He may be going in on the Japs on some little known island in the South Pacific — or on the coast of Normandy, Italy, Africa or Sicily Wherever he is bound, he is on his way. . . . WHY . . . that you and yours and I and mine may live free men and free women, and our children and grandchildren may continue free. This Freedom that we take as a matter of course, because we know only the FREE AMERICAN WAY OF LIFE, is such a precious thing! That Marine I think of him as a Marine is literally "Up to his Neck" that this Freedom may be forever preserved for YOU AND YOURS and Me and Mine!

"Will you pause the next time you pass these posters and take in all the details of this picture: he's a young fellow, tho he looks old and worn; he hasn't had a chance for a shave and a bath for days; he has lost sleep maybe for nights on end. Be sure that you catch the caption and get its full meaning. It reads, "HE IS UP TO HIS NECK, TOO — BUT HE'S GIVING." GIVING — HOW HE IS GIVING!

"So many times you and I feel and say that we "are up to our necks" with financial obligations, and that we just don't see how we can GIVE AS WE KNOW WE SHOULD. Up to our necks! Why, we aren't even up to our shoe tops. Many of us haven't even wet our shoe soles. Keep this Marine's picture before you when you are solicited for the Chest these coming days — and GIVE in some proportion to HIS GIVING — and he is, by the thousands, GIVING HIS VERY LIFE. We cannot, will not, let him down. "Care Enough to Share Enough" to provide his needs. "Care Enough to Share Enough" to support your local Chest Institutions, every single one of them. We welcome Dr. Allen D. Albert as our fourth and final Institute of International Understanding. Dr. Albert's subject will be "The Role of the North American Continent". We give you a biographical sketch of Dr. Albert.

ALLEN D. ALBERT

Allen D. Albert has had an interesting career as a newspaper man, having begun as a reporter in Washington, D. C. and New York. He was a war correspondent in the Spanish — American War, Chief Editorial Writer for the Washington, D. C. Times from 1895 to 1910, Publisher of the Columbus (Ohio) News, 1910-1911, and Editor and Associate Publisher of the Minneapolis Tribune, 1912-1916.

As assistant to the president for the Chicago Century of Progress, it was his responsibility to visit many of the European capitals on diplomatic missions relative to the exposition, and also to be commissioner of the exposition to Japan and China.

For a number of years, Dr. Albert has been especially interested in the causes of city growth and programs of city development, having been consultant to many city development bodies. He is a member of the American Academy of Political and Social Science, was formerly President of the Minnesota Academy of Social and Political Science, and was special lecturer of the departments of English and Political Science in the University of Minnesota, 1917-1919. He received the degree Sc.D in sociology from Evansville College in 1922.

He is the author of many articles on city planning, city analysis, and social changes. He is also the author of articles in encyclopedias on "World Fair Architecture".

Dr. Albert has been very active in the Rotary club movement, having served as President of Rotary International, and as a Rotary speaker on many occasions. He has delivered anniversary addresses for the Rotary clubs of Chicago, New York, Boston, Minneapolis, Omaha, and other cities. He made the opening address at the Institute of International Relations for two years at Nashville, Tennessee, spoke at the Institute of International Affairs at the Southern Methodist University at Dallas, Texas, and during the past five years has addressed three hundred and thirty five Institutes of International Understanding sponsored by individual Rotary clubs.

Dr. Albert is a member of the Chicago (Illinois) Rotary Club and makes his home on his country estate, Blue Heron Farm, at Paris, Illinois.

<p>MRS. BEAMGUARD TELLS OF LIBRARY SERVICE</p> <p>The modern library service is one of the oldest as well as the newest of professions. This may sound confusing, but from time immemorial there has been a "Keeper of the Books." But as progress has been made in civilization, this keeper must be a well trained and efficient person in order to meet the demands of a more educated and ever seeking people. Thus Mrs. Elizabeth Parks Beamguard summarized for us last Tuesday just what a modern library keeper had to do.</p> <p>She stated that in the history of library work that the profession has made more advancement in the past ten years than in any other period in its history. Beginning with the monasteries in the olden days there has been a development of this profession through the large libraries in private homes, to the large libraries and reading rooms in the larger cities and university centers, down to today when every city and village has its books to lend.</p> <p>Reading has become a recreation. It is one form in which all the masses, who can read, can enjoy themselves. Yet in addition to being a recreation it has become a great force in the education of the individual. Many types of libraries and collection of facts have been built up for the business and professional man and in many cities, including our own the reference library has become a great source of worthwhile information, available to the mass, which no one individual could afford or house.</p> <p>The great benefactor of Libraries, Andrew Carnegie, rendered a great service in building magnificent buildings to house books, but many communities failed to carry out the purpose of these buildings by not making possible trained personnel for this work. Many times it was a needy widow who became keeper, the books and she was not the person to give the needed service to the community.</p> <p>As needs are becoming more streamlined for special service so must our librarians become specialists too.</p> <p>Huntsville has one of the most modern and up to date libraries in the country and we are recognized as one of the early pioneers in the Regional Library Service. This means that from a central location, books are taken to many centers in our region, which includes Madison and part of Jackson county and books, heretofore unavailable to the masses not in the city are literally taken to them in a truck in many distribution points throughout the rural areas.</p> <p>Mrs. Beamguard continued by telling of the set-up of the vari-</p>	<p>ATTENDANCE RECORD</p> <p>The district attendance record reached the high point of the Rotary year in January. 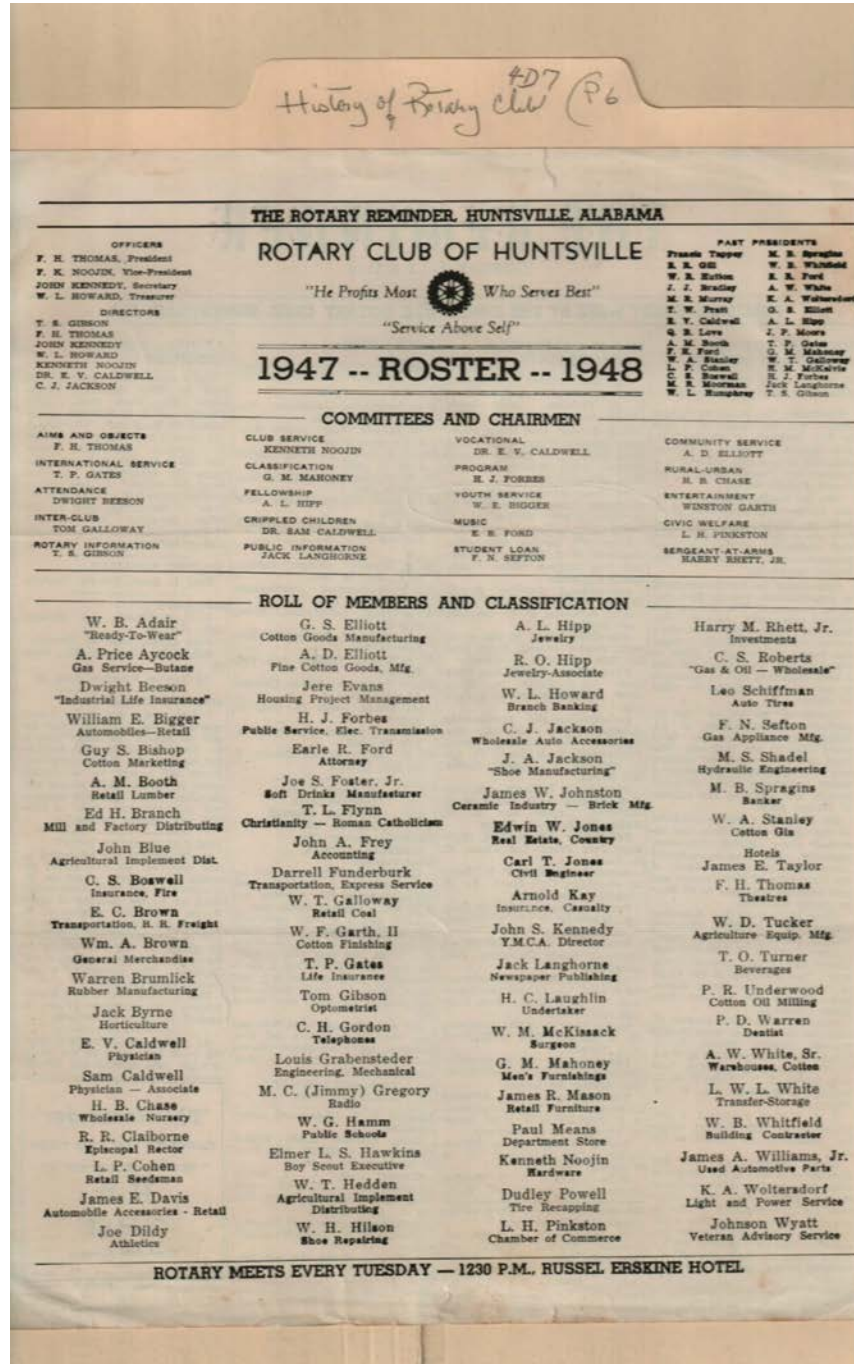

