THE BEST SON OF CONSOL.

HAMLET, the best son of imported Consol, out of imported Plenty by Emilius, will make his present season at my residence, five miles south of Columbia, at \$15, payable at the end of the year, and only \$10 if the money is paid down, and \$1 to the groom.

This horse was bred by that distinguished breeder, Mr. Boardman, of Alabama, in 1838, being now six years old. He was the stable companion of Miss Foote, and I am assured by Mr. B. was as fast and stout, and was retained by him—being no sportsman, after the death of his deservedly popular sire, as his most worthy representative and most likely to sustain his reputation in the stud. In confirmation of the estimation in which Mr. Boardman holds him, he has bred to *Hamlet* some of the best mares in the United States, the produce of which I now have, and those who have any inclination to patronize the horse should see them.

Hamlet is a dark brown without white, upwards of 15 hands 3 inc. high; of great general length, fine arched loin, deep brisket, excellent shoulders and body; with good legs, and hard sound hoofs; his head and neck of high finish, and connected in the proper manner—with the eye of a gazelle; and throughout in high form for speed and endurance under heavy weights.

To Turfmen and those acquainted with the pedigree of horses, *Hamlet* sufficiently commends himself by his pure and fashionable lineage—Consol, his sire, being considered the best horse imported into the United States since Diomed; and his dam being a splendid imported mare, by Emilius, the sire of Priam, and best Horse in England. But a word to that numerous class who propagate the Horse for domestic purposes alone—"the Horse of all work"—for we must not all rear Mules, and thorough or well-bred mares produce the best Mules. We unhesitatingly assert, that for daily service and common use, the most enduring, active, vigorous and handsome Horses are the thorough-bred, or those with several crosses of pure blood. It is to this cross that the Northern States are indebted for their fine breed of Trotters and Stage Horses. On this subject we will quote the language of one of the most competent judges in the country. In discussing this question, he says:—

"As a national benefit, it may be asserted by some, that we do not require that breed in use for the Turf technically termed the "blood horse." To this a familiar intercourse with the most eminent breeders and turfmen of the Nation, combined with no inconsiderable knowledge of horses and their relative powers, authorizes us to dissent. Our extent of country and climate require horses of great action and durability, not encumbered with unnecessary mass of flesh or cumbersome bone, forming an overweight of carcass. Our farmers in many situations have a great deal of road to pass over, in order to reach a market, and that too, upon ground often bound as hard as marble by the winter's frost, or parched dry and rendered equally obdurate by the summer's sun; upon roads of this description, or such as are macadamised, (now coming into general use,) no heavy maddened animal can for any length of time bear to be urged beyond a walk or slow trot, without encountering much toilsome distress, and permanent injury of both feet and limbs. Nor are any, except such as possess a large share of "blood," equal in extreme warm weather to the task of a mail stage, or other duty where expedition and continuance are required. The coarse, heavy horse will not answer in a warm climate; the varying face of our country and the heat of our summer months are ill adapted to him, and his slow, tedious movement equally repugnant to the genius of our people.

"In regard to selection, we cannot but recommend adhering as closely as possible to such as come nearest in pedigree or purity of blood, symmetry, form, apparent strength and action, to those in use for the Turf, denominated "blood horses," as most adequate to long and severe exertion, under which horses of an inferior description so frequently sink for want of that constitutional stamina and inherent fortitude, that those of high pedigree and pure "blood" so eminently possess.

"In opposition to what we have here set forth as an established and incontrovertible fact, we shall no doubt be told by some, that the "blood horse" has not sufficient bone and strength for the generality of business purposes.—Upon this point we ask leave to introduce a few remarks. This want of bone, so frequently and eternally echoed and transmitted from one affected connoisseur to another, is alleged without the least knowledge of the external conformation of the animal, or the most distant idea that any difference exists in the strength of bones of the same size, taken from horses of different breeds, or knowing that two bones exactly of the same dimensions, the one appertaining to the "blood horse," and the other to one of the common breed, bear no comparison in point of either solidity, weight, fibre, or strength, or that the muscular and ligamentous appendages of the former, the very source of action and power, are much larger and stronger than those of the latter—that the use of horses principally to extend the parts and support the frame—that, being in themselves inactive, the excess beyond what is required operates as dead weight to be carried along; thus an undue weight of selecting for severe service, horses forms an encumbrance, and hence arises the folly which we daily witness of selecting for severe service, horses overloaded, like cart horses, with this same heavy structure, whose undue weight and inactivity of parts, render them totally unfit for either rapidity of motion or continuance.

"We do not hesitate to assert, that "blood horses" of proper size, formation and symmetry, full fifteen hands (five feet) and upwards in height, of full and just proportions and muscular appearance, bred from such as are known to possess constitutional stamina and fortitude, will exceed in speed, strength, or durability, whatever horses may be brought against them, on the road, in the field, the chase, or any service whatever; and when offered in market, either at home or abroad, command prices more than double that of any other class."

I have an abundance of pasturage at seventy-five cents per week for Mares sent to remain with the Horse. He will be in the hands of a careful groom, and every care taken to prevent accidents, but no liability for any.

Boardman Papers, 1825-1845 - Apparently lawyer Cabaniss attended to the affairs of Elijah Boardman. Elijah and his brother entered into Huntsville activities at least at the time of statehood, 1819, when John was the printer for the new state constitution. Elijah established an imported stock farm and race horse stables. Both were active but unfortunately both fell into disgrace and headed, as many others had, to Mississippi. Included in this file is the Certificate of Stock in the Huntsville Theatre, #1, 1825, racing and boarding accounts with his sometimes partners. The racing events were quite extent traveling to Nashville and New York among other venues. For further information see Nancy M.
