History...

Romance, adventure and politics first put Demopolis on the map. Napoleonic refugees came here in 1817 with land grants to establish a "vine and Olive Colony." These French officers and their ladies were ill-suited to the cultivation of grapes and olives as were the soil and the climate. The colonists left, but they are remembered in place names and in artifacts at the Marengo County Historical Society's house museum, Bluff Hall.

Before the plantation society developed, there were Indians. Gaineswood was named for the Choctaw Indian agent from whose log cabin the mansion was created.


Gaineswood, a national Historic Landmark, was restored by the Alabama Historical Commission. Many of its original furnishings were donated or loaned by descendants of its builder, Gen. Nathan Bryan Whitfield. Hours are 9-5 daily, 1-5 Sunday and closed on state holidays.



Built as a wedding present in 1832, Bluff Hall is open 10-5 Tuesday-Saturday and 2-5 Sunday. Its early Federal style architecture has been amended by the later addition of a Greek Revival gallery.



The White Bluffs at Demopolis, the landing site of the French exiles, are outcroppings of Selma chalk that, until the construction of the waterway, towered an additional 40 feet above the Tombigbee.



Three homes built while "cotton was king" are listed on the National Register as is the Glover Mausoleum and most of downtown Demopolis.

High on the historic bluffs, the Demopolis Civic Center offers convenient meeting facilities and boasts a spectacular view of the Tombigbee and its increasing and diverse river traffic.



The Canebrake Players present a variety of theatrical productions each year, including an annual Christmas musical. All are staged in the "old Main Street school," another National Register property.

Gateway to the Tenn - Tom...


Demopolis is situated at the southern end of the 234-mile-long Tennessee-Tombigbee Water system and is considered the "gateway" to the system from Mobile. Barge traffic of coal, chemicals, petroleum and agricultural products moves past pushed by tugboats that salute residents with their horns in passing.

The waterway connects the Port of Mobile with the navigable portion of the Tennessee River, opening a direct route from the American heartland to southeastern shipping facilities. Shipping and transportation savings in adjacent states are expected to add up to hundreds of millions of dollars in just the early days of the waterway.


Development along the banks of the Tenn-Tom is well underway. Demopolis is well-started on its effort to use the river efficiently with its new yacht basin, its parks, its industries, and its civic concern for the history, beauty and potential of this early and continuing resource.




Demopolis has barge traffic from both the newly opened Tenn-Tom and the long established Warrior-Tombigbee waterway. The confluence of the two rivers is about a mile upstream.



Two industrial parks are located near Demopolis as is a municipal airport with a lighted 5,000 foot paved runway. For more information phone 205-289-1852.



The first inland dock in a projected string of 12 Alabama State Docks was built in Demopolis in 1965. It is the most active of the seven completed facilities in the state.



The new Demopolis Yacht Basin offers full service accommodations to pleasure and commercial traffic on the Black Warrior and Tenn-Tom Rivers.

