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From 7,000 to 500 B.C. the Indians at Russell Cave and in the rest of the TARCOG region lived in what has become known as the Shell Mound Archaic Period. They lived solely by hunting and gathering. These Archaic People ate shellfish and left shell heaps along the Tennessee River. Among other items in their diet were freshwater fish, venison, and wild turkey. Game was killed with spears hurled by primitive throwing sticks known as "atlatls." These Indians had no pottery. 5

Beginning about 500 B.C. the implements of the region's inhabitants underwent a dramatic change. Pottery appeared for the first time and in quantity. Smaller weapon points suggest that the bow and arrow had replaced the earlier throwing stick. Bone tools were better finished, and there existed a variety of bone and shell ornaments. ⁶

These changes, widespread throughout the eastern United States, marked the beginning of the Woodland Period, which stretched from 500 B.C. to 1000 A.D. It was during this time that burial mounds came into use and ceremonialism increased. A richer and more complex way of life indicates that the Woodland Indians of the region had more time for activities not directly concerned with staying alive. Probably a stable and more abundant economy underlay this development. Increased use of plant foods, perhaps even rudimentary farming, provided this base. At least by the end of the Woodland Period primitive agriculture had taken hold in the TARCOG region.

Shortly after 1000 A.D. the Indians began to make less use of Russell Cave and the other limestone caves of the area. Occasionally small parties, probably hunters, left a scattering of objects that differed from those of the Woodland Period, but by this time their basic way of life had changed. The Indians began to build permanent villages. Rich bottomlands near the river supported their corn fields and other plants. This era of settled villages,

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visiting village after village, requiring food and guide service, and taking hostages as well as slaves. The Indians greeted him politely, sometimes cordially, but all were anxious to see his departure, speeding him off with stories of gold further west. 9

The Indian civilization the Europeans encountered in the TARCOG region was not as highly developed as that of some other Indians, such as the Mayans in Yucatan or the Pueblos in the Southwest, but it did surpass that of most other Indians in what is now the United States. ¹⁰ For this reason the Indians of Alabama were called "the Civilized Tribes." These Indians, living in villages located on rivers or creeks, depended on agriculture quite as much as on hunting and fishing. ¹¹

The four principal groups of Indians in Alabama were the Creeks, the Cherokees, the Chickasaws, and the Choctaws. The Cherokees, in the north-eastern part of the state, and the Chickasaws, in the northwest, occupied the TARCOG region, with the Creeks just to the south. Situated in southwestern Alabama were the Choctaws. There were other smaller and less significant tribes located throughout the state.

According to the traditional history of the Cherokees, they were the first inhabitants of the TARCOG region and the Tennessee Valley. About 1650, for a reason not known, they withdrew from the valley to the east of Cumberland and Sand Mountains, reserving the area around the Tennessee River as a hunting ground. 12

Some years after their withdrawal, bands of Shawnees moved southwest from the Cumberland River and took possession of the Tennessee Valley in north Alabama. This action angered the Cherokees, who were soon at war with the intruders. About 1721, after forty years of war and with the aid of the Chickasaws, the Shawnees were driven from this area and forced to seek a



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The first serious attempt on the part of the white man to settle and Tennessee Valley and the TARCOG region began a few years after the Revolutionary War. Georgia claimed, under her charter, all the land between 31 degrees and 35 degrees from the Savannah River to the Mississippi River.

This included the territory that is now Alabama and Mississippi, which England had been forced to cede. Between the years 1795 and 1796, the Yazoo Land Companies purchased much of this territory from the Georgia legislature for only a nominal fee. ¹⁵ One of the companies, the Tennessee Land Company,

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A Need to Preserve

This has been only a brief sketch of the region's 10,000-year history. History occurred every day of those 10,000 years; what is left to see and touch is that which through its own charm, strength, or utility has delayed man's decision to destroy. Russell Cave and other natural formations have survived simply because of their durability and physical strength. Indian artifacts such as arrowheads, spear points, and pottery remain, due also to their own rugged composition and ability to endure. These things, left undisturbed, like the mountains and streams, change ever so slightly with the passage of time. Man has done little for their preservation.

