the lowest of market which is it seems to mean nearly the whole
useful of our present crop and therefore it may be long before it
can meet - too long for us to hold Shorter Cotton. For the same
reasons we cannot long advise you to recommend the same to them.
They will have to take low prices here or still lower if they
ship or think for it or ship for them or must get advance

a reaction. You should therefore, or think, hold out no
encouragement to them to order shipments, but leave with us
full discretion.

 confidence our anticipations of the future are favorable, quite sufficient
 as we are the crop cannot exceed 1,400,000 Bales. Long effort
 is making to keep prices down here and such is the heavy stock
 on sale (100,000 Bales) that an apprehension that little advance will
 be realized as the letter is in the hands of upwards of 200 speculators
 many of whom cannot hold. Our family are getting quite low but
 shall act with caution and deliberation - yet you must not
 us to send you any thing over from here - and buy that
 if it can be used to advantage, negotiate in Nashville
 120 days for all that you can use to advantage in contracting here
 prof. We hold a good deal (except our moderate stock) of cotton which
 the owner requests to be held, but so far as you can, are disposed to
 comply with their wish.

Large as the operations in our Cotton market have lately been, we have seen an extraordinary fall in the price of most kinds of cotton, during which prices fell as low as 44s 3/4 p lb. This was a very low price for the amount of the quantities of the kind with China & the other sorts of cottons, concluded with the Chinese authorities for the supply of duties and the future regulation of trade, which was required 8th Inst. The demand, both on the part of consumers & speculators continued very active up to 10th Inst. but suddenly ceased yesterday, only about 1500 bales were sold. This attention is paid to a pretty general disposition to wait the accounts by the Boston firm of 1st Inst. then just due, & consequently looked for, and partly, and more particularly here, checked at all anchors to the active traders goods, and the cause by the further advanced date of the last day in our course with this last week in the same market.

Our market yesterday consequently assumed a calmer tone, the price of most kinds of cotton was at rather lower prices. The regular Boston firm arrived last night and her account of the Cottons appearing seemed more favourable and the general estimate of the probable quantity amounted to 100,000 bales, but we have seen the market very exactly today, and though the fall has been 5000 bales with 1000 on speculation, prices have declined 44s 3/4 p lb from the highest point of last week. So that the present rate and barely 3/4 better than the estimate of the department of the last firm, and the low of the market of speculation. The sales for the week ended last week were 7000 bales, some of it being 4000 bales, & 1000 for export, and for the week ended 13th Inst. the business amounted to 10,000 bales, of which 5000 changed hands on speculation, but none was taken by the firm. Of this last week, 12,500 were shipped with 4000 to Orleans at 44s 6 3/4 - 17,000 Alabama & Mobile at 44s 5 3/4 and 1000 for sale at 10 1/2 p lb. On Saturday 14th & Monday 16th the business for the week was 7000 bales, of which 1000 were on speculation, and 6000 were taken by the firm. The quantity of cottons has been estimated at 100,000 bales, of which 5000 were shipped with 4000 to Orleans at 44s 6 3/4 - 17,000 Alabama & Mobile at 44s 5 3/4 and 1000 for sale at 10 1/2 p lb. The price in the port is now estimated at 732,000 bales against 500,000 at the time last season or 232,000 bales more than at that time.

We have none of your papers since our last meeting, and nothing interesting to communicate excepting a hubbub among our Bank, again. At nine o'clock this morning on opening the Commercial Bank announced her inability longer to redeem her circulation with specie which at once caused a panic in the public mind and an immense rush was made upon all the other specie paying institutions, including the Bank of Louisiana - the most determined rush was made upon the Mechanics & Traders and City Banks, both of which had considerable circulation afloat. They stood it however manfully. We were pleased however to notice that none of the large depositors evinced any uneasiness the applicants being mostly small bill holders. They continued to take each others paper in Deposits as usual, and as long as the Bank of Louisiana co-operate, with them in this respect we shall entertain hopes of their holding out, but whether she may be caused to drop will inevitably sink Commercial Bank in an instant to 10 and it - shortly after to 20, then 30 &