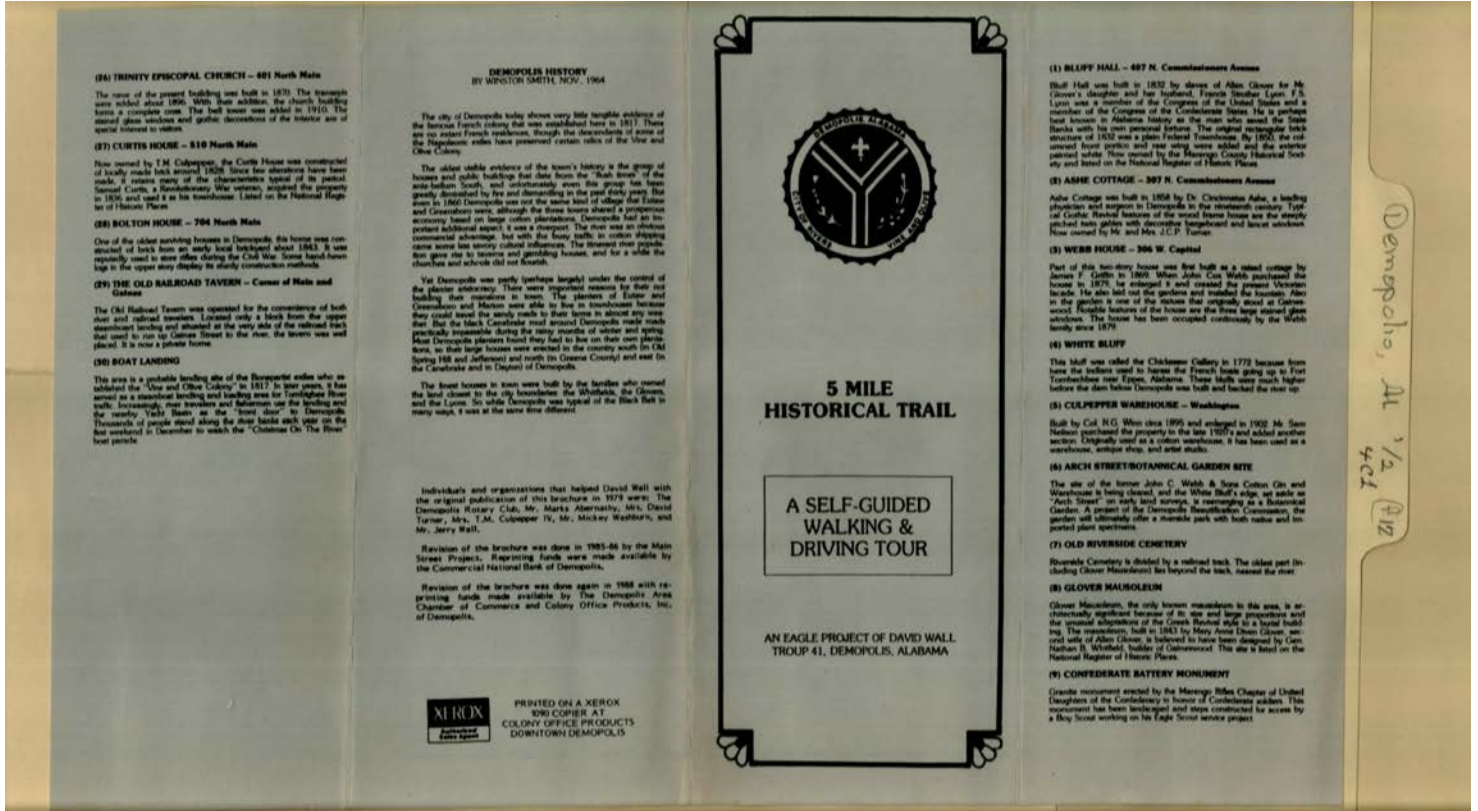

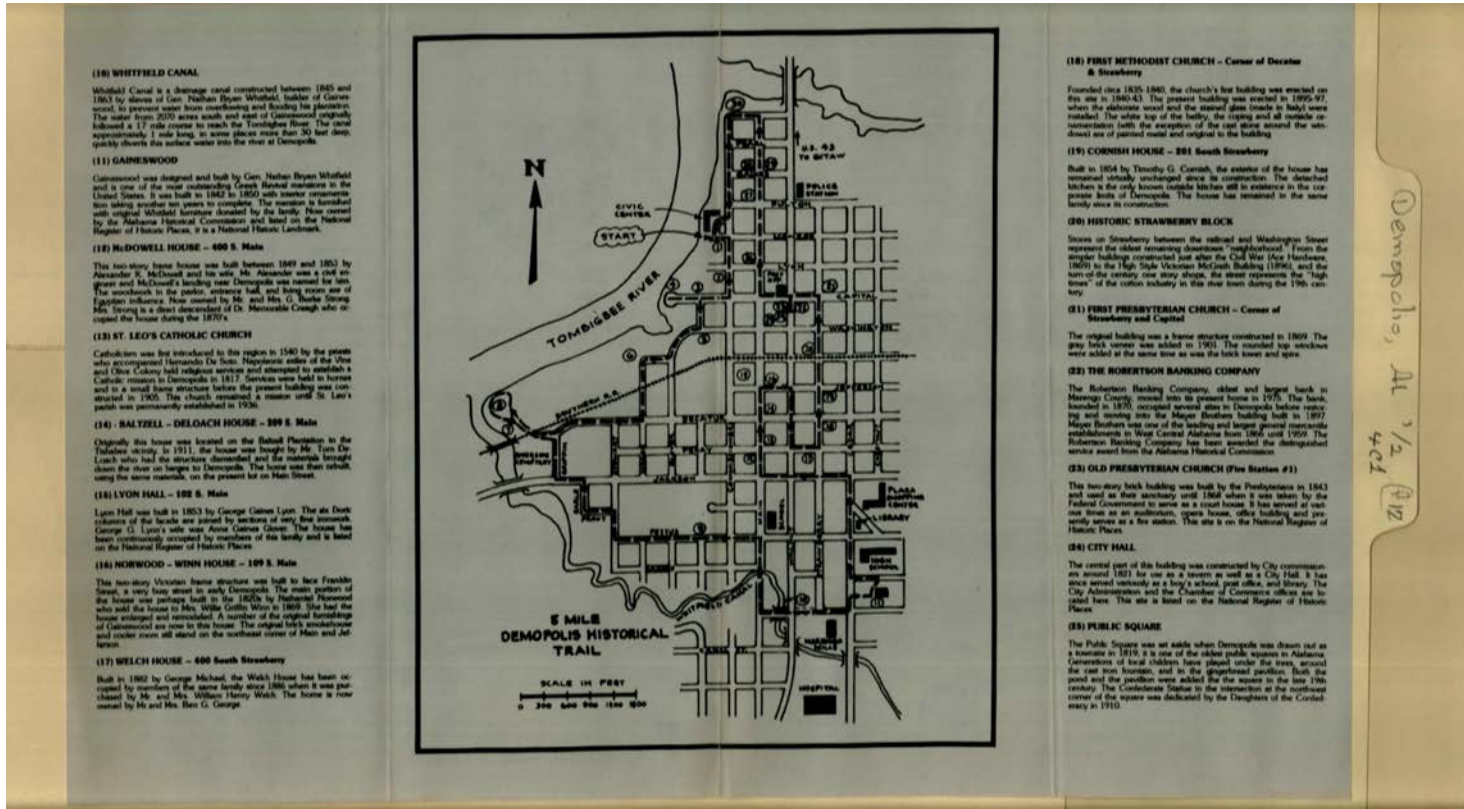



It began as a two-room cabin in the midst of a thousand acres, destined to become the social center of the Black Belt, a region distinctive for its dark, fecund soil. The plantation was near the river town of Demopolis founded by exiled French aristocrats and is now part of the town. The years of construction and refinement of the house began in 1821 and lasted until the Civil War.

The builder, General Nathan Bryan Whitfield, was a planter and a Renaissance man of sorts. He was his own architect, engineer, foreman and sometimes craftsman. Dedicated to having only the best for his home, down to silver door hardware, he traveled and gathered pieces from here and abroad. Gaineswood is famed for its innovative features and has been compared to Jefferson's Monticello in ingenuity.

Step into Gaineswood and savor a time and place that created the legends of the Old South. It's still here.

Step into this plantation palace and be swept into the heart of the Black Belt's cotton kingdom. Enter through gates of wrought iron—each weighs a ton—past grounds graced by a garden pavilion, the legendary Pushmataha oak, statuary and balustraded terraces and turn a silvered doorknob.

Then you will experience Gaineswood and another time and place.

Your reflection will disappear into endless ballroom mirrors and the house will follow a plan of its own as you explore its twenty rooms. It will lead you through cool columned and galleried rooms and some flooded with sunlight from glassed ceiling domes and accented by freizes and medallions of wood, plaster, cast iron and even deeply carved leather.

Family members peer from portraits as you move through rooms with rich wallpapers—duplicates of the original ones hand-block painted in France; rooms with



Italian veined marble mantels and furnishings to be found nowhere else.

Much of it was designed only for Gaineswood, one of the few house museums in the South to feature its original furniture and accessories. There are three uniquely carved four-poster beds and the massive case for the towering epergne was especially made for the dining room and has no twin. The rare flutina, a piano-like invention of the master of the home, is the only one in existence. And Gaineswood, of course, has its own musical ghost.

Browse in the gift shop for books about the Gaineswood ghost, traditional recipes and other items related to the history and fables of the fascinating house and others in the state.

Alabama's most magnificent Greek Revival mansion was twenty years in the building and recently underwent a detailed four-year restoration to its ante bellum splendor, awaiting your visit.

Gaineswood is the house that cotton built.

