John Hunt, for whom Huntsville is named, came to what is now Madison County and built his home near the "Big Spring" in 1805. Officially named Huntsville in 1811, the city had become so important by 1819 that it was chosen as the convention city where Alabama's first constitution was drafted. The first governor of Alabama was inaugurated here.

Now a center of industry for the southeast, Huntsville, with a population of some 160,000, is a city of contrasts — a blend of old and new. With solid traditions of the past, the city is progressive, fast growing, and keyed to the pulsating space age.

More than 100 churches representing 35 denominations add a solid warmth and welcome to residents and visitors alike.

The city public school system includes 26 elementary schools, nine junior high schools, and four accredited high schools. Three private and six parochial schools are also located here.

Huntsville is noted for its wide variety of recreational attractions, appealing to all tastes and ages. Water sports, camping, horseback riding, golf, tennis, and swimming are among the diversions supported by public facilities. Local enthusiasm has spawned spelunking groups, sports car clubs, and an astronomy organization. Three private golf courses, two country clubs, five bowling alleys, an ice skating rink, and five indoor cinemas provide varied year-round activities and entertainment. Ballet, art, drama, music, literary, and other associations bring to Huntsville and produce locally a myriad of cultural events. Excellent restaurants and nightclubs provide a sparkle after dark equalled by few other cities.

For the history enthusiast, the nature lover, the hunter, the fisherman, the student, the businessman, the professional person, the club woman — it is the place to be.



ACADEMIC PROGRAMS

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The University of Alabama in Huntsville strives to provide the basic liberal foundation which is vital toward preparing an individual for his life's work.

Programs in the humanities, social sciences, and technical fields are designed so that every student will have the opportunity to broaden his education and to enrich his own life and that of his community.


Other areas with course offerings are: earth sciences, education, modern foreign languages (French, German, Russian, Spanish), music, philosophy, political science, sociology, and speech.

Additional areas of degree emphasis will be announced as they are approved.

UAH has initiated a versatile degree program plan called area of concentration (AOC). The AOC includes a major subject area and a cluster of courses related to the major in an intellectual or a vocational sense. The supportive cluster may be drawn from one or more areas of study. A student declares his AOC at the end of his sophomore year. A student may choose any one of numerous approved AOC patterns or, with proper approval, design his own individual cluster if it will better enable him to attain his goals.

In the field of education, a student may complete professional requirements for a Class B Secondary Professional Teaching Certificate in any of the approved major areas of concentration. Up to 75% of the work towards an education degree in other major areas or in elementary education can be completed at UAH.

Many opportunities are available at UAH to prepare students for such professional fields as medicine, dentistry, and law. Most students entering medical or dental schools do so after completing an undergraduate degree. Many schools of law require applicants to obtain a bachelor's degree as a prerequisite for admission.




A student interested in nursing may begin studies at UAH and transfer to the School of Nursing of The University of Alabama in Birmingham to complete the degree requirements.





STUDENT ACTIVITIES

UAH recognizes that in addition to academic programs, student involvement is an integral part of college education. UAH students are given opportunities for self government through the Student Government Association and for experience through service on a number of University policy committees, participation on student publications, and in clubs, service organizations, and The Union program.



UAH also recognizes the importance of physical competition in the development of the individual. To help provide a necessary balance in these areas, UAH currently has teams participating in intercollegiate crew and basketball with plans to add tennis, golf, and baseball. The intramural program has teams competing in flag football and basketball with plans for volleyball, tennis, bowling, bridge, chess, horseshoes, and soccer being formulated. Faculty and staff join with students in taking part in intramural sports.

Students are provided a wide selection of cultural activities through musical groups, dramatic presentations, lectures, films, and various exhibits relating to the arts.

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ADMISSION TO UAH

If a student plans to begin college work in the summer or fall term following graduation from high school, he should write for application forms and information as early in his senior year as possible.

In general, the high school records should show an overall average of C or better in academic subjects, and a minimum of 16 units divided as follows:

- 4 Units English
- 1 Unit History or Social Studies
- 1 Unit Algebra
- 1 Unit Geometry
- 9 Units of Electives (At least 5 of these should be academic in nature.)

Additional units in mathematics and science are strongly recommended for some programs. A student who has had two years of a foreign language may qualify for the more advanced classes in foreign language upon entering college.

A high school senior's transcript, which must be sent by the high school to the Office of Student Records, will indicate the courses which have been completed through the junior year. A supplementary transcript certifying the successful completion of the senior year will be required from the high school

at the time of graduation. Until the supplementary transcript is received, a student's acceptance by UAH is conditional.

Applicants must also request that a copy of American College Testing (ACT) score be sent to the Office of Student Records. High school seniors who have not taken the tests, should obtain information regarding the testing dates from their counselor or principal, plan to take the tests, and have the results sent to UAH.

Most students are aware of the need for a well-rounded high school academic program, especially in English and mathematics. College work, both general and specialized, depends upon skill in reading and writing and on the ability to reason logically. A student who is deficient in his preparation in English and mathematics may still be admitted in good standing. These deficiencies, however, must be removed during the first year in college.

Transfer students who come to UAH from other colleges and universities should apply well in advance of the beginning of the term they wish to enter. Transcripts from each institution attended plus all other items specified on the application forms should be sent to the Office of Student Records.

Students who wish to be admitted in any of the special student categories will find the terms for admission identified on specified application forms.




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
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FEEES — STUDENT AID

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One of the most important considerations of students and parents is the cost of a college education.

All students applying for admission to UAH pay a one-time, non-refundable application fee of \$10.00.

Students who are admitted for the first time are required to take a series of placement tests for which there is a charge of \$10.00.

Full-time undergraduate students pay each term a course, buildings, and student union fee of \$135.00 and a student activity fee of \$8.00.

Part-time undergraduate students pay each term a course, buildings, and student union fee of \$17.00 per semester hour, a registration fee of \$5.00 per term, and an optional student activity fee of \$8.00.

Full-time graduate students pay each term a course, buildings, and student union fee of \$220.00 and an optional student activity fee of \$8.00.

Part-time graduate students pay each term a course, buildings, and student union fee of \$25.00 per semester hour, a registration fee of \$3.00, and an optional student activity fee of \$8.00.

These fees do not include such expenses as books, supplies, laboratory, and other special fees.

In addition to the above fees, non-resident students pay a maximum out-of-state fee of \$100.00 per term.

If a student has prepared himself to enter college, but feels finances pose a problem, he will find that many opportunities exist at UAH for financial assistance. Many students are eligible for scholarships, loans, or student employment. Some awards are based solely on scholarship and special achievement; others are granted on the basis of scholarship and financial need. Part-time employment on campus or in the community is available through the Financial Aids and Placement Office.