RHODE ISLANDER HEADS ROTARY INTERNATIONAL
 BY SAUL PETT

NEW YORK, June 13 (AP) — The leadership of Rotary International passed serenely today from a retired Australian grain broker to a Rhode Island yarn manufacturer.

British-born Percy Hodgson, 47, Pawtucket, R. I., was elected president by acclamation at the 48th annual Rotary convention the biggest in the service organization's history but one of the quietest ever held in New York.

Hodgson drew standing applause but, like everything else in this sedate get-together of business and professional men from more than 50 different countries, there was no yelling, no whoop-de-doo.

About the most demonstrative these Rotarians get consists of an occasional "bear, bear" when they like a particular point a speaker is making.

Although more than 15,000 delegates and relatives were registered by the second day and more still were coming, the five-day meeting has been devoid of any spectacular celebrations, either on the floor of Madison Square Garden or the neighboring bars.

In a speech outgoing President Angus N. Mitchell, Melbourne, Australia, urged Rotarians to be even better Rotarians, even better citizens of the world. He urged them to intensify their efforts to gain support for the United Nations.

"Peace, like war," he said, "is a state of mind. We must condition the mind of man so that he will work as diligently and as patiently for peace as he has always been willing to work toward victory in war."

Richard E. Vernor, who does fire prevention work in Chicago, was re-elected treasurer, also by acclamation. Other officers will be elected later in the week.

Speakers during the day echoed the convention's goal of increasing international understanding.

William L. Batt, president of SKF Industries, Inc., Philadelphia, pleaded for greater use of arbitration in the settlement of international business disputes. Such controversies, he noted, "are oft-times the breeding grounds of war."

Actress Madeline Carroll, who was a Red Cross hospital worker during the war, urged Rotarians to get behind the creation of an international children's day by which increased aid would go out to children left destitute by the war.

HUNTSVILLE OPENS A.M.A. BRANCH UNIT

An office of the Alabama Motorists Association has been opened in Huntsville.

The announcement was made by Bert M. Meadow, president of the A. M. A. and Patrick Richardson, board member from the Huntsville area.

Huntsville started campaigning for an A.M.A. office some six months ago. At that time, William Johnson, special A.M.A. representative began to enroll members in and about the city.

The community was informed it would have its own A.M.A. branch office when at least 500 members were enrolled in the auto club. The number would be just enough to defray the cost of operating the unit.

The Huntsville Chamber of Commerce, the Huntsville Times and several civic leaders launched a campaign to create interest in the work of the A.M.A. and its national affiliate, the American Automobile Association.

In Birmingham, the Board of Directors of the A.M.A. said it was pleased with the progress shown in Huntsville. It added, the new office here would come at a time when the community is enjoying a sizeable volume of tourist business and so would be in a position to offer motorists service and guidance.

The A.M.A. branch office will be opened in the Russel Erskine hotel. Guests of the other hotels in town, the Twickenham and the Yarrowood also will be eligible to use the facilities. The three hotels worked as a team to bring the travel bureau to Huntsville.

BLOW TO SMALL BUSINESS

The U. S. Chamber of Commerce is reporting that more and more failures of small business concern, because of taxes and other high costs.

Yet the bureaucrats are arrogantly demanding higher taxes. They kid the wage earners by promising that the higher taxes will only hit "big business."

But the bulk of the nation's business is done by the great majority of small concerns. These will suffer the worst under higher taxes. When more and more small businesses fail, it throws more and more millions of workers out of jobs out orleat.—New Tpe, Pa. News.

WORLD ORGANIZATION

The United States has become the 17th nation to ratify the convention for the creation of the World Meteorological Organization which is intended to be one of the specialized agencies affiliated with the United Nations. The proposed WMO will come into being after 30 nations have ratified it.

Its purposes are: (1) to facilitate world wide cooperation in the establishment and maintenance of networks of meteorological stations; (2) to promote systems for rapid exchange of weather information; (3) to work for standardization of observations and statistics; (4) to further the application of meteorology to aviation, shipping, agriculture, and other activities; (5) to encourage research and training and to assist in coordinating their international aspects.

HEIDELBERG TALKS ON LOCAL HOUSING

"Why Huntsville Needs a Public Housing Program" was the topic of a talk given by Frederic H. Heidelberg, editor of The Tennessee Valley News, to members of the Rotary club at the Russel Erskine hotel.

The guest speaker cited four points and elaborated on each of them to point out why better housing is needed now in the Huntsville sector. These reasons were:

(1) Humanitarianism, or the basic principles of Christian living; (2) civic pride and rising property values, if new housing was constructed; (3) good business, because of the increased rental value of new buildings; (4) good Americanism to prevent the breeding of communism, crime and vice, which flourishes in sub-marginal housing areas.