Much of what is learned about the past and the way ancestors lived comes from the written word, as some take the time to preserve events, places, and ideas through the stroke of a pen. Man probes deep into old histories, diaries, and letters, stimulating his imagination, recreating in his mind a lost time . . . a lost place . . . a special day. Nevertheless, his experience is incomplete. He longs to see the same house, walk in the same yard, climb the same steps, open the same door, stand where those in the past stood . . . and see what they saw. This is the experience of another time . . . an older chapter in the history of life.

This is the goal of historic preservation. It is intentional and purposeful. It is man seeking to save and protect a little bit of time . . . a little historic
place where he can reflect and build pride. Pride breeds confidence and confidence keeps civilization healthy and strong. Carl Sandburg once wrote, ". . . .
when a society or civilization perishes, one condition may always be found.
They forgot where they came from."

One of the goals of this work is to stimulate and foster historic preservation in the TARCOG region. The people of a region so rich in heritage must not

that Colonel Return J. Meigs was ordered into present-day Limestone County. With a small force, he established himself at Fort Hampton on Elk River, 17 miles west of Athens. He and his men exercised general supervision over the area, preventing rough pioneer intruders from encroaching on the Indians' lands. Fort Hampton was abandoned after the Chickasaws' cession in 1816.

As stated, by February 6, 1818, the area was organized into the county of Limestone and named for the large creek that flows through it which has a bed of hard limestone. The county has an area of 584 square miles, or 373,760 acres. Located in the extreme northern part of the state, it is bounded on the north by the Tennessee state line, on the east by Madison County, on the south by Morgan and Lawrence Counties, and on the west by Lauderdale County. There are two general physiographic divisions in the county—the river bottoms, so termed because of their proximity to the Tennessee and Elk Rivers, and the large creeks which flow through the county. The uplands consist of three divisions—the Tennessee Valley, the Highlands of Tennessee, and the Elk River Watershed. Drainage is generally south through Elk River, Limestone Creek, and a number of smaller streams into the Tennessee River.

Athens, the largest city in Limestone County, was settled by Samuel Robertson in 1808. In 1819, according to the provisions of an act of the legislature, Athens was selected as the site for the county seat.

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Chapter 4

MADISON COUNTY

A Geographic and Historic Sketch

Madison County was created by proclamation of Governor Robert Williams of the Mississippi Territory on December 13, 1808. The territory which made up the county was a large triangular tract of land acquired by the United States in the Chickasaw cession of 1805 and the Cherokee cession of 1806. By an act of the territorial legislature on February 8, 1818, the dimensions of the county were enlarged. On December 13, 1819, the Alabama legislature added to the county a tract of land lying east of the Madison County line to the Flint River. The territory east of Flint River, belonging to Decatur County, was added in 1824 when that county was abolished, giving Madison County its final shape and dimensions. Madison County is unique among the other original counties of the state in that it is the only county ever to extend its boundaries—all the other original counties had to contract their boundaries to make room for the creation of new ones as the growth of the state necessitated. 2

The county was named in honor of James Madison, who at the time of the county's creation was Secretary of State. Within a year he became President of the United States. Situated in the north central part of the state, Madison County's total area is 512,000 acres, or about 800 square miles. It is bounded on the north by Giles and Lincoln Counties, Tennessee, on the east by Jackson County, on the south by Marshall and Morgan Counties, and on the west by Limestone County.

Elevations vary in the county from 200 to 1,600 feet. The topographic features of the county are varied and may be classed as river and stream bottoms, general uplands, and the mountain spurs and knobs of the Cumberland Plateau. Eighteen soil types appear in the county.



