in Madison Co. in 1815 refers to "Hannah Frost's corner". Also, there was a Hannah Frost as head of a family in Shelby Co. Ala. 1830 Census-25th page. 1 male 10-15; 1 male 20-30; 1 female 15-20; 1 female 20-30; 1 female 50-60

I have digressed a lot, but I do not find your Joseph Frost at all in my Alabama records, and I was hoping some of the other data might help. I also have quite a few Tenn. records. You don't happen to know what county in Tenn. they came from, do you?

If you need help any'n, let me know.

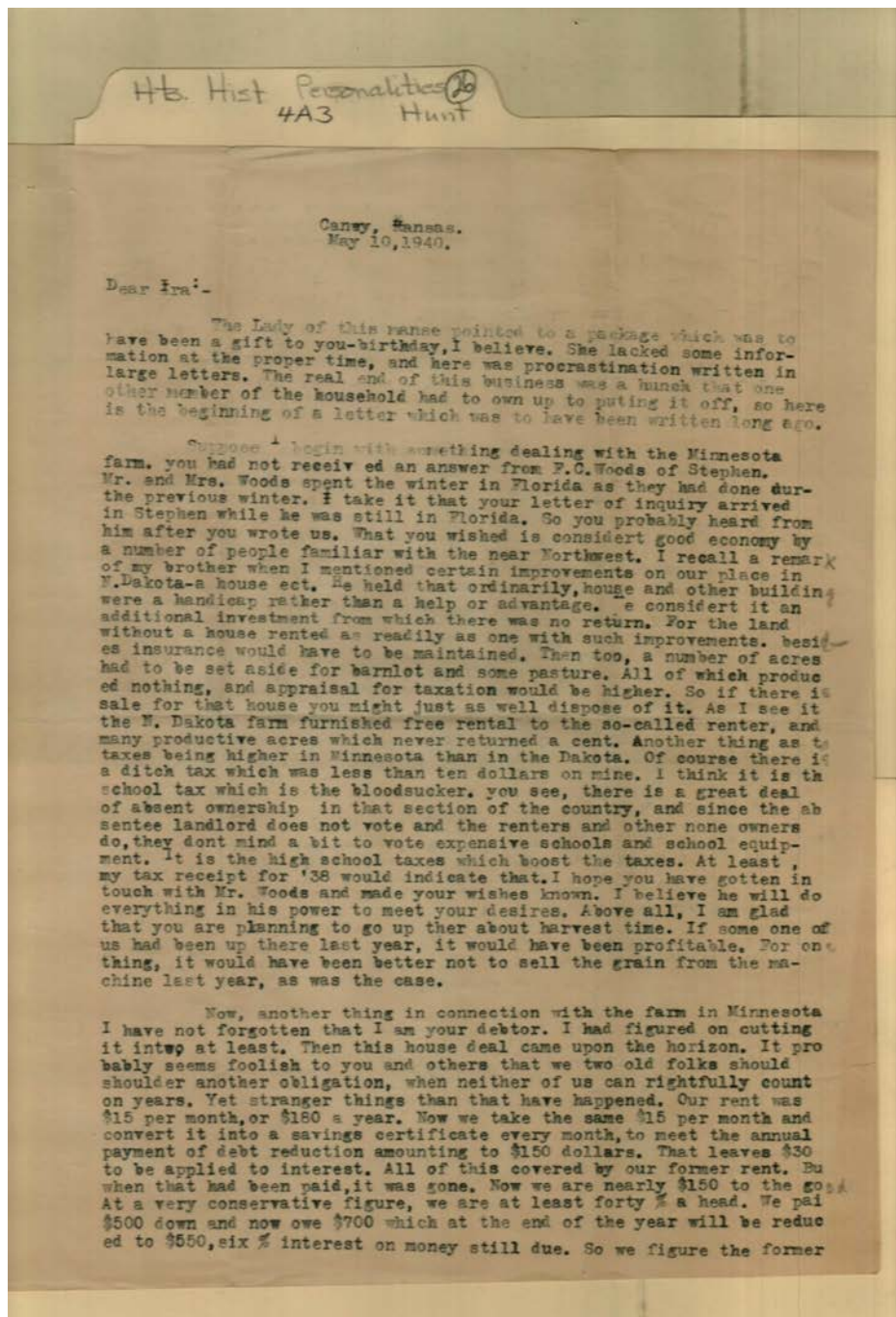

rent pays for the balance in five years or less-much less we hope if there is any kind of crop. Carl has furnished the rent money. No ones life is guaranteed;neither is his. He is ~~earning~~ earning a fine monthly salary. And [^] might add, since late winter he has become an executive. He has been with the company five years. And a company of that size,such advancement is real progress. At the same age, his dad was getting \$500 and house at the four corners near Sigourney, Iowa. If it came to the worst, a loan could be retained with small interest obligation. Let me return to Carl and Elizabeth Ann. They announced the other night, that a new comer was on the way, Due shortly before Christmas. Both of them are counting on that heavily, and so are the old folks in Caney.

Cornelia and her family are getting on well. She is much improved in health. Ross is still working on his Ph.D.though rather discouraged of not having advanced to a college position when his work is practically completed for his doctorate. Alicia is quite a scholar, and is making a fine record.Cornelia wrote in her last letter that she had taken charge of the primary department in the Methodist church to the relief of Dr. Aiken,pastor of First Church. She is remodeling the other house she bought in '36.