Mr. Heidelberg offered two possible solutions to correct unsatisfactory housing conditions as they now exist in Huntsville. He suggested a local ordinance which would prohibit landlords from renting unsanitary, unhealthy, leaky residences. The second suggestion was that Huntsville and landlords take advantage of the pending housing bill being sponsored by Sen. John Sparkman and Rep. Robert (Bob) Jones.

ROTARIANS HEAR SPEECH BY ALLEN

Lieutenant Governor designate James B. Allen of Gadsden was the first in a series of speakers to discuss various phases of government and industry during a meeting of the Rotary club Tuesday at the Russel Erskine hotel.

Speakers in the two fields have been booked by the Rotary club committee, and will continue for the remainder of 1950. Mr. Allen is at present senator from St. Clair and Etowah counties. He also served in the state house of representatives from 1938 to 1942, and was elected senator after four years of Navy service in World War II.

He outlined the duties of lieutenant governor and explained that such an official serves primarily as president of the Senate. Mr. Allen also stated that in the event of the governor's death, the lieutenant governor would serve out the remainder of the term. This has occurred four times in Alabama history, the Gadsden attorney stated.

He also pointed out that in the 131 years of Alabama's government a lieutenant governor's position was not in force for 74 years. Mr. Allen explained that qualifications include: 30 years of age, legal voter, 10 years' residence in the United States and seven years in Alabama.

Local Rotarians also voted to cooperate with other civic clubs in conducting an inter-city luncheon on Oct. 24 at the Russel Erskine hotel to assist in plans for the pending Community Chest drive. Rotarians will act as the host organization.

Members were also reminded that next Tuesday's meeting will be dispensed with in order for Rotarians and guests to hold a fried chicken dinner Wednesday night at Monte Sano Park.