Drainage is southward into the Tennessee River through Limestone, Indian, and Aldridge Creeks and Flint and Paint Rock Rivers. The tributaries of these streams also aid materially in supplying drainage. 4

Historians have differed over the question of who was the first settler in Madison County. Some maintain that Old Man John Ditto, a Pennsylvanian, was the first settler since he is reported to have lived among the Indians at Chickasaw Old Fields as early as 1804. If not, the honor must be conceded to Joseph and Isaac Criner. These two men, along with Stephen McBroom, explored the northern sections of the county in 1804, and in 1805 the two Criners erected cabins for themselves near Criners! Big Spring on Mountain Fork, Flint River. There they met another explorer, John Hunt, who was destined to locate and settle near the Big Spring in 1805, thus becoming the founder of Huntsville.

Soon wealthy families began to arrive from Virginia and Georgia.

Settlements were established along Flint River--at Huntsville, Hazel Green, Meridianville, and elsewhere. The population grew and by 1810 half the population of the Mississippi Territory resided in Madison County.

Alabama entered the Union at Huntsville on December 14, 1819.

Huntsville, the Madison County seat, became the state's first capital. This town was for a short time known as Twickenham due to the insistence of Leroy Pope, the town's "father." Pope greatly admired the English writer Alexander Pope, whose estate in England was named Twickenham. Huntsville played a significant role in the early history of Alabama. There a United States land office was placed in 1811 and remained throughout the 19th century.







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Railway System. This company had the interior of the Huntsville depot remodeled in 1912. Passenger service was discontinued in 1967, however, and it was used as a freight station until purchased by the City of Huntsville with plans to restore it as a museum.

The depot, in excellent structural condition, is a two-story, red brick building and has a large attic which served as a third floor. It has a stone foundation and four end-interior chimneys.

3. The Twickenham Historic District

The Twickenham Historic District, which covers 70 acres and contains approximately 300 structures, is a museum of architecture spanning sixteen decades, containing all of the periods or styles. It contains Huntsville's most compact collection of good architecture, much of which is 150 years old. The structures range from a two-room, two-story frame Federal building to large mansions of several periods.

Twickenham, the name chosen for the district, was derived from the first official name given to the town when it was chosen as the county seat by a board of commissioners on July 5, 1810. Within the district there are 58 antebellum homes that have been identified and researched. Nine of these were included in the Historic American Buildings Survey of 1935. Detailed plans of these structures are on file in the Library of Congress.

The Twickenham Historic District was officially created by ordinance of the City Council on March 23, 1972.

A listing here of the district's 300 structures would be impractical. Even sketches of the 58 antebellum homes would prove exhaustive. For a complete inventory consult the National Register nomination form on the Twickenham Historic District. Historic and architectural sketches of many of the homes appear in Victor B. 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6. Coste

Coste was an Indian town on the upper end of Pine Island in the Tennessee River. The village was reached by DeSoto on July 2, 1540. It was inhabited at that time by the Koosati Indians, a tribe which later moved south and joined the Creek Confederation.

During DeSoto's week's stay at Coste, there was Indian trouble. The chief complained that his uninvited guests were robbing his corn cribs and he demanded that the outrage be stopped. DeSoto settled the problem by a trick, which was his consistent policy with Indian chiefs. Feigning a conciliatory manner, he waited for his opportunity, seized the chief, and carried him along as hostage.

Chapter 6

A REGIONAL HISTORIC SURVEY PLAN

The plan presented in this chapter is an approach to the proposed indepth historic survey of the five-county TARCOG region. It could easily be modified and applied to any political or geographic entity, whether it be stateor county-wide. It is hoped that this plan will be adopted and supported by the Tennessee Valley Authority and the regional councils of government throughout the entire Valley so that a complete and thorough survey can be made of this vast and historically rich region.

Taking only one year to complete, the historic survey should begin in the early summer with the preliminary work assigned to a qualified college student, preferably an intern hired by the Tennessee Valley Authority, a regional council of governments, or any other agency or historical commission. Emphasis will be placed on this first stage of the plan since this report constitutes the preliminaries of TARCOG's survey. The procedures and methods used in the preparation of this study parallel those presented in the first section of the proposal.

The historic survey program would be supervised by three co-directors, a coordinator, a historian, and a preservation architect. For special concerns a trained geologist and archeologist should be consulted. Other participants in the program whose functions will be explained are field surveyors and historic coordinators. Following is a sketch of the regional historic survey plan.