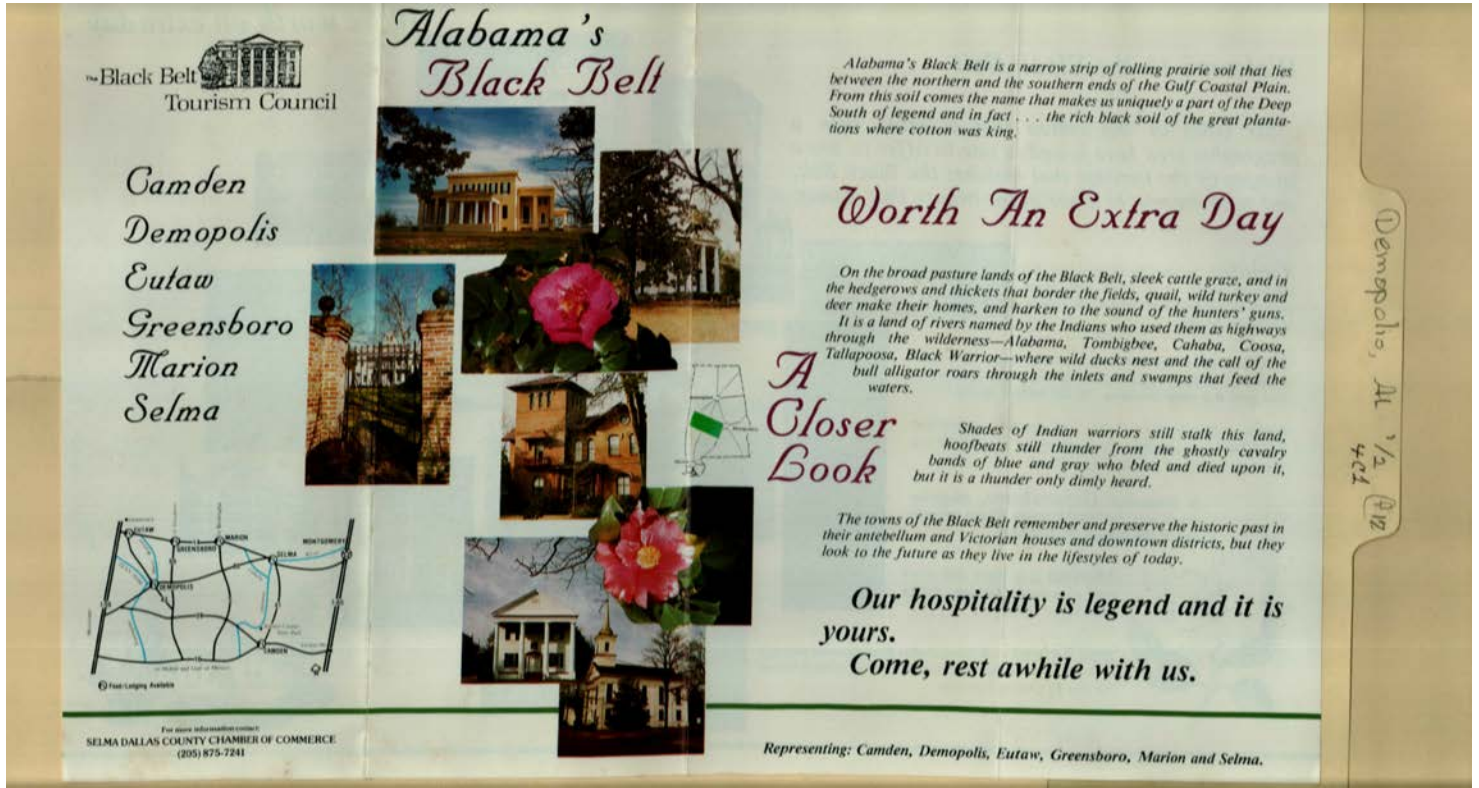

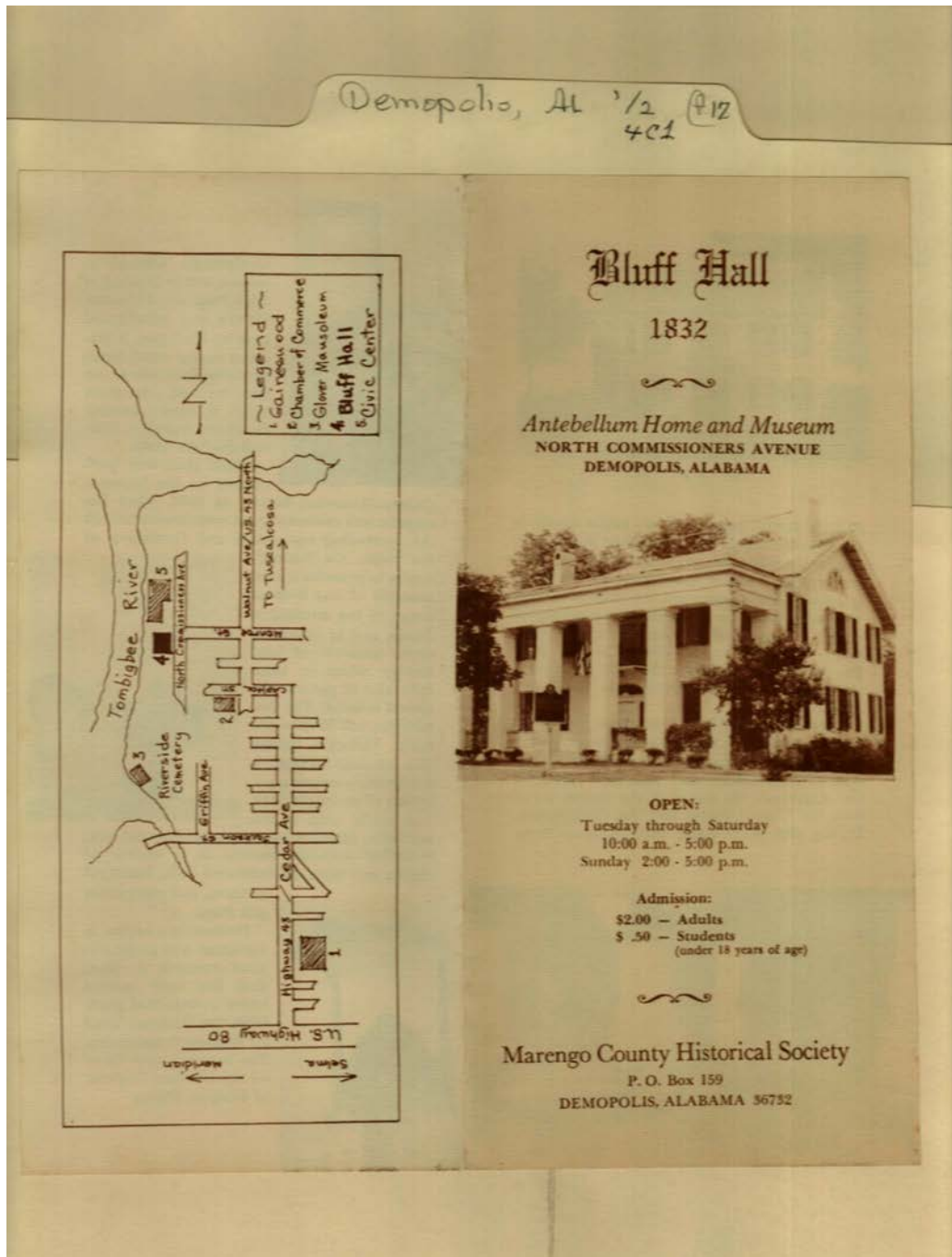

Original facade — 1832

BLUFF HALL represents two major trends in the architecture of the antebellum South. The original rectangular brick structure of 1832 was a plain Federal townhouse. By 1850 the columned front portico and the large rear wing were added, and the whole exterior was painted white — changes which reflect a shift in taste to the more fashionable Greek Revival style. The house was named for the high chalk bluff on which it stands, overlooking the Tombigbee River.

