Dr. Roberts died November 5, 2000 at eighty-three years of age. Her health had slowly deteriorated to the point that she needed constant care, yet the stroke that claimed her life came as a sad shock to everyone who knew her. She never fully recovered from the Guillain-Barré Syndrome she developed in 1975. She fought the disease with all her of considerable willpower but in the end, it weakened her, setting up the stroke that claimed her life. Dr. Roberts started young; put in long hours, chose worthy causes, and affected the lives of countless Alabamians through her efforts as a teacher and a historic preservationist. Dr. Roberts received her teaching certificate at seventeen and began her teaching career in 1934. After retirement in 1980, Dr. Roberts continued to teach, lecturing on Alabama history at the senior center and speaking to various groups about the preservation of Alabama's historic past. She also wrote her greatest historical work, the Sesquicentennial History of the Church of the Nativity, Episcopal 1843-1993, a comprehensive history of her church. She constantly fielded requests to lecture. She saw UAHuntsville as her greatest project, but she also looked at her contributions to the various organizations she supported with a great deal of pride. Fittingly, Madison County's last Cabaniss is resting shoulder to shoulder with the county's first Cabaniss in the historic section of Huntsville's Maple Hill cemetery.



Septimus had various distinguished law partners including Leroy Pope Walker, "Jefferson Davis's first Secretary of War,"2 as well as Robert C. Brickell, who served as "Chief Justice of the Alabama State Supreme Court from 1874 to 1884.113 Septimus also served in the Alabama State Legislature and the Confederate Army. In 1843, Septimus Cabaniss married Virginia Shepherd of Huntsville, and they purchased a house at 603 Randolph Avenue that had been designed and built by George Steele. This home remained in their family for the next 164 years including the sixty three years Dr. Roberts called the house her home. A desire to see this home and the neighborhood it was built in preserved, inspired Dr. Roberts's dedication to the historic preservation movement in Huntsville. George Steele, the home's designer and builder, was a "self taught Huntsville architect best remembered for shaping the city's early edifices." He designed many private homes and public buildings that still exist, including the First Alabama Bank building built in 1825 at a cost of \$76,000 and located on the Court House Square. Steele also built numerous other noted private residences. Virginia Shepherd Cabaniss, Dr. Roberts' great grandmother, was raised four blocks from her marital residence at 505 Holmes Avenue in a house built in 1828 by her father Levin Wilson Shepherd. 

Westbrook buggy and arrived in Huntsville by train for her visits with her Grand Aunt Fannie. In retirement, aunt Fannie and aunt Ellen Roberts lived together at 603 Randolph Avenue. With the death of aunt Fannie in 1937 and aunt Ellen's declining health, Dr. Roberts felt it was her responsibility to help with her aunt's care. Speaking about her family, Dr. Roberts said, "We always looked forward, accepting things as they came along."6 The move to Huntsville was her way of accepting things as they came along. In retrospect, it is clear that the strong role models during Dr. Roberts's formative years were almost all women. Her aunt Fannie held a respected position as Clerk of the Circuit Court in Madison County's male-dominated judicial system and it was in her home Dr. Roberts spent her summers. Her mother, Mary Watson Roberts, was the "backbone of the family." She had certainly taken charge of raising the family. Dr. Roberts said of her father, "The best day's work he ever did was the day he married my mother." Her grandmother, Alabama Watson, made certain Dr. Roberts did her daily chores. Grandmother Lucy Cabaniss Roberts provided her religious foundation. Dr. Roberts, speaking about her paternal Grandmother said, "She bribed me, by promising chocolate pudding for lunch after church."9 Dr. Roberts had from childhood developed an understanding of what a commitment, a strong work ethic and a sense of faith actually meant and she never lost that understanding. Dr. Roberts was born to a family that valued education highly. Her great grandfather, Septimus Cabaniss, was a graduate of the University of Virginia, and his brothers, Alfred and John, both had university degrees. Alfred first attended Transylvania College, now the



Background Westbrook Paper 10 Dr. Roberts was quoted in an interview with the UAH Alumni News, published after her death, as saying, "The decision to establish the Huntsville center was made on November 15, 1949. The University would provide the teachers and the city would provide 200 students and a building suitable for classes."23 The building provided was the old West Huntsville High School, later Butler High School and now Stone Middle school on Governors Drive. The first classes at the Huntsville University Center began on January 6, 1950. Dr. Roberts said "There were 10 freshman level classes and 137 students. The cost to each student was a two dollar registration fee and four dollars per credit hour for their classes." Dr. Roberts was among the five original teachers on the faculty; Walter Mills taught Accounting, Patrick Richardson taught Political Science and Economics, Mamie Steger taught Math and Mary Casmus taught English."25 Dr. Roberts was the first History teacher at the University Center and established the History Department. In June of 1953, she stopped teaching at Huntsville High School and became the first full time History teacher on the University Center faculty. Dr. Roberts never liked being labeled as one of the school's founders, but she clearly was. Dr. Eleanor Hutchens remembered when Dr. Roberts initially began teaching classes at the University Center in 1950. Most of Dr. Roberts's classes were at night, but she was enthusiastic about teaching at the Center and, even at that early date, saw the potential for a University in Huntsville. 

woman job security and respect, and it could be personally rewarding. The Huntsville University Center was still an experiment in the minds of many.

In 1956, a committee was formed to find a site for a permanent campus. Dr. Roberts was a charter member of that committee serving from 1956 to 1960. Once a permanent site had been selected, she was on the building committee for the first building, Morton Hall. Morton Hall was dedicated in 1960, and Dr. Roberts was proudly involved in that dedication. Throughout the fifties and early sixties, Dr. Roberts' name was attached in some way to almost every decision affecting the future of the University Center in Huntsville.