The Preliminary Research and Survey (3 Months)

The preliminary research and survey should be conducted by a historical intern whose summer's work would be used as a research index guide for the


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entire program. Preferably the intern should be a history major with several years' experience in research and writing.

The first function of the intern is to locate and collect current and outof-date aerial photographs of the area to be surveyed. The current maps and
aerial photographs can be used for comparative analysis with the old, and their
storage would provide future historians with a wealth of data about the present.
If funds are available, the current and out-of-date aerial photos should be
microfilmed for preservation.

To locate and secure historic maps, one must be willing to travel to and communicate with many sources. Old maps, which aid in the location of old roads, settlements, and structures, are located in courthouses, libraries, museums, archives, private collections, and numerous agencies of the government. As soon as the intern begins his work he should write the map and survey divisions of the Tennessee Valley Authority, the U.S. Geological Survey, the General Services Administration of the National Archives, the U.S. Department of Agriculture, the U.S. Department of the Interior, the State Department of Archives and History, the U.S. Department of Commerce, the War Department, and the Army Map Service. He should visit the county courthouses within the area, researching the records of the probate judge, the tax collector, the tax assessor, and the county surveyor. Local library and state archival collections should be investigated. If the intern works hard at these sources and follows all leads, he will compile a collection of historic maps that will greatly aid those who utilize them in the historic survey.

Old, out-of-date, aerial photographs are a bit more difficult to obtain.


They are scarce and expensive to reproduce. The Cartographic Division of the National Archives and Records Service will provide the intern with index sheets from which individual photographs can be selected. If funds are not available

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to purchase the index sheets, the intern may indicate on a map the precise areas in which he is interested and the available photos will be reproduced. For aerial photographs of the Tennessee Valley area dating back to 1927, the Maps and Surveys Branch of the Tennessee Valley Authority, in Chattanooga, should be contacted.

Information about the status of current aerial photographs can be obtained from the Map Information Office of the U.S. Geological Survey in Washington. The Maps and Surveys Branch of the Tennessee Valley Authority should be contacted for recent photos of the Tennessee Valley region. Private aerial survey corporations can also provide the historic survey program with up-to-date aerial coverage.

A means of indexing the maps should be developed by which the intern can catalog as he collects. The easiest method is to prepare a form containing headings under which the title, date, geographer, description, and significance of the map may be recorded. An index may be readily typed from folders of appropriately filed forms. Generally, maps are filed according to coverage area.

When an old map is found, steps should be taken to have it reproduced or secured so that all research materials can be centrally located in order to facilitate the survey. Old maps must usually be photostated for best results; inexpensive xerox copies can be made of well preserved maps if reproduction does not impair their legibility. The maps should be stored in a map case located in a nearby public or university library. After the survey is completed, they may serve historians as research tools for years to come.


A preliminary survey of known historic sites within the area can be prepared after the map collecting and indexing procedures are under way. The preliminary survey should be broad in scope, leaving the time-consuming,

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in-depth, primary research and documentation for the research coordinators. Information on all listings in the survey should be as fully footnoted as possible, indicating at least the secondary research materials available on the site or structure. Such materials will give clues to the significance of a site and facilitate later research. While the preliminary survey is conducted, a bibliography of written materials on the region's history and its historic sites and structures should be compiled. This also can be utilized in the in-depth survey.

The final stage of the intern's work is the preparation of the survey program guide, containing a historic and geographic sketch of the region, a preliminary survey of historic sites and structures, an index of maps and aerial photographs, and a bibliography of relevant written sources. The guide should also include a description of the entire survey plan so that each participant can be fully aware of the goals and objectives of the project. When the intern's report is completed, the second part of the plan will begin.