Francis Strother Lyon, for whose family the house was built in 1832, was a lawyer, cotton planter (his plantation "Bermuda Hill" lies east of Demopolis), and respected politician and statesman. He served in the congresses of both the United States and the Confederacy. During the War, Bluff Hall received many



Confederate officers as guests, and in October of 1863 President Jefferson Davis was entertained here by Mr. Lyon. A frequent visitor was General Leonidas Polk, whose son later married a daughter of F. S. Lyon; another daughter married General Zachary Deas.

Bluff Hall was purchased by the Marengo County Historical Society in 1967, when Demopolis was celebrating its sesquicentennial. In the continuing restoration and furnishing of the house, the Society's aim is to preserve a good example of one kind of home in the antebellum South, and to provide a small museum of local history which is hopefully also of general historical interest. The furnishings are Empire and early Victorian pieces. One unusual exhibit is the Society's growing collection of period clothing.

A crafts shop is also available, offering handmade articles for sale, including split-oak baskets in a variety of shapes and sizes, old-fashioned dolls, historical pictures, and many other gift items.

Professional advice in historical and archaeological research at Bluff Hall has been secured under a consultant grant from the National Trust for Historic Preservation. The house is now listed on the National Register of Historic Places.

Bluff Hall
 Overlooking the Tombigbee River, Bluff Hall exemplifies two major architectural trends in the antebellum South. Built in 1832 as a father's gift to his daughter, the original brick Federal-style structure was modified to Greek Revival in the 1850s by the addition of the columned portico, a large rear wing, and white paint.

Francis Strother Lyon, for whose family the house was built, was a lawyer, cotton planter (his plantation lay east of Demopolis), and respected politician and statesman. He served in the congresses of both the United States and the Confederacy. During the Civil War, the house received many Confederate officers as guests. President Jefferson Davis was entertained here in 1863. In recent years the home was sold several times and converted into apartments.

Bluff Hall was purchased by the Marengo County Historical Society in 1967, when Demopolis was celebrating its sesquicentennial. Restoring and furnishing the house is a major and ongoing undertaking. Bluff Hall contains period clothing, Empire and Victorian furniture, a display of local history, and some unusual gadgets in the kitchen area. There is also an herb garden and a gift shop. Bluff Hall is listed on the National Register of Historic Places. Guided tours Tuesday through Saturday from 10 to 5, Sunday 2 to 5, closed Jan. 1, Thanksgiving and Dec. 25. Located at 405 Commissioners Avenue, phone 289-1666.

Gaineswood
 Built by General Nathan Bryan Whitfield (who moved with his family from North Carolina to Marengo County, Alabama in 1834), Gaineswood is located on the outskirts of Demopolis. Between 1842 and the outbreak of the Civil War, the house evolved from a two-room cabin surrounded by 1,000 acres of cotton into a Greek revival-style mansion. General Whitfield was his own architect, though he had

no formal training. The labor was done mostly by slaves, some of whom were extremely accomplished carpenters and plasterers (don't miss the ornamentation inside the domes at Gaineswood).

Three styles of Greek architecture are represented in the house: Doric style outside, Ionic for the interior, and Corinthian in the drawing room. Floor-to-ceiling mirrors imported from France made the Drawing Room seem almost endless. The house was situated in a grove of evergreens and oaks. Greek urns and marble statues decorated the flower gardens. South of the big house were servant houses, a barn, stables, a smokehouse, a shop, the "office," and a kitchen with its great fireplace and ovens. A boathouse sat at the edge of a large artificial lake (long ago dried up). A vegetables plot and orchards provided food for the table.

Gaineswood contains much of its original furnishings as well as several inventions of its builder including a "flutena," sort of a cross between a music box and a player piano. The restored antebellum mansion is open Monday through Saturday from 9 to 5, Sunday 1 to 5; closed state holidays. Located at Cedar and Whitfield Streets, phone 289-4846.

The White Bluffs
Towering over the Tombigbee River, the bluffs are composed of Selma Chalk, a limestone formation rich in fossils. Originally between 70 and 80 feet high, the bluffs were once called the "Chickasaw Gallery" because early Indian inhabitants harassed boats from them. In 1817, the Bluffs were the landing site of the Bonapartist exiles.

Botanical Gardens
During 1988, an exciting project took shape on land that had, in 1819, been platted as public by the city fathers. High above the Tombigbee River, six lovely acres have been landscaped with plants and trees laid out along winding pathways. The Demopolis Botanical Gardens, owned and operated by the city, successfully combined public and private efforts. A federal grant paid for landfill, city labor prepared the site, and private contributions have purchased wild flowers, indigenous trees, and hundreds of day lily bulbs. The gardens are attracting all kinds of birds, as well as squirrels and rabbits.

Demopolis Public Square
One of the oldest public squares in Alabama, Confederate Square was laid out in 1819. Its handsome pavilion and benches under shade trees invite old and young alike to pause and rest. The cast iron fountain and Confederate Statue are popular picture-taking spots. Each October the Square comes alive during Art in the Park, 1988 marking the 25th anniversary of this art and craft show and sale.

Whitfield Canal
General Whitfield constructed a canal to drain his 2,070 acres. Constructed by slaves between 1845 and 1863, the canal originally followed a 17-mile course to reach the Tombigbee

River. The surviving section, approximately one mile long and in some places 30 feet deep, quickly diverts surface water into the river at Demopolis.

Lock and Dam

The Demopolis Lock and Dam is the last one before Mobile. The water level above the dam is some 15 to 20 feet higher than below. Constructed by the Corps of Army Engineers, the dam created a 10,000-acre lake which has become a popular recreation area. The lock is like an elevator. It is fascinating to watch groups of barges, lashed together with metal cables, navigate into the long and narrow channel, stopping just short of the gates. It takes just minutes for the lock to fill or empty, and the barges to continue their journey.

Side Trips

Demopolis is well located for a number of interesting side trips. Less than an hour's drive north on Highway 43, Greentrack is located in Eutaw. Pick your favorite greyhound to win and enjoy watching the exciting, fast-paced racing action from the climate controlled comfort of the clubhouse. Cocktails, a delicious dinner, and 12 exciting races make for a memorable

evening's entertainment, especially if you're a big winner. Open year-round except Christmas week. Racing nightly from 8 p.m., except Sunday. Matinees Wednesday and Friday at 4 p.m. and Saturday at 1:30 p.m.

Prehistoric temple mounds, a reconstructed Indian village illustrating the ways of life of these early Alabamians, and burial grounds are located on the banks of the Black Warrior River, north of Moundville on Highway 69. Native Americans of the advanced Mississippian culture occupied this site more than 700 years ago; their story is told in an archaeological museum which features two preserved excavations. The Easter Sunrise Pageant is held here.

Northeast of Demopolis on State Road 25 Payne Lake and Talladega National Forest are popular for picnicking, fishing, swimming, hiking and camping.

About a half-hour from Demopolis on Highway 17, Alamuchee-Bellamy Covered Bridge stands on the campus of Livingston University. Built over the Sarcamooshee River prior to the Civil War, its hand-hewn heartpine timbers are joined with wooden pegs. The bridge, moved to its present site in 1969, is now fully restored.