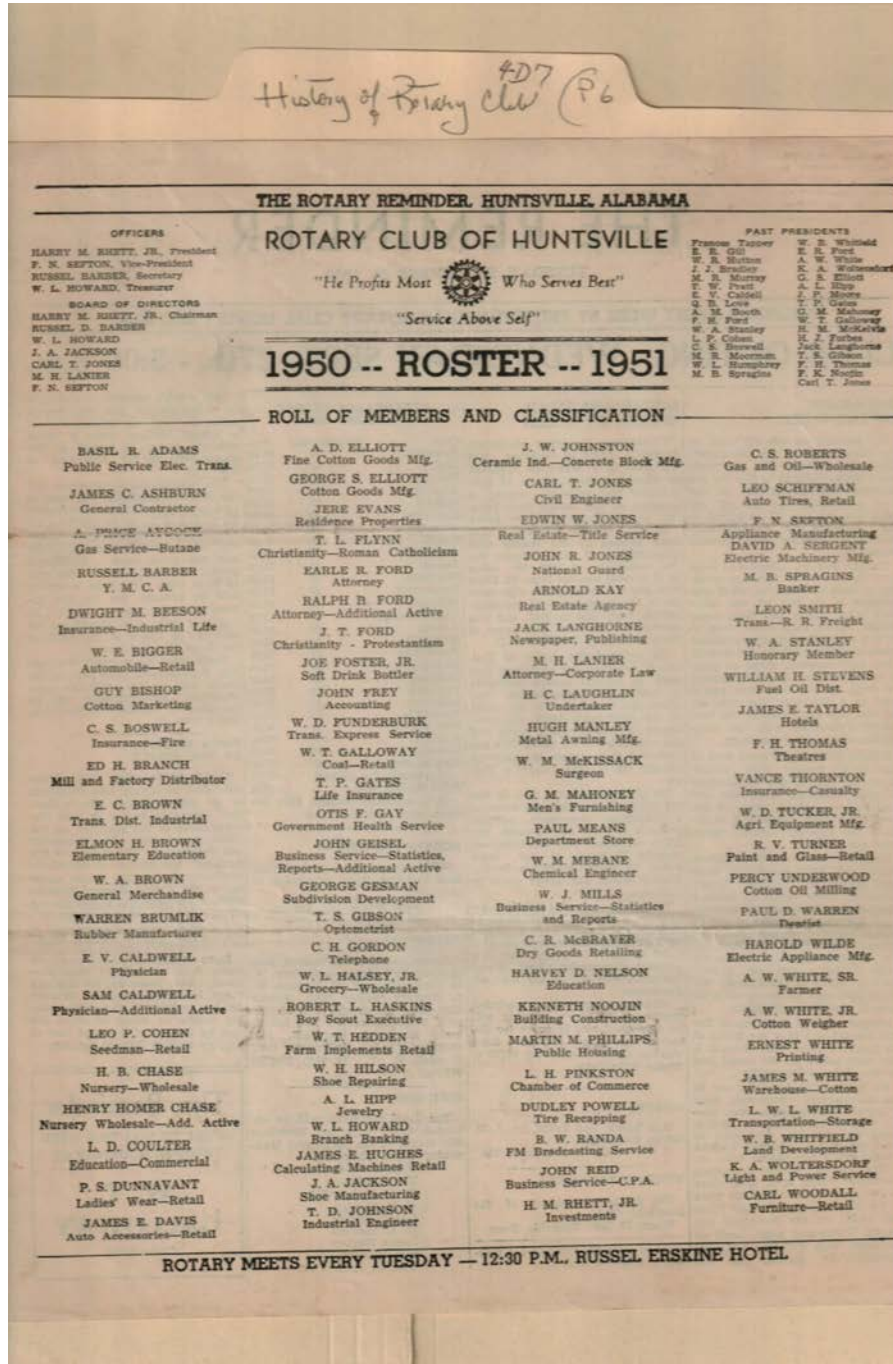

We expect to hear much more from him next year.</p> <p>These and many more were our accomplishments during the year with Harry as our President. We lost several good Rotarians and gained many more to take their place.</p> <p>Since next week's program is an outstanding one let's show our appreciation to Harry for a grand</p>	<p>Rotarian and President of the Huntsville Chamber of Commerce Tom Galloway was our guest speaker last Tuesday.</p> <p>He gave a very interesting resume of the program of the U. S. Chamber of Commerce meeting which he attended in Washington recently. The theme of the meeting was "Keeping Freedom First."</p> <p>The majority of the speakers and discussion leaders at the meeting were Senators, Congressmen, and secretaries of the various governmental departments.</p> <p>According to Tom's report there is a great deal of tension in Washington today and a great deal of concern by the Congressmen as to how and what we are thinking back home.</p> <p>Several of the departments seem to have been given a great deal of criticism at the conference, especially the State Department, Veterans Administration, and the Department of Agriculture.</p> <p>Tom also mentioned several discussions by Senators concerning the possibilities of cutting the national budget, especially the non defense budget.</p>	<p>Lieut. Gen. Robert L. Eichelberger (retired), second in command under General MacArthur in the Southwest Pacific during World War II, will speak at the meeting of the Rotary club Tuesday at noon at the Russel Erskine hotel.</p> <p>The club will meet at 12:30 p.m. and any members wishing to bring guests are asked to notify James Taylor at the hotel by 10 a.m. Tuesday.</p> <p>General Eichelberger was born in Urbana, Ohio in 1886, attended Ohio State University and the U. S. Military Academy at West Point graduating with the class of 1909.</p> <p>During World War I, he served two years in Siberia as chief of intelligence. Following the war, he returned to the U.S., served at the Presidio in San Francisco and attended the Command and General Staff school at Fort Leavenworth, Kansas, and the War College in Washington, D. C.</p> <p>He was on the General Staff in Washington when General MacArthur served as Chief of Staff. From 1931 to 1935, he was commandant of cadets, and then superintendent of the U. S. Military Academy at West Point. Following this he was commanding general of the 72nd Division.</p> <p>During World War II he served as commanding general of the First Corps in Australia, later being moved up to commanding general of the Eighth Army, and second in command under General MacArthur of all troops in the Southwest Pacific. He served with General MacArthur for six years.</p> <p>He retired in 1948 and is now making his home in Asheville, N. 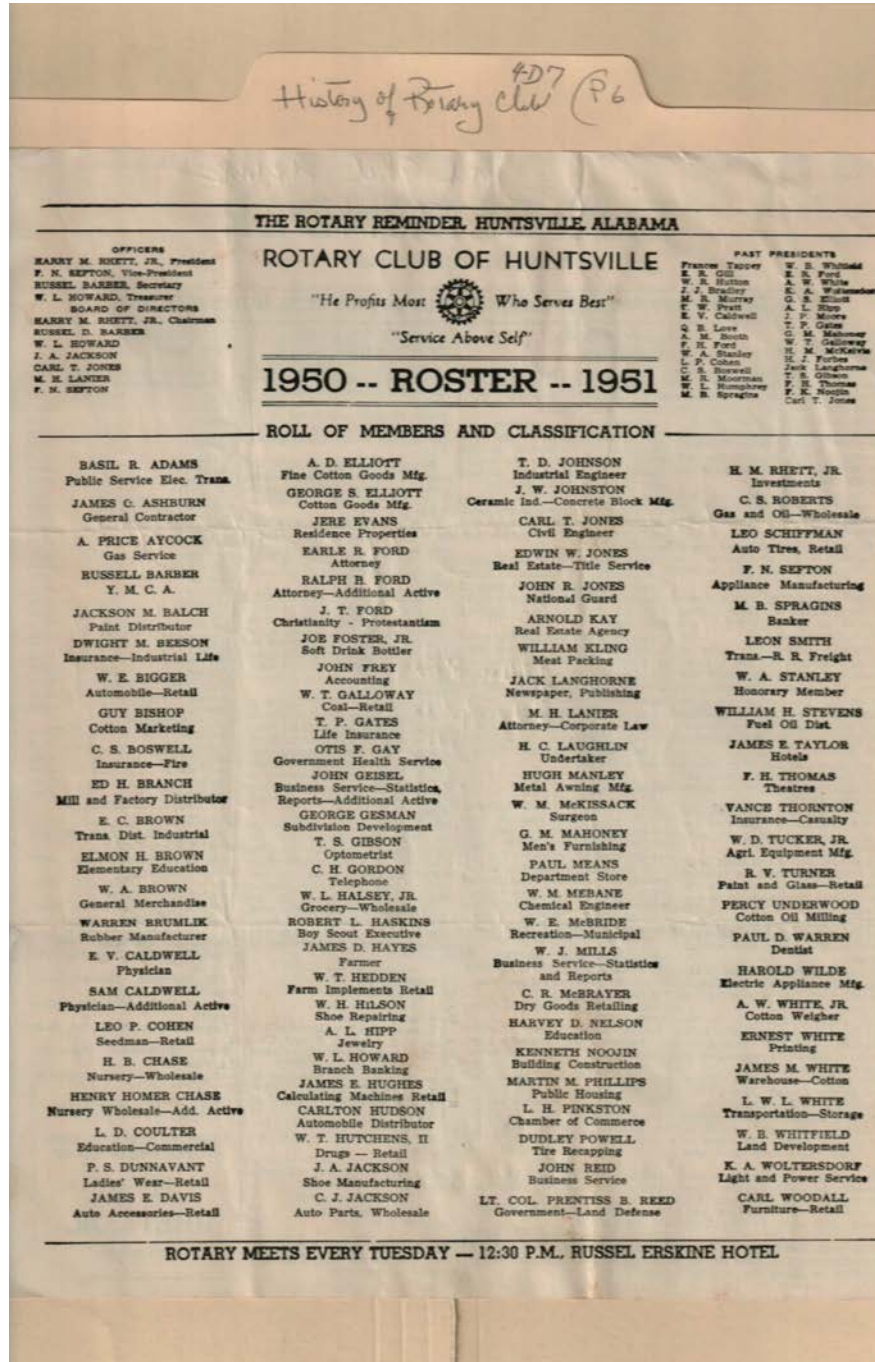

