four fifths of the Cotton bought in this country for the European market is
done by agents of Manufacturers & Merchants in Europe; that these agents act under
orders, Instructions and prescribed limits from their friends in Europe,
who cannot understand as well as we do the state of their property in
this country - and will never, of course, in making out their limits