When you launch your boat from a ramp in Foscue Creek National Park, your day on the Tombigbee River can be as full of adventure or as relaxing as you wish.

Christmas on the River

The first Christmas on the River, sponsored by the Chamber of Commerce and a local youth group, was held in 1972. It was a one-night celebration featuring 15 boats, crudely decorated with lights, floating down the Tombigbee River. Governor and Mrs. George Wallace threw the switch to turn on the downtown holiday lights, and there were fireworks. Some 5,000 people showed up.

This year the event will be bigger than ever! The festivities begin the Sunday before the first Saturday in December with the first night of the Canebrake Players' production of "Wizard of Oz." For a week, the community celebrates with children's parades and pageants, an art and craft fair (attracting more than 100 exhibitors), musical performances, and special events at Demopolis' two antebellum homes. The First Baptist Church choir forms a "Living Christmas Tree" at the civic center. Gainswood and Bluff Hall are decorated with fresh fruit and greenery, with candlelight tours adding to the holiday splendor. Each year more events are added.

Saturday night's grand finale begins at 7 p.m. with elaborately-decorated boats floating down the Tombigbee River. Tiny light bulbs form 25-foot elves on the vessel which leads the spectacular parade. Fireworks add to the excitement. Thousands stand along a mile of river bank on the White Bluffs where Napoleonic exiles landed in 1817. From this grandstand they view the glittering pageant on the water stage. Putting Roots Down in Demopolis

A town of almost 7,800 people, Demopolis is a delightful place to live. Clean air and water offer a healthy climate in which to grow up and grow old. Old-fashioned values and friendliness make its citizens excellent neighbors. Even before you have been introduced, you'll find people smiling and nodding and waving, giving a warm welcome whether you're a vacationer or a transplant.

A Superb Location

Located in west-central Alabama, at the confluence of the Tombigbee-Black Warrior rivers, Demopolis is the gateway to the Tennessee-Tombigbee Waterway System. Low coast barge service is available between Mid-America and world markets through the port of Mobile. Strategically positioned within the geographic triangle formed by Tuscaloosa to the north, Mobile to the south, and Montgomery to the east, Demopolis possesses an excellent labor pool, a variety of scenic and recreational activities, a modern transportation system, and many other resources. It is one of the largest cities in Marengo County. Some 75,000 people live within a 30-mile radius.

A Brief History

The earliest inhabitants of Alabama — Cherokee, Chickasaw, Choctaw and Creek — were attracted by plentiful game, fish, nuts and

berries. The first Europeans to arrive were Spanish Conquistadors sailing along the coast in 1540, making forays into the interior in search of gold. French traders and missionaries traveling between Canada and the Gulf of Mexico settled Mobile in 1702. Britain was awarded the territory in 1763 after the French and Indian War. The Louisiana Purchase of 1803 gave the area to the United States, and Alabama achieved statehood in 1819.

In the 1820s more farmers, attracted by the area's dark and fertile soil (clay filled with organic matter, sometimes 600 feet thick), arrived to plant cotton along the banks of the Tombigbee River. Thus began an era of great prosperity during which Demopolis became a first-rate port, so advantageous was its location at the confluence of the Black Warrior River and the Tombigbee. In the mid-19th century, the 150-mile-trip from Demopolis to Mobile was a two-night affair by steamboat, the boats supplying superior food and accommodations.

Recreational Facilities

There are plenty of outdoor things to do most of the year in and around Demopolis. Fishing, camping, picnicking, hiking, and boating can all be enjoyed at Foscue Creek National Park, just two miles away. Foscue is operated by the U.S. Corps. of Army Engineers.

Within the city limits, Lake Demopolis is famous for its bass fishing, being the site of numerous tournaments throughout the year. If you trailer your own boat, there are numerous boat ramps in the area. If you don't have a boat, you might rent one at the Yacht Basin.

Sports enthusiasts will find some 50 teams for boys, girls and adults ranging from T-ball and Tiny Tiger football to men's and women's softball. These are played on city-maintained fields and at the Dixie Youth Complex at Westside School. The public can enjoy a public swimming pool at Jones Recreation Center and seven lighted tennis courts around town. Members can use the 18-hole golf course, the swimming pool, tennis courts, and two fishing lakes at the Demopolis Country Club.

Religious Facilities

Spiritual needs are well-tended by 21 Protestant houses of worship, one Roman Catholic church and one Jewish synagogue. These institutions also provide a social outlet, holding potluck suppers and other activities on a regular basis.

Cultural Activities

The Demopolis Civic Center is the site of occasional concerts, and can be rented for private and public events. Demopolis' little theater

group, Canebrake Players, may not be able to rival Montgomery's Shakespeare Festival Theater, but they have received wide acclaim for the near-professional quality of their acting, set-design, and costuming. Since their organization in 1981 the group has largely overcome the handicap of not having a suitable auditorium by spending many hours improving the facilities at a city school building which was no longer in use.

Three or four productions are scheduled each year, and they have included comedy, drama, mystery, musicals, and fantasy. In addition to such classics as "Blithe Spirit," "Born

The Demopolis Public Library

Although its 19,871 volumes are mainly reading material for the entertainment of old and young alike, the Demopolis Public Library does contain an extensive collection of non-fiction material including a reference department and small genealogy section. Storyhour is held each Monday afternoon, and during the summer, there is a six-week reading program for children with such activities as craft, treasure trivis hunts, and readers of the week.

In 1989, the library will move into a "new" building in downtown. Adequate parking and a central location are two of the advantages of the move. The new Library will supplement and enhance local education, as well as provide information and services for some 75,000 people in a 30-mile radii. or subsidizes concerts (held at the Civic Center or at City Landing across from the marina), the Fourth of July Fireworks display, Art in the Park in Confederate Square (first Saturday in October), and Christmas on the River (the first Saturday in December). Most of these activities are free to the public.

Health Care

Bryan W. Whitfield Memorial Hospital is a 99-bed, municipal, non-profit, JCAHO-accredited facility offering medical/surgical, maternity, nuclear medicine, physical therapy, intensive care, endoscopy, and diagnostic radiology. Comprehensive care is offered through an affiliation network of tertiary and university hospitals. There are ten physicians, three dentists, and two optometrists in the Demopolis area.

Education

Kindergarten through 12th grade students are served by three public schools operated by the city and one private academy. Special needs are met at West Alabama Mental Health Center/Achievement Center for Special Children. Job training is provided at Marengo County Area Vocational School in Linden, some 16 miles away. Higher education is provided at

Livingston University (a 30-mile drive), University of Alabama in Tuscaloosa (50 miles), and George C. Wallace State Community College in Selma (50 miles).

Industry
Numerous companies have plants and offices in or near Demopolis: Gulf States Paper Corp., Citadel Cement, Miller & Company, Taylor Veneer Mill, Griffith Packing, Borden Chemical, Demopolis Hickory Mill, Chemical-4, American Cyanamid, Thermogas, River City Industries, and Vanity Fair, to name a few. The forests in the area supply a hickory mill and paper plant, while a factory that makes plastic containers imports its raw goods by rail. Blue Water Catfish, a fish processing plant and the newest firm in the area, has some 70 employees.