The Selection and Orientation of Field Surveyors and Research Coordinators (1 Month)


The field survey team, selected by the three co-directors, should be advanced students in the field of history or architecture. If possible, college credit should be given for their work so that, in addition to the stimulus of monetary rewards, the surveyors will be motivated by the knowledge that their performance will be critically evaluated and graded, thus assuring a degree of accuracy. From four to eight surveyors should be chosen, depending on the number needed to cover the area in 15 days of field research. Traveling in teams of two, with the less qualified person driving, the surveyors will photograph and describe the sites and structures listed in the preliminary survey plus the many others that they will be trained by the architect and historian to locate and identify.

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For the selection of the research coordinators—one for each county—the directors should, if possible, consult with the intern who should be acquainted with knowledgeable professional or amateur historians in each county. Each coordinator selected should be familiar with his or her county's history and its historic sites and structures. In addition, the coordinator should be aware of individuals and source materials in the area which can be contacted and/or researched.

After the selection of field surveyors and research coordinators, the project coordinator should draw up contract models and hire the individuals. When hired, the surveyors and coordinators should be provided with copies of the project guide with which to prepare themselves for orientation.

A one-day orientation session should be held for the field surveyors and county coordinators one week after distribution of the guides. Inventory forms, to be used by the surveyors and coordinators, should be prepared prior to the session. The forms should be drawn carefully to assure that all data necessary to meet the objectives of the survey will be included.

The orientation will be conducted by the project coordinator, historian, and architect. They should come prepared to brief the surveyors and coordinators about the project and the role each participant is to play.

The project coordinator, a qualified planner from the regional agency's staff, should present the historic survey plan, discussing the objectives and goals of the project. The project timetable should be illustrated, depicting the time alloted for the surveyors' and coordinators' work. The project coordinator, who will conduct the day-to-day management of the program, should then discuss reporting methods and present a plan for checking work progress. After a brief question-and-answer discussion, the historian will take charge of the session.

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The historian should instruct the surveyors and county coordinators on the research methods to be utilized in the project. Briefing them on the research to date, the historian should acquaint the surveyors and coordinators with the materials available and give instruction on their use. The historian should give a sketch of the progression of settlement within the region, pointing out areas where the surveyors might locate old settlements and structures. Since the historian, a professional from an area college or university, will be evaluating the surveyors' work, giving grades according to performance, he or she should inform the students on what is expected of them.

The architect, knowledgeable of the various historical styles of the region from 1800 to the present, will conduct the last stage of the orientation session. He should brief the surveyors on the architectural styles peculiar to the area and, together with the project historian, should speculate as to what they will find and where. The architect should give clues to the surveyors on how to date structures and determine their architectural quality and significance according to the scarcity of type or uniqueness of design. Instruction should be given the surveyors on field photography. The architect should give instructions to the surveyors on the camera use (angle, exposure, etc.) which will best facilitate his evaluation of the field survey.

If possible, at the end of the orientation session, the architect may take a drive with the surveyors and test their skills at architectural identification. Further instruction could be given in the field to sharpen their competence.

With orientation complete, the field survey should begin immediately.

The Field Survey (2 Months)


In a period of two months, each of the surveyors should spend 15 days in the field. Work could be done on weekends or at any other time convenient to the participants.

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Working in teams of two, the surveyors should survey all sites listed in the preliminary study and others suggested by the historian and architect. The field survey should be conducted one county at a time to assure consistency; a weak team assigned solely to one county could result in a poor or cursory coverage of the entire county area. Each county could be divided along township lines into four quadrants, each assigned to a survey team for coverage. Each team could then systematically survey all streets and roads 50 years old or more, analyzing old maps and aerial photographs for possible sites and structures. Sites surveyed and photographed should be identified on topographic county highway maps. A comprehensive field survey should include some of the more modest and recent structures which also are of historic and architectural significance.

A critical evaluation of the field survey would commence just after its completion.

Review and Evaluation of the Field Survey (1 Month)


The coordinator, historian, and architect should review and evaluate the findings of the field survey and develop a priority system that will enable them to select the sites and structures to be researched in depth by the county research coordinators. Rating each site according to the priorities established might possibly be the most difficult and delicate operation of the survey project. In some instances the selection of a well-protected structure of great historic significance must be weighed against the selection of a less significant structure in danger of destruction. Endangered historic structures must be of the first priority, superseded only by another endangered structure of greater importance and significance. Of course, as in all human endeavors where time and money are involved, some less significant sites must necessarily be omitted from extensive research.