Dr. Roberts's firmly believed the school should have a comprehensive curriculum that would draw and appeal to a diverse student body. A majority of the students during the fifties were older and returning to school under the GI Bill. Consequentially, the University Center was seen by many as a veterans' school, a description that Dr. Roberts disagreed with. There was a common idea held by many in both the local community and on the university faculty that felt the school should develop primarily as an engineering, math and science school. Dr. Roberts was strongly opposed to that idea. Her vision was for all students, regardless of major, to share a common liberal arts foundation and she fought hard to establish the general education requirements UAH with little change still requires. The State of Alabama has since mandated a near identical program for all colleges and universities statewide. Dr. Roberts was ahead of her time. She well understood what a liberal arts program encompassed. She and Dr. Eleanor Hutchens had often discussed exactly what a liberal arts program should consist of and how it should function. Dr. Roberts believed a well rounded education was very important and better served the student and the community.



the operation of the Hall. The Roberts Collection at UAH contains her notes and working copies of various articles and speeches she wrote in relation to the Constitution Hall Village.

Dr. Roberts received numerous awards, plaques and certificates. Many of her awards have no documentation or specific information attached to them at this time. That she had received such an eclectic assortment of awards offers real insight into the broad nature of her interests and civic involvement. These awards can be found in the Roberts Collection at The University of Alabama in Huntsville.

Dr. Roberts was awarded with membership in the Delta Kappa Gamma Society on

January 6, 1940. For her efforts on behalf of Huntsville Army Veterans attending classes at the

University Center, the United States Army Retired Officers Association presented her with a

plaque of appreciation on June 26, 1967. She was recognized for her efforts on behalf of all those

GI Bill students she had taught. In May of 1970, the Alabama Bar Association awarded her the
annual Law Day Award. The Girl Scouts of North America awarded Dr. Roberts the Girl Scouts

Scroll of Honor in 1976. On May 5 1978, Governor George Wallace awarded Dr. Roberts the

State of Alabama's Award of Merit for outstanding service in the Preservation of Alabama

History. She became a life member in the Tennessee Valley Chapter of the Daughters of the

American Revolution on November 12, 1990. She was also awarded the Distinguished Service

Award by the Huntsville Madison County Chamber of Commerce on January17, 1991. Senator

Bud Cramer read a tribute to Dr. Roberts into the Congressional Record of the 102<sup>nd</sup> Congress'

1st Session on September 15, 1992, praising her for her work in Huntsville since 1937. In 1998

she was given the Historic Preservation Award for her work in the preservation of the 1832







display of religious faith to be politically incorrect and as such unacceptable. Dr. Roberts attended church regularly her entire life. As a child she attended Saint Alban's Episcopal Church in Gainesville, Alabama with her mother and grandmother. Even after moving to Huntsville and joining the congregation of the Church of the Nativity, she continued to support Saint Alban's.

During the sixties with membership down to a handful of families, there was a fear that the Diocese would close Saint Alban's. Many of the old historic buildings in Gainesville were being sold and moved. The members feared that the old church building would be lost if closed. Dr. Roberts became its senior warden and was instrumental in keeping the church open. Hiram Patrenos, the current church treasurer, remembers how the old church families kept the church alive and said of Dr. Roberts that "she contributed to the Church regularly and was very involved in keeping it open. She cared a lot about the church and the old families that were members."

By the time of Dr. Roberts's death in 2000, Saint Alban's membership was down to six families with services only being held on the third Sunday of each month. To Dr. Roberts, Saint Alban's was her first church, her family's church, and with years of personal and family membership came a commitment to continue to support it.

Saint Alban's does not have a cemetery adjoining the church yard as so many rural churches have. Lucy Summerville lives across the highway from Saint Alban's, a position that enables her and her husband to keep an eye on the old church. She remembers Dr. Roberts from her childhood. Her mother had worked for Dr. Roberts's mother as a house keeper. Although there was a considerable difference in age, Lucy said Dr. Roberts was always very nice to her, and she always liked Dr. Roberts. Many of Dr. Roberts's family members are interred in a large family plot at the Old Cemetery in Gainesville. When asked about the old cemetery and its





Sesquicentennial History of the Church of the Nativity, Episcopal, 1843-1993, which documented the history and growth of one of Huntsville's oldest and most historical churches.

Dr. Frances Cabaniss Roberts lived a full life. She began a career as a teacher in 1934, a career she never really retired from. After leaving the university she taught Alabama History periodically at the local senior center. She immersed herself in a wide range of civic activities that greatly benefited the community she deeply loved. She often kept in touch with former students well into their adult life, continuing to mentor and advise them. She believed in UAH and saw the university as her greatest project. She had been involved in every facet of the school from its conception in November 1949 and remained so until her health had completely robbed her of all energy. She had received numerous awards, recognizing her contributions to the Huntsville public schools, UAH, Huntsville, Madison County, and the State of Alabama. Her awards ranged from small plaques and framed certificates to honorary degrees and a building named in her honor, yet, all her many awards pale in comparison to her life's work. She died on November 5, 2000 at the age of 83, her legacy of leadership and dedication to school and community lives on.

The Roberts Collection consists of the family records and miscellaneous papers of the Cabaniss family which accumulated over the generations at the family residence at 603 Randolph Avenue. Upon Dr. Roberts's death on November 5, 2000, the papers, books, awards and various artifacts that make up the Roberts Collection were bequeathed to Dr. Joanna Shields by Dr. Roberts. After the tremendous effort and great expense needed to gather, pack and move the collection it was donated by Dr. Shields to the M. Louis Salmon Library at The University of Alabama in Huntsville. Due to the massive volume of artifacts spanning her family's history