Demopolis and Marengo County have a growing labor force built around a strong nucleus of skilled workers, technicians, and administrative personnel. With a modern education system that is providing new opportunities in industrial and technical training, Marengo County's labor force is fully capable of meeting a company's personnel needs both now and in the future.

Two buildings and numerous industrial sites provide a wide range of locations for businesses. The Demopolis Industrial Development Board and the Demopolis Area Chamber of Commerce can supply addition information about sites, utilities, transportation, and the labor pool.

In Summary
Although most of the residents of Demopolis are second and even third generation, it is a town which attracts people. A small group of enthusiastic new citizens live at the marina. These newest immigrants came for a holiday and quickly became part of the community. Long-time residents and newcomers join together to preserve the best of the past as progress comes to Demopolis.

- Give preference to development that would increase the employability of low-income and dependent residents;
- Promote the maintenance of high quality air, water, land and amenity resources throughout Sumter County;
- Conserve Sumter County's resources to assure the availability of land for the production of food and fiber, for the enjoyment of scenic beauty, for recreation and for the continuing use of natural resources;
- Promote the early completion of a detailed county soil survey as a vital and necessary tool for countywide planning and development;
- Reserve key watershed and aquifer recharge areas for uses such as recreation, forestry, agriculture and other compatible, low-density development;
- Seek to maintain an abundance of high quality wildlife habitat throughout the county;
- Preserve and protect unique and important natural areas and critical habitats of rare and endangered species;
- Encourage the reservation of forest lands for the growth and harvest of forest products, recreational uses, mining, and scattered housing and minimal uses and for a reserve of land for agriculture;
- Reserve historic sites and structures for uses that are compatible with and will assure preservation of Sumter County's historic heritage;
- Retain areas containing valuable mineral resources in uses that will not conflict with resource extraction;
- Actively promote and support restoration of mineral extraction operations so that agricultural and forestry potential will be no less than were present prior to mining and runoff and erosion rates will be no greater than were present before mining;
- Retain critical resource and development areas and areas that pose severe hazards to public safety in non-structural uses;
- Seek authority to restrict development in all areas that are subject to severe environmental hazards—especially flood-prone and landslide-prone areas, steep slopes, areas subject to high fire risk and severe erosion and other areas not appropriate for structural development;
- Promote and support the opportunity for all families to obtain decent, safe and sound housing in suitable living environments within their financial means;
- Discourage social constraints and discrimination in housing;
- Promote maximum public and private sector investment in the local housing construction and rehabilitation markets;
- Encourage new construction methods and housing types that may better serve lower-income residents;
- Join with neighboring counties in supporting the reactivation and expansion of the Regional Housing Authority;
- Proceed only with extreme caution on planning future large-scale, low-income housing developments in rural areas.

- Give the highest priority to making existing substandard dwellings habitable and then proceed to rebuild on present sites;
- Attempt to combine local park and school playground facilities, wherever possible, to prevent duplication of expenses on recreational facilities;

- Cooperate with the Regional Commission to investigate the feasibility of a highway corridor through the region to facilitate northwest-to-southeast traffic flow.

Bluff Hall, located on the White Bluffs where the followers of Napoleon Bonaparte settled, was purchased by the Mayaguez Chapter Historical Society in 1947 to celebrate the 150th birthday of Demopolis. Carefully restored to reflect the lifestyle of its original owners, Sara Serena and Francis Bonaparte Lyon, Bluff Hall offers the opportunity to imagine how family life may have been in 1832.

Bullet Benderson remembers ruckus when price of gas increased to 12c

James "Bullet" Benderson, age 86, says that when he was a young boy in the early 1900s Demopolis was a very busy place. Bullet's favorite memory was going to the horse tracks on Highway 80. The tracks were located where Thermogas now.

He made his living as a carpenter and, when business was slow, he would move on to follow general contractors. Sometimes the grass wasn't very green and Bullet would return home to Demopolis.

He said, "People really started spending when gas went from 18¢ a gallon to 12¢." "You couldn't afford to go very far.

As a young man, Bullet's need for life would result in having to make a trip or two to London to visit Judge Elmore. It would take him three or four days to get to London. "You get there the best way you could." The judge would start out in his buggy on Sunday morning being to be there on time by Monday morning.

Many memories of growing up on Main Street, the friends and family brought a smile to Bullet's face. Even road work that was so much "I had homes with only a lawn, hand saw, hammer, and nails." "Carpenters made the oil houses and were glad to get that."

Bullet still resides in Demopolis and enjoys talking and reminiscing about growing.