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Other factors to be considered in selecting those sites and structures for extensive research are the standards for inclusion in the National Register of Historic Places. Since listing of the surveyed sites and structures in the National Register is one major objective of the project, special attention should be given to these qualifications. Structures less than 50 years old are difficult to list as are those which have been extensively remodeled, altered, or moved. Historic significance, supported by valid documentation, is also important in determining the acceptance of a site or structure for admittance to the National Register of Historic Places.

These are but a few of the matters which the directors must consider in evaluating the preliminary and field surveys. When the choice is complete, the coordinators must be given the task of completing the survey forms on the selected sites and structures.

Completion of Survey Forms (2 Months)

The survey form, as prepared by the project coordinator, historian, and architect, will include all items necessary to complete fully the National Register of Historic Places nomination form. For two months each county coordinator will labor to complete the forms on those sites and structures selected in his or her county. In this in-depth survey the research coordinators will be assisted by the project architect, historian, and coordinator, and the research to date.

Preparation of the Historical Survey Pamphlet and Completion of National Register Nomination Forms (3 Months)


After the coordinators complete the survey forms, the three directors should review the work and prepare an outline for a survey pamphlet. When the outline is complete, workers should be selected to write the pamphlet. The

NOTES ON OBTAINING OUT-OF-DATE AERIAL PHOTOGRAPHS

The TARCOG office in Huntsville has complete, recent, aerial photographic coverage of DeKalb, Jackson, Limestone, Madison, and Marshall Counties. The aerial photographs were obtained from the United States Department of Agriculture, which conducted the survey in 1970. Since these photos are available for analysis, only old and out-of-date photographs should be purchased.

Because of the expense involved in obtaining a complete set of old aerial photographs for the entire region, orders for the time being must be individual and for only the specific areas under study. Old photographs are available from the Maps and Surveys Branch of the Tennessee Valley Authority and the Cartographic Division of the National Archives and Records Service.


TVA has in its possession aerial surveys of the region dating back to 1927 when the Army first photographed the Valley. Surveys were taken again in 1934 and 1946. Prints from any of these early surveys may be secured by writing the Maps and Surveys Branch, Tennessee Valley Authority, 200 Haney Building, Chattanooga, Tennessee. When ordering, state your full request and sketch on a map the area in concern. TVA will research their files and send prints from the 1927, 1934, and 1946 surveys. A booklet on the procedures for ordering these photos, including a list of prices, is available in the TARCOG Office, Suite 350, Central Bank Building, Huntsville, Alabama.

The National Archives and Records Service has possession of aerial surveys conducted in DeKalb County (1937), Jackson County (1938), Limestone County (1937, 1940), Madison County (1937, 1942), and Marshall County (1937). Again, when ordering, indicate on a map the precise areas of interest (10" by 10" prints cost \$1.75 each). Send the order, with a check or money order



INDEX OF MAPS

Many old maps were found during this preliminary study, and copies have been secured and indexed. They will be stored for use during the survey and have been catalogued in the following manner.

The map index number consists of three parts, e.g., (B1:2:4). The first part (B1) indicates in which map case drawer the map is filed. Each drawer contains maps of the same coverage area (Southeast, Alabama, etc.). The second part of the index number (2) indicates in which map folder the map is to be found. The last part (4) refers to the number of the map, filed chronologically within the folder.

Each entry in the catalog contains a complete description of the indexed map including the title, date, geographer, size, scale, area of coverage, and the specific location where it was found. In addition, a statement of significance and utility is provided for each map.

The catalogued maps which follow are currently filed in the TARCOG offices. They will be consigned to the University of Alabama in Huntsville Library as a central location for use by historic research coordinators during the 1973-74 Historical Survey of the TARCOG region. Maps not catalogued are located elsewhere.