Now, take this household. Mother is the best man of the two. I have a very fine garden this year though it is not on our lot. That particular lot has gone to Bermuda grass. It is a very tough job to gain control over its roots. So I rent from our neighbor to the east. Have a fine potato crop in, and it looks promising. Was at work pumping poison upon the potato bugs who have been with us since the first potato peeped out of the ground. Another hoeing of this particular crop will finish the work there. Though this spring has been a very backward season, yet we expect to have new peas next week. Half of the one hundred tomato plants [^] have set out,are in bloom, or should I say,have the first blossoms. It seems to me there is scarcely a day when something or other is not planted. To-day it was a new and superior kind of bean which a visitor of last Sunday sent me also a better kind of cucumber. Corn is six inches high, and a good stand. Forty-eight chicks seven weeks old are doing excellently. The better birds tip the scale at ~~1 1/2~~ lbs. I mean 1 1/2 lbs. So in little more than eight weeks should give me two pound broilers. Come over some Sunday and [^] will serve the finest thing in delicate meats. That give you an idea of the important problems I am wrestling with. Last Sunda I preached in the Presbyterean Church here in Caney. The pastor was absent. Also taught a series on the Methodist advance in the U.S. by Mott. Against my advice and protest I was made teacher of a Sunday school class consisting of senior high school age by their choice and vote. We have rather interesting times,while we get a birds-eye view of the Prophets and their message.

Now, I had better seek the end of this ramble or you will miss a class of Mountain White adults. You havent run across any of Sopers evolution while rambling over the hills and through the woods? We hope you will include southern Kansas and northern Oklahoma in your next year's itinerary. You must see Clarence' and Elma's boy. He is a fine sturdy chap. He liked Mother's lemonade,pink lemonade very much and also her cookies. Hevis doing his first walking exhibit. As yet he likes his fours better than his twos,safety first.

The documents copied below give an authentic account of the transaction which resulted in Twickenham, now Huntsville, becoming the county seat of Madison County, and the first sale of town lots in Huntsville:

"Sugar Forest 11th Jul. 1810
Messrs. Jackson and Anderson.

I returned yesterday from Huntsville Major Walker and myself after several days hard negotiations with the Commissioners, did on the 5th July inst., enter into terms for fixing the seat of Justice and laying out a town at Huntsville. You may readily expect from the delay that we had much difficulty in establishing that as the permanent site, - we had Col. Ward against us in and throughout the whole proceedings, with all his eloquence and oratory as well in the Cabinet with closed doors, as in a Stump Speech to the populace. The terms are these, - the town was first laid out say to the amount of sixty acres, with the public square in the center, we then run a line through the center and gave to the Commissioners their choice half, or side of the town to the amount of 30 acres at \$25.00 per acre, the proprietors bound to convey all their right under government with a quit claim deed only - giving the town free use of the water for all necessary and ordinary purposes, but reserving to the proprietors the sole right of the soil in and around the spring and its branch, so that they may at any time erect any machinery they may think proper, etc.

On the 5th in the evening we opened the sales, - and the Commissioners finding lots sell well immediately opened theirs, which impeded the sale of ours, they sold 24 lots and we sold 4 in the whole 28 lots sold for upward of \$8000 dollars, the Commissioners have yet to sell 10 lots and the proprietors 34 - We concluded it would be better to postpone the sale for a farther notice when I think you will have no reason to complain of your speculation. I have with me a plan of Twickenham the seat of Justice for Madison County, N. E. and a copy of the articles of agreement between the proprietors and Commissioners, etc. which I will have the pleasure to lay before you in a few days - lots sold for \$750, - 715 - 617 - 500 - 615 - 515 - 385 - 367 - and from that down to \$100 on the outside - the proprietors have yet four lots on the public square that are equally valuable with those sold.

Dear Brother -

Misfortune has at length induced me to write to you; and as my loss is one of no ordinary magnitude, I should reflect on myself were I to withhold it from you. My eldest daughter (Polly) is dead. She was taken on the 29th, June with the fever & died after an illness of six days on the 5th July inst. To have had a family for twenty years & upwards, & never to have been crossed with a misfortune of this kind before; to have raised a blooming & promising daughter to the age of 18 years, and then to have her swept away, by the chill blasts of death's destructive storm, is a circumstance that has inflicted upon my heart a wound that nothing can ever heal while my memory serves me. But when I reflect that our loss is her infinite gain, the heaving sigh & gushing tear are for a moment checked. She gave the most unequivocal evidence of her acceptance with God & seemed to shrink at the cold touch of death with perfect tranquility & without a groan or a murmur. She enjoined it on me & all the family, to get religion & meet her in Heaven. And I feel at this moment a resolution to try and obey her injunction. To be told by a dying and affectionate daughter, in the last agonies of death, "Father I want you to meet me in Heaven," is a solicitation that none but the most abject heart could withstand; it has created feelings in my bosom that I hope may never be erased. She sung in her last moments part of the following lines -

"When we have been there ten thousand years,
Bright shining as the sun,
We have no less days to sing Gods praise,
Than when we first begun"

Part of these lines she sung distinctly, after death had stamped his gloomy seal on her countenance, which caused tears of Gratitude to God to flow, particularly from her mother, as well as regret for her death.

Excuse me for having consumed this much of your time in this Melancholly detail, but it is the circumstance that I could write to you about, that would either interest you or myself. The ballance of the family are well. Our corn crops are good, wheat crops quite inferior. I continue to be sheriff yet, but am almost induced to quit from the hardship of the times. I shall probably come to see you this fall, if my business in Alabama is not otherwise adjusted.