Arch Street Botanical Garden

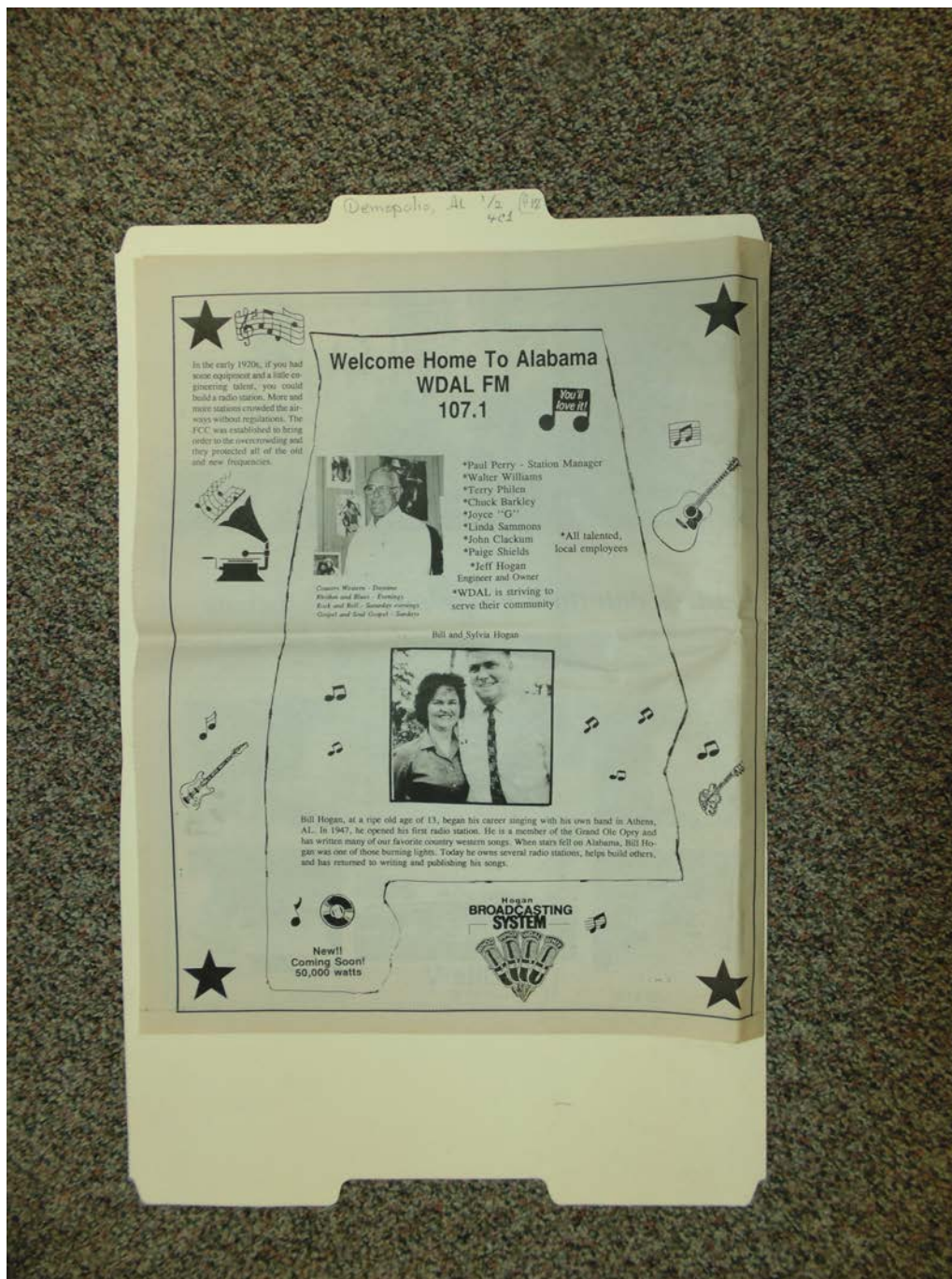

Historic Glover Mausoleum



Glover Mausoleum in Riverside Cemetery is located approximately 50 yards east of a wall overlooking the Tombigbee River. The mausoleum was built in the 1880s by Mrs. Mary Ann Drove Glover, widow of Adam Glover, in a family possession. In 1938 a cast iron fence was erected but most of the fence was removed after 1935. The building is constructed of brick covered with white and coated to resemble marble. There is a brick paved ambulatory enclosing porch by concrete three tiers of vaults with four steps on each facade articulated by slender cast-iron Tuscan columns rising on masonry piers.

