0800 Snow. Trrst we 1 ve encountered here.
0900 Field messa, from 48 th checking yesterday's, verbal orders. Made corrections and returned to 48th.

Find my new trailer roof leaks, right over the bed. 1130 Lost Jake Hoore today. Transferred, I understand, to peninsular Base Section. No details yet.
1530 Anne Schwartz and Kathy, both of 262d Hosp., came witl Winger and pickett to visit our headquqrters. A little shelling. I made egonog of rum, eggs, and canned milk for my open house. Also a punch of native gin and fruit. Some pronounced the "Nog" better than last year": at Muskogee.


1530 General Allen ordered the 48 th to position on the left flank to: suard that flank.
1800 Infantry unexpectedly reached its objective early. Now they want bridges built immediately, so the armor can move forward.
2130235 th is on the bridges.

Got the 48 th returned and starte
railroad again. Barely return to their bivouac. very high wind. This
very cold. ver very cold. like a boat. work on the railroad again. called had started whey be put into Reserve again, as all reserves had been committed. C battalions is already down to little more than 100 men. 1600 235th lost one officer (Collins) and 4 men while working on repairs Q oo the bridge today. Jerry got a direct hit on our fowward Enrineer dump as Winger and Foley were passing and Winger got a broken foot from it. C 235 th has lost over $5 \%$ and nearly
in these last three days.
I've had to relieve Flowers,
and will ask for reclassification 4 men of that patrol. Three letters from Laurella. saw Gunnar on December 19 th , and he is so big and straight "like a cadet-gray wall closing in", and yet still a little boy, thank God: I do thank God for that family of mine! No man ever had a finer!

1800 I complained to Gallagher (II Corps Engineer) that my Engineers are being wasted as Infeantry. This not necessary! There are regiments
resting.
2000 General Allen (through his Chief of staff) says he is particularly sorry to have to commit my specialists as Infantry because hey were "the best damned Enoinee he has ever seen."

7 Jan 44 Mignane 0120 Pope reported CO C 235 th ready at the quarry. Goodpaster called. His last company, CO B, has now been committed as iniantry. And the bridge we call sobstacle 13" still needs about $2 \frac{1}{2}$ hours more work to complete it. I sent Co $C$, 235 th , in to finish it is possible. 0430 Visited C Co on obstacle 13. It's quite a sight, the display of fireworks all the guns make in the dark.

The bypass is certainly going to be passable for tracked vehicle by daylight. 0600 Returned to TFA. Learned we no hold the East and forward fizont slop Of MOUNT PORCHIA. 250 more Infantry it
probable dawn counterattack as we nh against the ould be safe by 0800 . 1825 I am so tired. Goodpaster came in early with news of heavy (perhaps over 50\%) casualties in A Co 48 th--Munson has been wounded and taken prisoner--no casualties are being evacuated--disorganization I told the general about it, also telling him it was all based as yet n hearsay, but that if it proved to compmetect I was going to demand a Munson escaped investigation. returned to us--onl and whunded. I understand he played dead and the Germans abandoned him. Later check on casualties seemed to indicate that many are merely lost along the hillside, mixed up with other units. our casualties are not being evacuated rapidly, it is true, but they are coming out as rapidly as the others from other urits, at least.

I was promised I could get the 48 th out at 1800 , but later develop-ments--or lack of developments on the right and left flanks--prevented ${ }^{i t}$ 。

When he decided not to stay for di ner, I took Miss Goody t-a Red Cross girl, formerly ( 20 years ago) the lead in "Hit the Deck"--to dinner. The little singer from the orchestra, Gianna Massi, Major Klein, the hotel manager, and Miss Brown joined us.