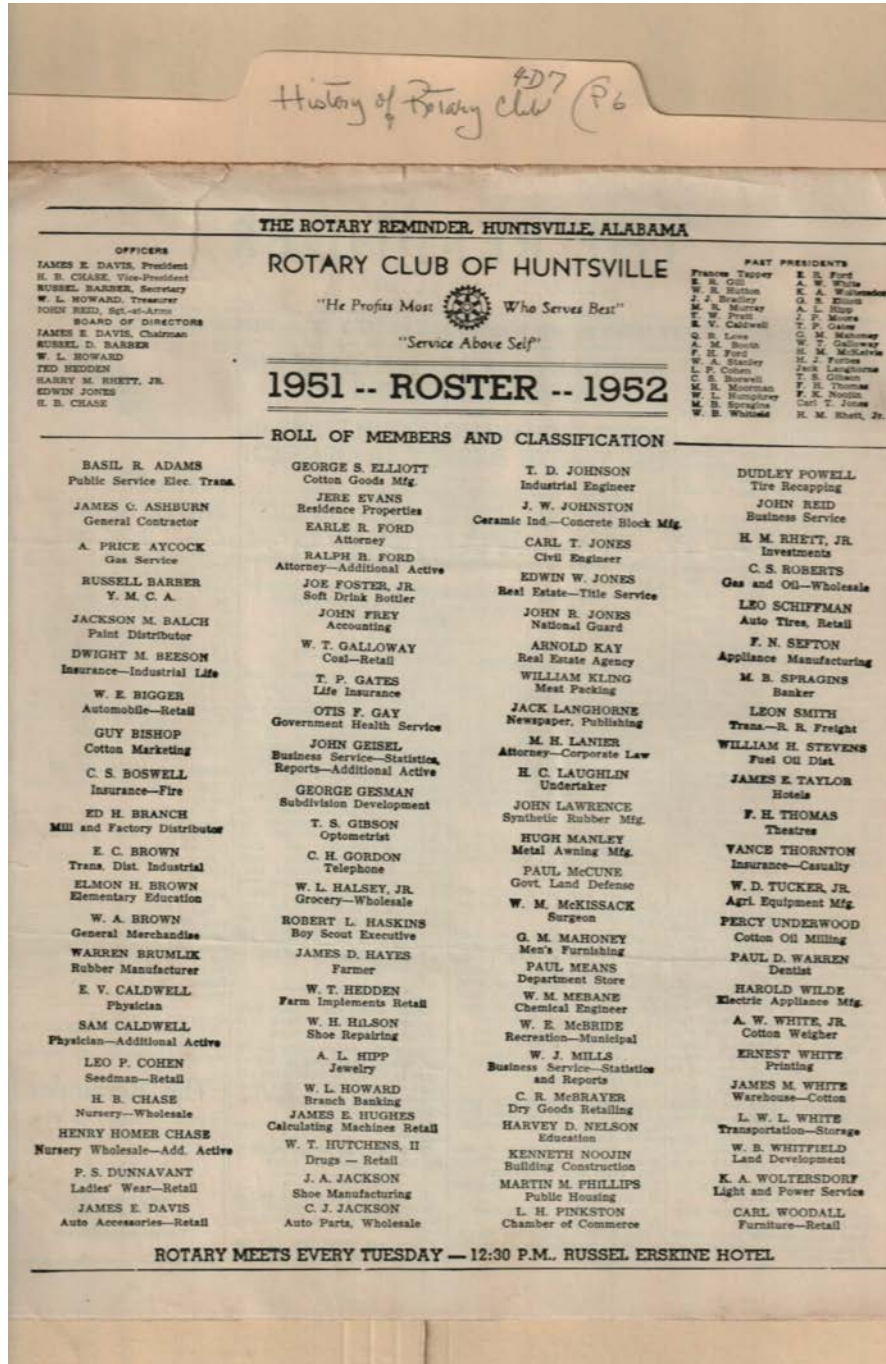

<p>Capt. O. B. Patton, son of Col. and Mrs. M. H. Patton of our city spoke to the club last Tuesday. Capt. Patton is a graduate of West Point in the class of 1944. He served in the European Theatre in World War II and after the end of the war he remained there with occupational troops for some time.</p> <p>He was commander of the 3rd Reconnaissance Co. in Korea for seven months and with the Intelligence Department of the Third Division for several months. Capt. Patton is on leave here before going to advanced Infantry school at Fort Benning, Ga.</p> <p>He emphasized that though we feel we are fighting a war for no gain in Korea it is of vital gain to our country because, first, we are gaining experience against the Russian type armies and can now train our armed forces to fight this type of army. Second, he said that we are gaining by actually operating an Allied army and making it to work. Even though the United States is furnishing the majority of the man power, he said there are many countries with battalions, regiments and detachments operating within our great Eighth Army.</p> <p>Capt. Patton also said that the reason why large numbers of Chinese fighting forces could not be made to surrender was because the communist leaders were so lightly organized and watched and censored every move made.</p> <p>When asked how accurate the casualty reports that we read in the papers are, he said, the casualty reports including wounded and killed for both enemy and friendly troops are taken directly from the small field units and are composed daily. 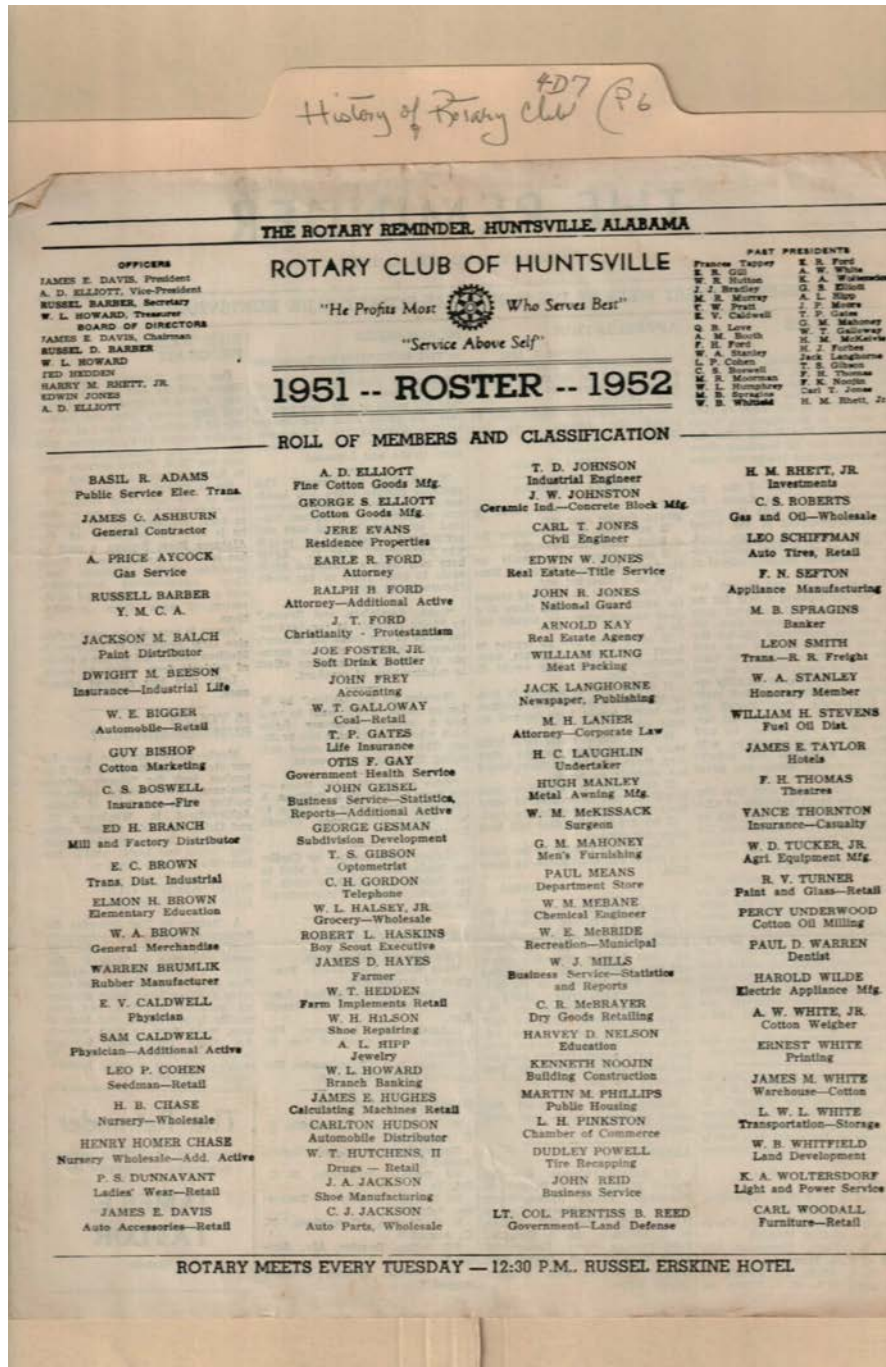

ROTARIAN OF THE WEEK

Last Wednesday's news reports from Washington revealed plans, as announced by Gordon Clapp, to double the TVA power output between now and 1954-55.