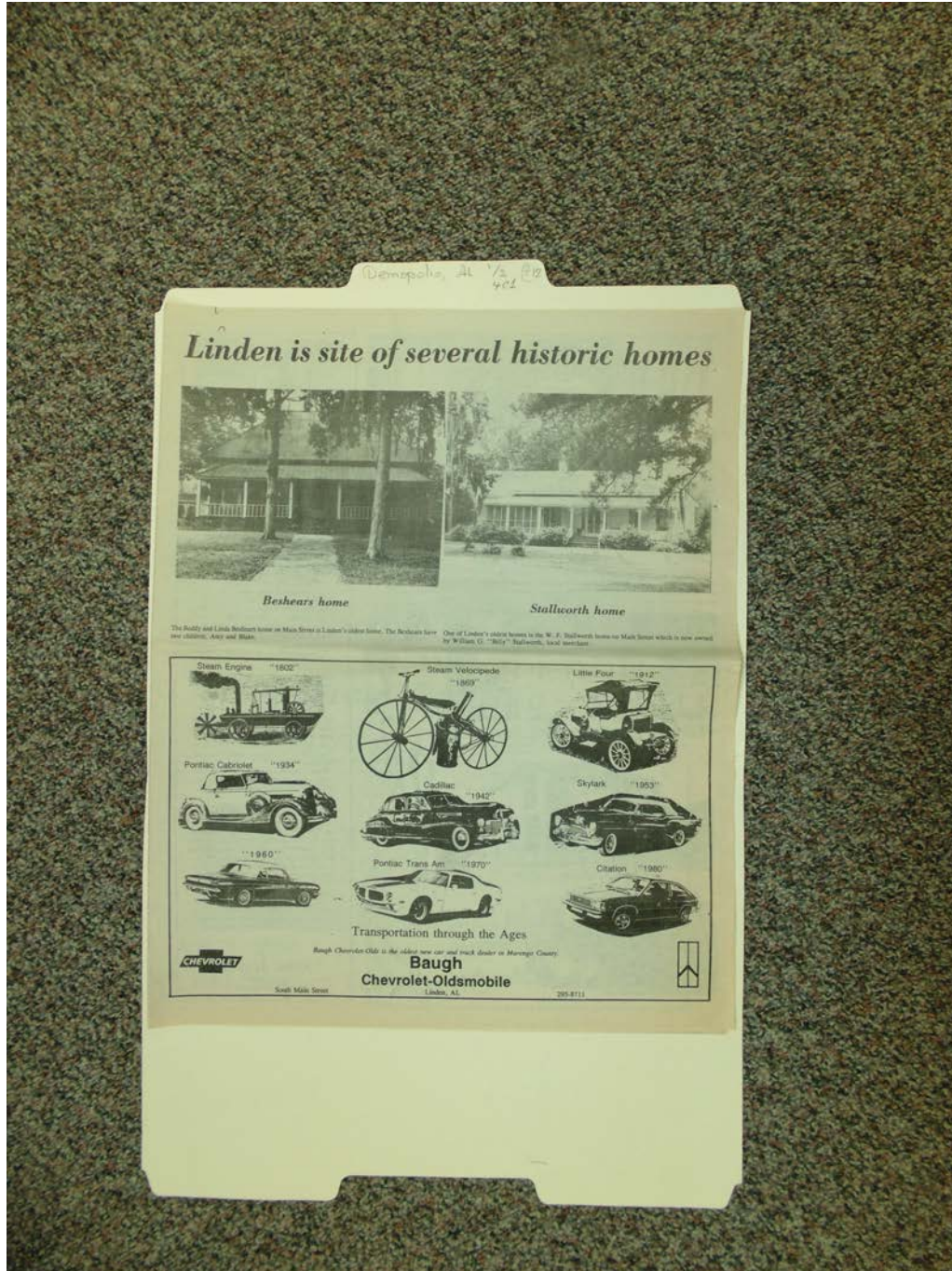

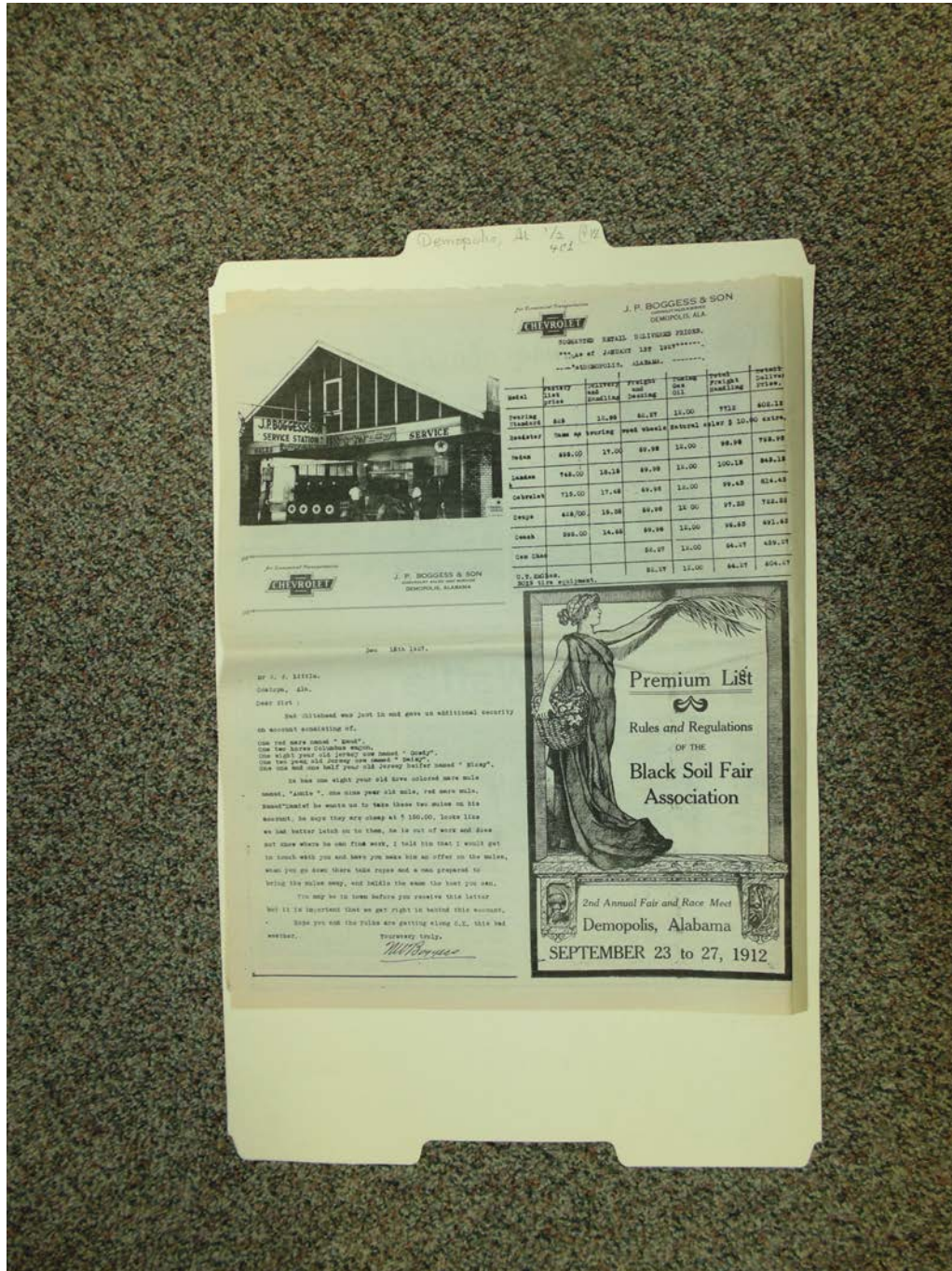

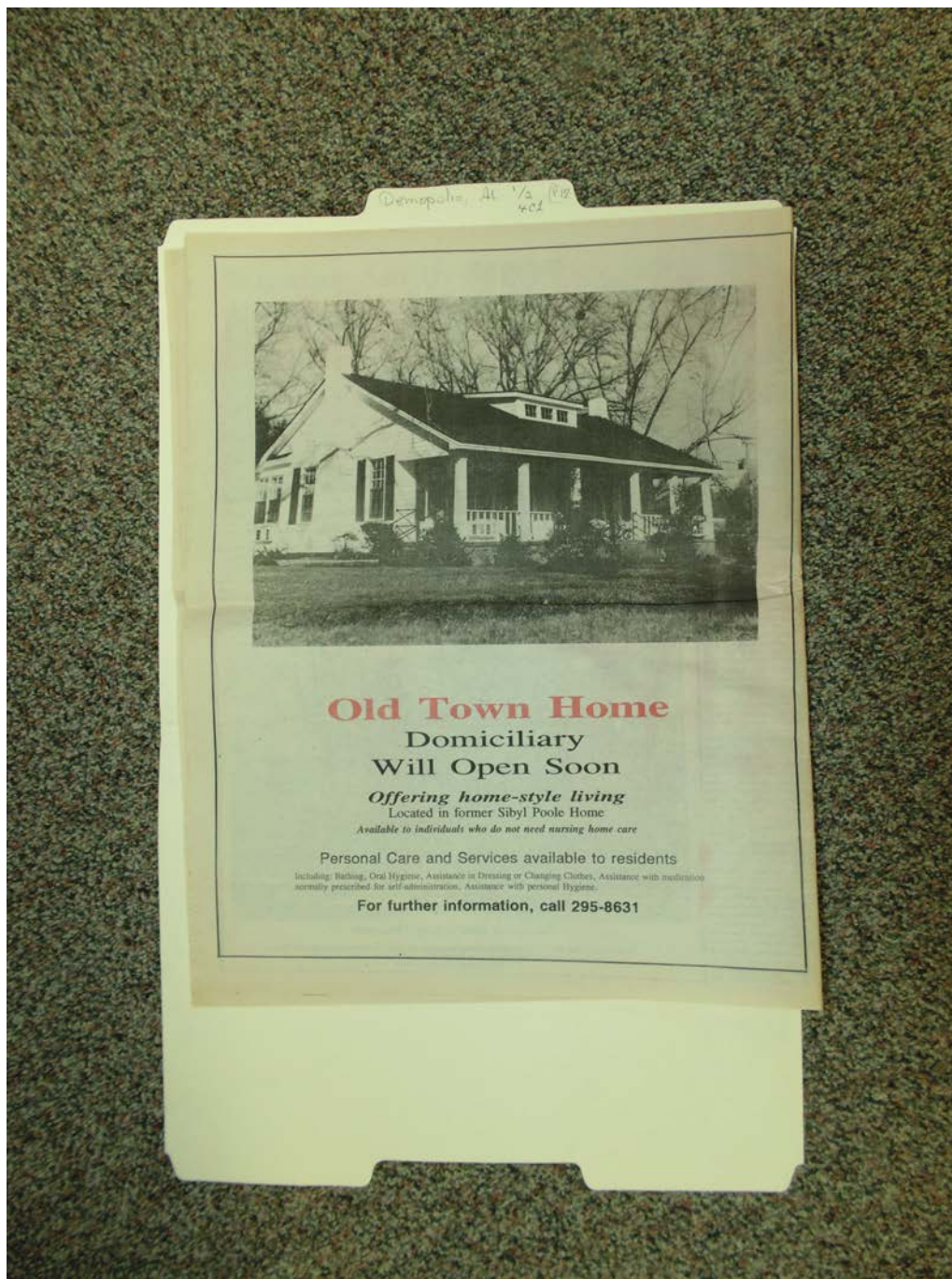