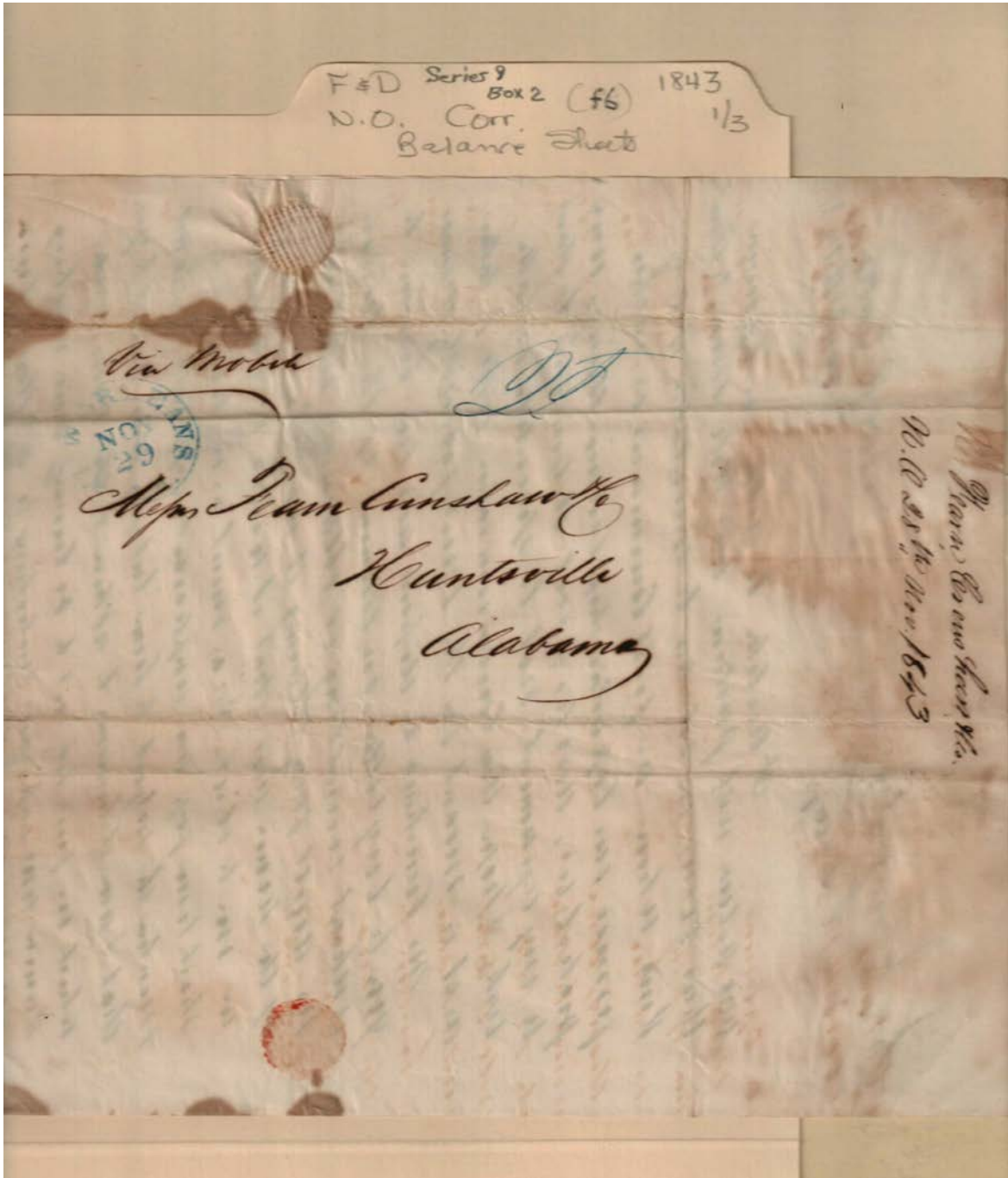

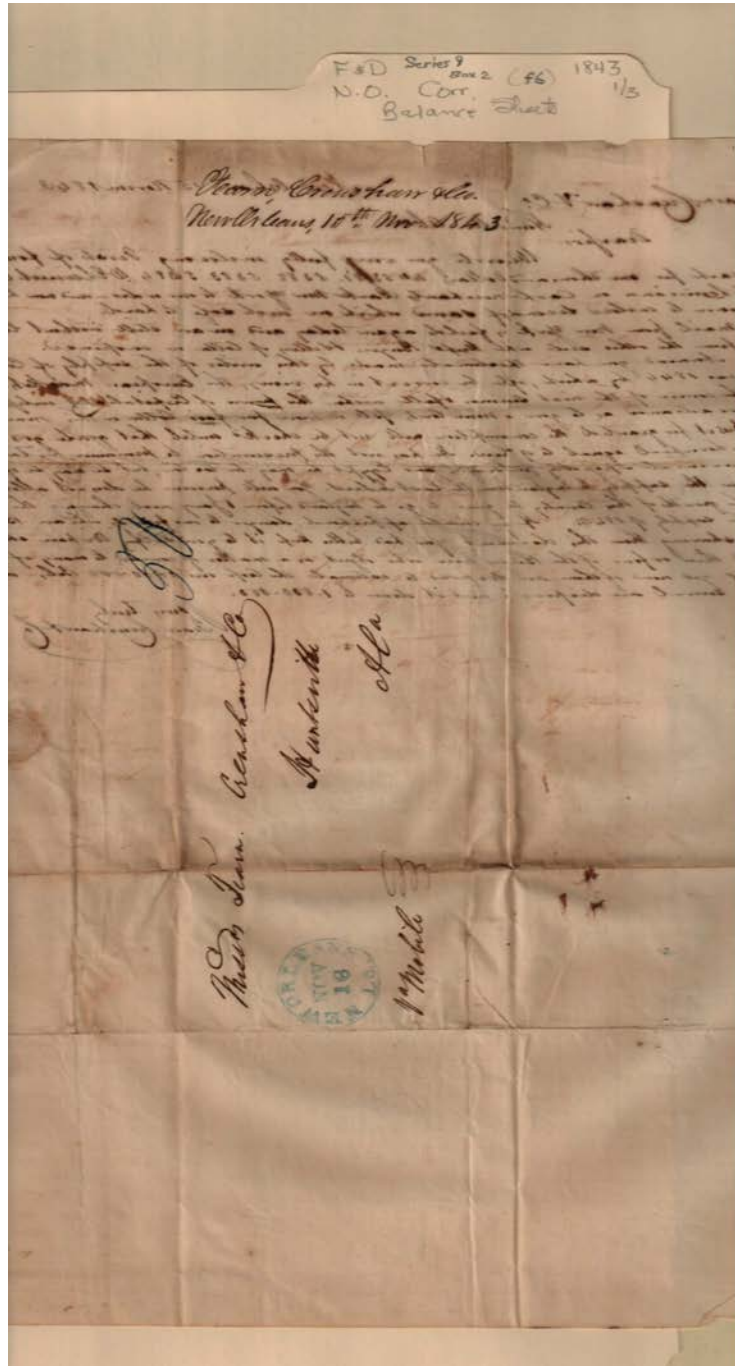

should be advanced as to give us nine Cents, full or more per ~~bag~~ ^{per} ~~100~~ ¹⁰⁰ lbs Cotton in the market
if taken at for granted the consumption will not be checked until that grade goes about
10% in demand equal to 9% here. He has not the presumption to presume his table
entirely accurate - probably from Brazil and Egypt he may be too low, but he may be equally
too high in the supply to England from the East India. You will perceive he does not allow any
part of the growth of this Country this year to go to England before 1 Jan next changing the whole
Cape to the supply of 1844. If you should apprehend danger to our friends who are Bazaar
Cotton by showing them this document you had better keep it to yourself. We have shown
it to but three or four of the Bazaar here who speak as a matter of course, to many of the
estimates yet none of them are disposed to estimate the Cape over 1,900,000 Bales - and
we think several are disposed to put it down to 1,800,000.