This would mean the stepping up from 3,100,000 kilowatts to 6,174,000 kilowatts in the system.

Alabama will benefit greatly from this enlargement program with construction of new generating units at several points over the state.

Our own Rotarian Basil R. S. Adams is superintendent in charge of the Huntsville District of TVA which includes Decatur and all TVA property in Alabama east of Moulton except the power plant properties.

Basil was born in Newcastle-Upon-Tyne, April 18, 1905. He graduated from the Newcastle Royal Grammar School, Newcastle High School and Shrewsbury College.

He came to America in November of 1925 and spent some time with relatives in Pittsburgh prior to coming south to accept a position with the Alabama Power Co. as a junior engineer.

He came to Huntsville in 1928 from the Gorge Steam Plant. He was appointed District Engineer of the Huntsville District in 1928 and moved up to assistant superintendent of the North Alabama division in 1930. He served in this capacity until 1939 when he became superintendent.

When the Alabama Power Co. sold out to the TVA, Cities and Co-ops in 1940 Basil went south, but returned to Huntsville in 1942 as assistant superintendent of T. V. A.

He went to Johnson City, Tennessee in 1945 in charge of TVA in upper East Tennessee, and in 1948 he returned to Huntsville again, this time to hold his present position as superintendent of the Huntsville district.

Basil and Rotaryann Louise of Sheffield, Ala. have two sons, Donald Leigh and Esmond Thomas Adams.

The club regrets to hear of the death of the mother of our Rotarian of the Week and express our deepest feeling of sympathy to the members of the family.

ROTARIANS HEAR SPEECH BY JAMES

"The Role of Higher Education as Sponsored by Churches in Alabama" was the topic of a talk by Dr. Perry B. James, Athens college president, during a Rotary club meeting Tuesday at the Russell Erskine hotel.

In his opening remarks he referred to the establishment of Harvard, Yale, Princeton, and other church-related schools as the forerunners to Christian or higher education. Dr. James explained that the majority have a small student body compared to the land-grant colleges.

However the church-related college has a large percentage of men receiving doctorate degrees and degrees and graduating as scientists and specialists. Dr. James emphasized. He also explained that there is no competition between the land-grant and church-connected colleges. Each fills its own need and there is sufficient room for growth for both types of institutions, the speaker maintained.

"Today, the church-related college is non-denominational and aims at teaching the student body leadership, higher concepts of idealism and character," he emphasized. "There is no comparison between the land-grant school also as far as buildings and equipment are concerned."

A trio from Athens college presented three vocal selections during the club meeting today.

