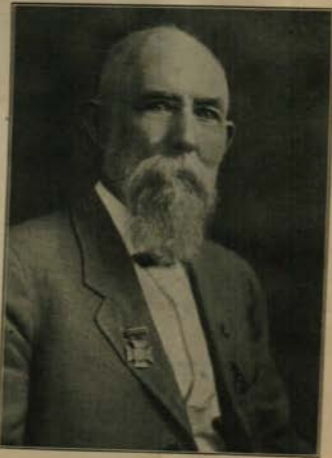
for a bit. I was as wrothy as the balance, and we were fierce to listen to, but Colonel Harvey only smiled grimly as he took in the situation.