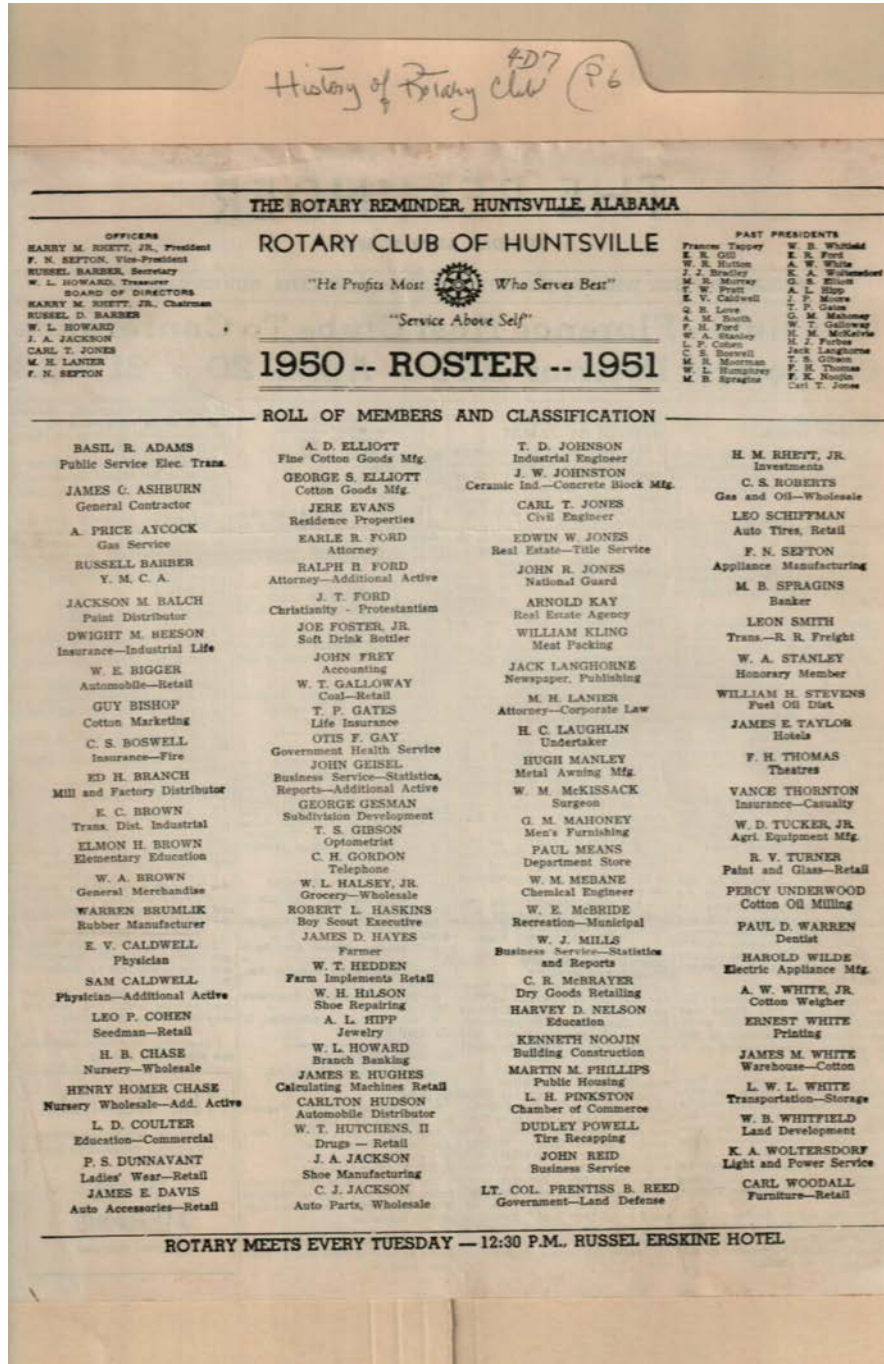

<p>TB HOSPITAL TALK HEARD AT ROTARY</p> <p>The operation and work of the tubercular sanitarium at Flint was the subject of a talk Tuesday by Dr. William Grosfeld, director of the sanitarium at a meeting of the Rotary Club.</p> <p>Describing the hospital as one of the nicest in the United States with every piece of equipment the best available, Dr. Grosfeld said it was equipped to handle 216 patients, but one to three patients had to be turned down each day because the beds were full.</p> <p>Explaining that the state pays \$2 a day of the required \$4-a-day needed for each patient, the director said the other \$2 was paid by the county or city from which the patient comes or by the patient if he is able. He emphasized the fact no patient has ever been turned away because he could not pay.</p> <p>At present Madison county is caring for 18 patients at \$2 per patient, and 27 more patients from Madison county are being treated as charity patients," Dr. Grosfeld pointed out.</p> <p>Let's take a look at what we are doing and have done to cooperate with the sanitarium.</p> <p>Our county officials have never refused the request submitted by the hospital to care for our country's patients.</p> <p>In 1946 we gave \$150.00 per month.</p> <p>In 1947 we raised our support to \$200.00 a month.</p> <p>Last year in reply to a direct request by letter from Dr. Grosfeld our county began paying \$273.00 per month to care for Madison county patients.</p> <p>County records show that we have always given exactly what was requested in the way of financial support to the sanitarium, and two years ago we also gave \$25,000.00 to aid in the construction of the new plant and purchase of new equipment.</p> <p>County officials have indicated that request for support of additional patients will be given consideration if it is asked for, and would be worked into the budget of the county along with other budget requests.</p> <p>Right now on the home front the county and city are building a huge health center in Huntsville. 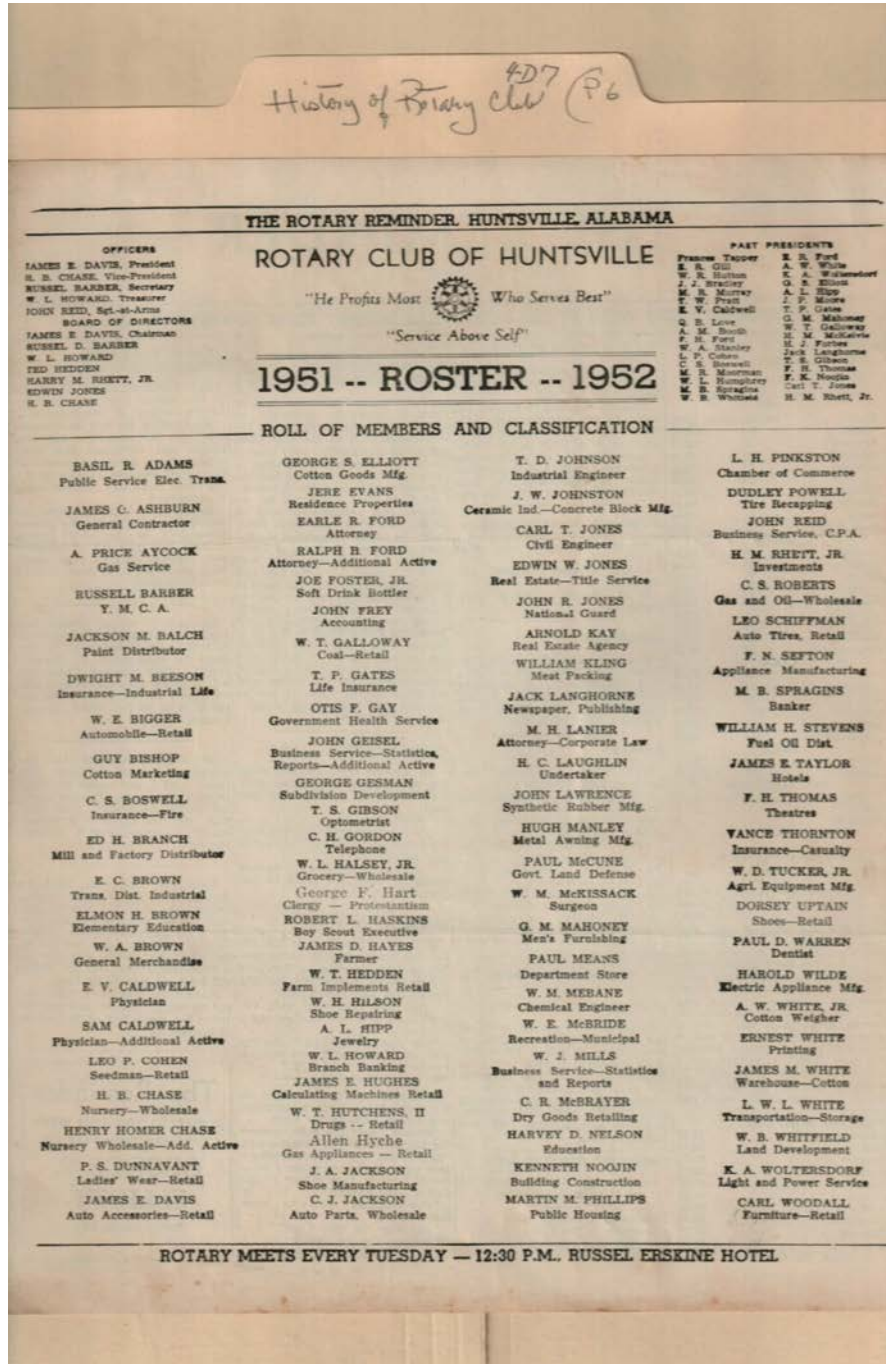

THE ROTARY FOUNDATION

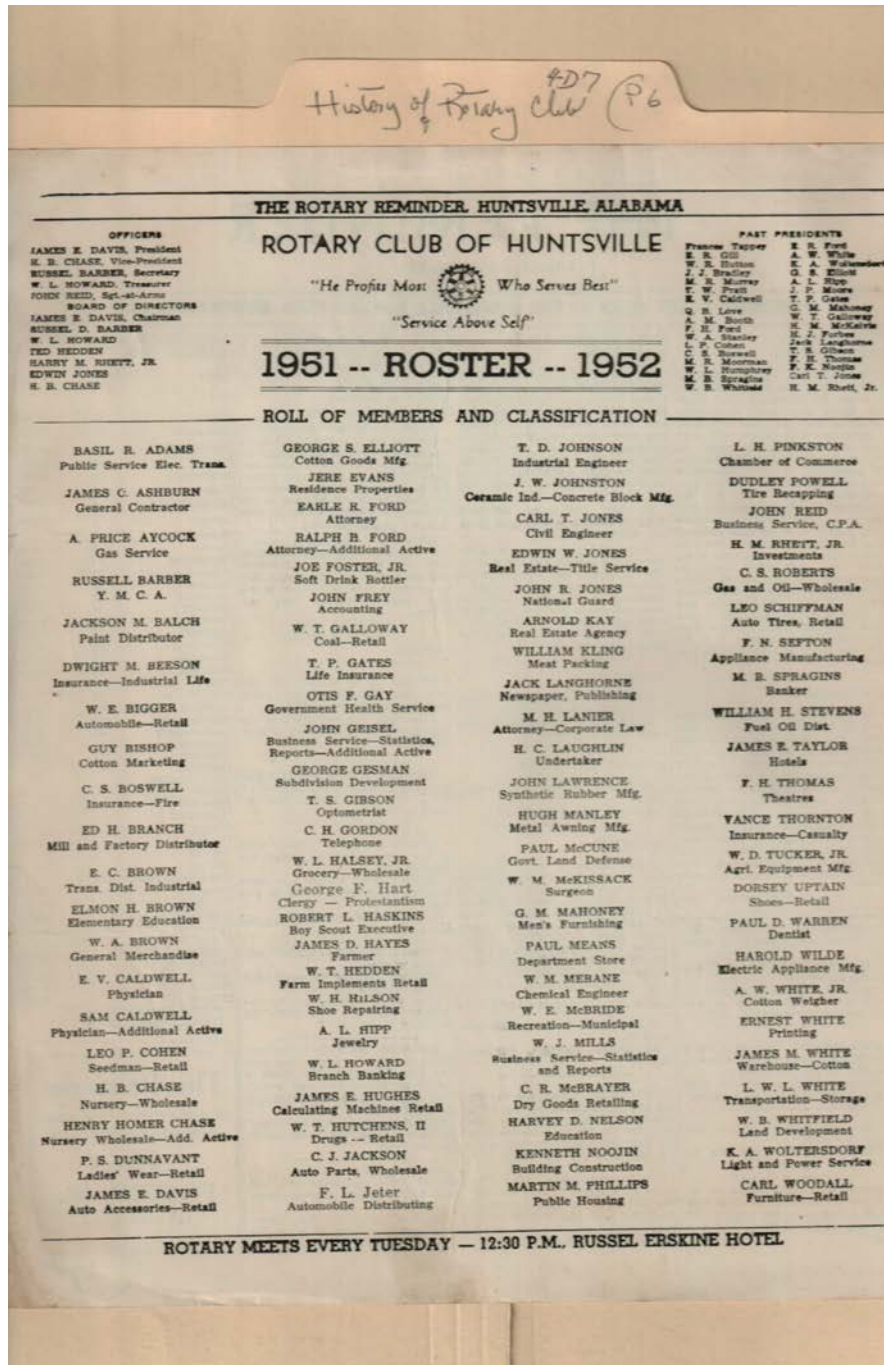

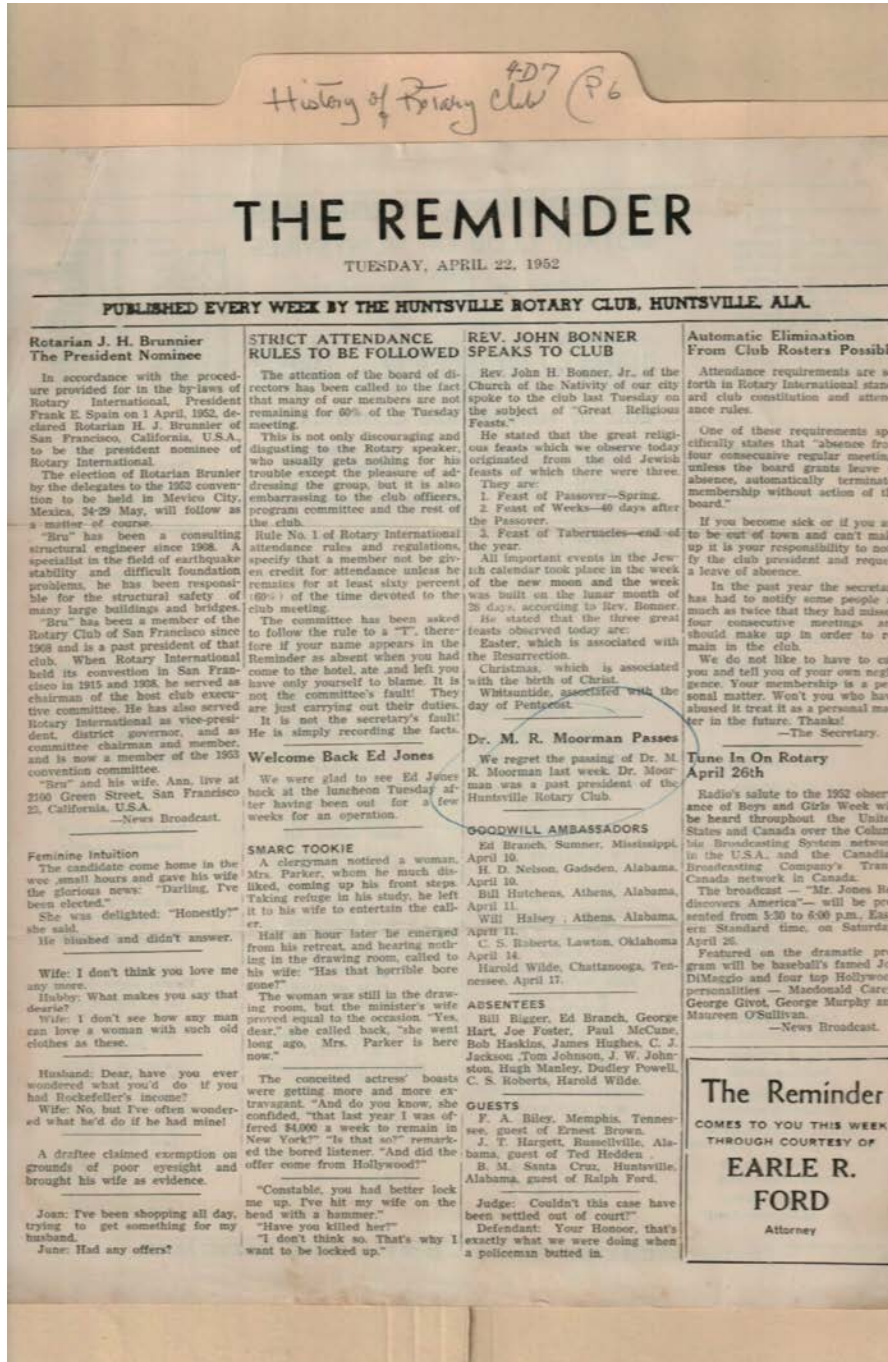

(Reading time 2½ minutes. IMPORTANT)

An important phase of Rotary Membership that deserves close attention by our club members, the high lights being:

SENIOR ACTIVE:
Any Active member with 15 or more years of his credit, or who is of the age of 65 or more with a credit of five or more years, or who is a present or past official of Rotary International, may, at his option become a Senior Active member with all the rights, privileges, and responsibilities he has always had. In changing to Senior Active he opens up his classification for a new member. There are now some twenty odd members eligible for this change. Notice in writing to the Secretary of your desire to make this change is required.

PAST SERVICE:
Any Active member with five or more years of his credit but who may become ineligible for further Active membership because of retirement from active business or professional life, or because of the loss of his classification due to the liquidation of a business, may be elected to Past Service membership, which, like Senior Active, in no way changes his rights, privileges, or responsibilities of Active membership, except that in both instances he shall not be considered as representing any business or professional classification. In both instances classifications are opened up for new members.

Please, all members, give these two changes your careful thought and consideration; ask questions if any point not clearly explained. Note copy my letter this day to Secretary Halsey.
